

Naval Treaty's Revision Seen

US, Britain and France in Projected Conference to Raise Tonnage

PARIS, Jan. 20 (AP)—French naval circles today put forward the possibility of a conference among United States, British and French naval experts for revision of the 1936 London naval treaty to allow construction of battleships of more than 35,000 tons.

Members of the chamber of deputies naval committee said such a conference may follow an "exchange of views" among the three powers concerning the treaty's tonnage restriction.

Nazis, Soviets May Join

It was understood that if such a conference were called, Germany and Soviet Russia would be included at least in the later stages because they also agreed to the limitation.

Gratien Candace, navy budget reporter in the chamber, reported the "exchange of views" and declared France was favorable to removing the tonnage restriction since "it is well known that Japan is building 46,000-ton ships."

(Britain, the United States and France agreed in the London treaty that for the period 1937-1942 inclusive they would exchange information on new naval construction and adhere to certain qualitative limitations.)

35,000 Tons is Limit

Chief among the latter for capital ships was a maximum displacement of 35,000 tons. Escape clauses in the pact authorized the release of signatories from restrictions if a non-treaty power should exceed them.

(Both Germany and Soviet Russia came within scope of the pact by separate treaties with Britain in 1937. Russia was exempted from qualitative limitations for vessels stationed in the far east and from exchange information on vessels constructed and stationed there.)

The foreign ministry refused to deny there had been such an exchange of views.

Peacock Spit Is Escaped by Ship

ASTORIA, Ore., Jan. 20 (AP)—The freighter Jacob Luckenbach narrowly escaped disaster in crossing the Columbia river bar last night. Lieutenant Commander Frank Higbee of the coast guard cutter Onondaga reported.

Commander Higbee said the vessel, heavily laden and without a pilot, apparently underestimated a swift ebb current, bronched broadside and struggled for some time against terrific seas which were running toward the dangerous shoals of Peacock spit.

The Onondaga and the motor lifeboat Triumph were proceeding to her aid when the vessel pulled clear.

Scene Completed, Film Actor Dies

CULVER CITY, Calif., Jan. 20 (AP)—Robert McWade, veteran character actor, finished his final scene late yesterday in the movie, "Benefits Fought," walked from the range of the camera, slumped in a chair and died of a heart attack.

Director Clarence Brown of M-G-M had just congratulated the 56-year-old actor on his performance.

"Good work, Bob," Brown said to him as the camera stopped. "That's your final scene."

"Yes, that's my final scene," replied McWade.

First Woman may Die, Electrocutation

SPRINGFIELD, Ill., Jan. 20 (AP)—Unless some judge interposes, Mrs. Marie Foster of St. Louis will be the first woman to die in the electric chair in Illinois.

Gov. Henry Horner, avowed opponent of capital punishment, refused to grant clemency to a 27-year-old mother of four daughters, who was convicted of financing the slaying of her brother for his insurance money.

With Angelo Ralph Giancola, 22, St. Louis, she was scheduled to be electrocuted at Menard penitentiary early Friday morning.

Diabetes Deaths Rising in State Since '27, Report

PORTLAND, Jan. 20 (AP)—Dr. Frederick Stricker, state health officer, said deaths in Oregon from diabetes, a glandular disease related to the digestion of starch, sugar and other carbohydrates, had increased steadily since 1927.

Declaring heredity to be a causative factor, he advised measures to delay or prevent the disease for "susceptible individuals."

"A diabetic should not marry a diabetic if they intend to have children," he said. "A person in whose family diabetes exists should avoid overweight, especially after 40 years of age. Another factor which appears to favor the onset of diabetes is repeated pregnancies."
