

Humphrey Smith Is Called Beyond

Humphrey H. Smith, 88, of Rosedale, who died last Friday, was born November 20, 1849, in Paulton, Somersetshire, England, the son of the late Edwin and Mary Ann Smith. At the age of four he came, with his parents to America, settling in Wisconsin, where he was educated at Ripon college and the University of Wisconsin at Madison. He was a Mason for 66 years.

In 1877 he came with his parents to Oregon, settling on the

farm south of Salem which he owned at the time of his death. He was a retired school teacher and while teaching school at Turner he married Esther Denyer.

He is survived by his daughter, Mrs. Edward F. Whelan of Salem, his sister, Mrs. Mary Benedict of Washington and two grandchildren, Otto E. Smith, Jr. and Maybelle Smith of Portland. His wife and his son Otto E. preceded him in death a few months.

He was a member of the Church of Our Father (Unitarian) in Portland, and also a member of Pearl lodge No. 66 AF & AM of Turner.

Mr. Adams pointed out that there are 20,000 crippled persons in Oregon, largely the result of accidents, and that through the workmen's compensation many of these may be trained to be self supporting.

Last year 483 persons were trained and placed in such jobs which is a sizable increase over the previous average of 300 rehabilitated annually.
