### Coast Raid Nets \$100,000 in Counterfeit Money



One hundred thousand dollars in counterfeit money was recently seized by secret service agents and San Jose, Cal., police, climaxing months of investigation into the sources of bogus \$5 bills which have flooded nearly every major city in the country during the last two years. Tracing sales of the spurious notes to a small cottage, government agents discovered a huge cache behind a wooden wall in the basement. A closet containing 100 fruit jars, each holding \$1000 in bogus money, was discovered in the fake wall. According to police, Sam Bongiorno (right) recently sold \$1000 of the bills for \$800; this, they said, was the "key to the situation." Top photo shows how money was stored. ### Plan Enclosure, Historic Burial Site Near Scio

SCIO—Woven wire fence soon will enclose historical Providence church and cemetery, situated a few miles southeast of Scio, according to W. L. Swearingen, farmer near this city, who, with many others of the community, is assisting in achieving the goal set a few years ago. Steel posts are set in the ground a depth of about two feet and the fence is secured in a manner calculated to last for many years. At the approach, or west front of the enclosure, are two large brick posts on which the gates are to be swung. A marble memorial to the founder, Job Powell, early-day circuit rider of western Oregon, has been on the grounds for several years. Powell and several associates established the historic Baptist church there in April, 1855, and christened it Providence church. R. E. Peery is secretary of the association.
