

Report on Liquor Control Released

Rigid Inspection Is Made now; 254 Arrests Are Made, 1937 Total

PORTLAND, Jan. 24.—(P)—Oregon Liquor control commission inspectors completed 32,269 inspections in the last six months of 1937. The semi-annual report released by Otto J. Runte, administrator, showed:

Every licensed establishment in the state was required to meet commission regulations, with particular stress upon sanitation, before a 1938 license was granted, Runte said.

The commission, during the period, issued 2515 violation warrants and 414 violation tickets. Seven licenses were revoked, 85 were suspended for an aggregate of 953 days and 52 wholesalers and salesmen were suspended from selling to certain retailers for a total of 5467 days. Forty-eight retailers were suspended from buying from certain wholesalers for a total of 5203 days.

Inspectors arrested 254 defendants in 260 cases, resulting in 164 case convictions and 200 defendant convictions. Fines totaled \$9265.40 and imprisonments 7,533 days.

Investigations resulted in many refusals of applications for renewals of licenses, Runte said.

Rosamond Pinchot Listed as Suicide

OYSTER BAY, N. Y., Jan. 24.—(P)—Tall, golden-haired Rosamond Pinchot, socially prominent actress who attained fame at 17 in the religious spectacle "The Miracle," was found dead of carbon monoxide poisoning in the garage of her Long Island estate near here today.

The death officially was listed as suicide. She was 32.

Miss Pinchot was the daughter of Amos D. E. Pinchot, republican lawyer, and a niece of former Gov. Gifford Pinchot of Pennsylvania.

She had been estranged several years from her husband, William Gaston, a lawyer.

The body seated in her closed car was found by her cook.

desirability of such holding firms. President Roosevelt recently expressed the opinion they should be eliminated.

Glass, one-time secretary of the treasury and author of much federal banking legislation, said his measure was not an administration bill, but that he had discussed it with Secretary Morgenthau.

The elderly Virginian added it would not affect branch banking. Reporters recalled immediately Mr. Roosevelt had disavowed last week his remarks against holding companies generally meant he was opposed to branch banking.

Funds for Bridge Changes Approved

WASHINGTON, Jan. 24.—(P)—Secretary Woodring approved today \$98,000 allotment for bridges across the Columbia river at Cascade Locks and Hood River, Ore. The war department said the funds would be used for completion of alterations now in progress.

Congress last year authorized the engineers to alter the bridges to make possible navigation by ocean-going vessels in the pool formed by Bonneville dam.

Bear Sleeping in Haystack Roused, Fights Intruders

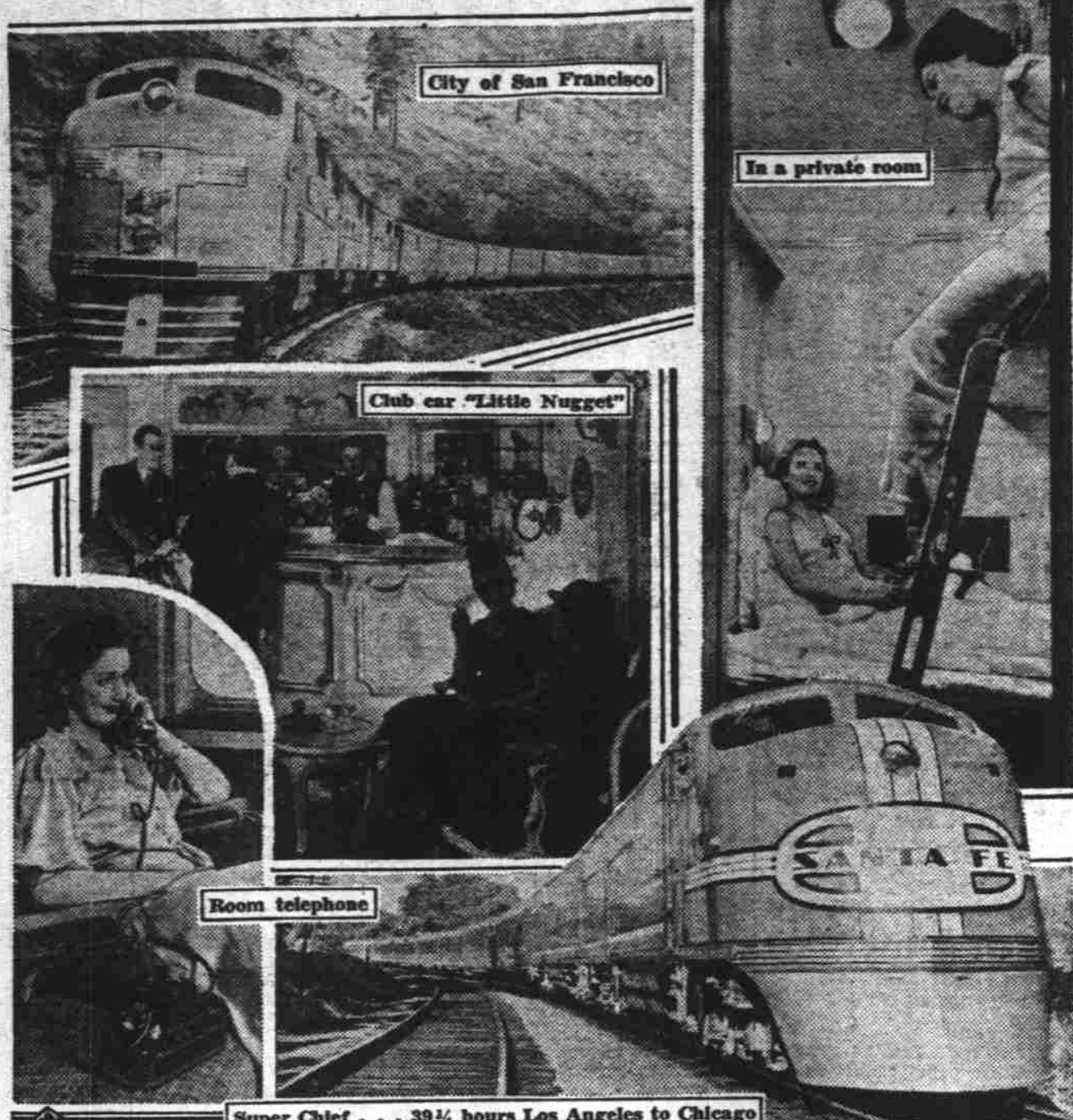

The startled men drew back. The bear took after one of the helpers. Trichman said he drove the bleary-eyed animal away, and the last he saw of the brute it was ambulating over a mountain, probably in search of another place to sleep.

The bear presumably burrowed into the haystack last fall to hibernate, the buffalo keeper said.

Coast to Bid for Shipbuilding Work

PORTLAND, Jan. 24.—(P)—The Pacific coast, and Portland, may get a share of ship building contracts if the merchant marine program of Joseph P. Kennedy, chairman of the maritime commission, is adopted.

Mayor Joseph Carson, who returned today from Washington where he testified before congressional labor and marine committees, reported strong congressional sentiment favoring Kennedy's plan for an augmented merchant marine to serve as an adjunct to the navy in a national emergency.

"There is every reason to believe congress will authorize appropriations for more ships at this session," Carson said.

"Portland will get into the business if any contracts are designated for the coast."

Longshore Tie-up Threatened Again

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 24.—(P)—Developments in the AFL-CIO fight for control of longshoremen have brought a definite threat of a new Pacific coast waterfront tie-up. Harry Bridges, Pacific coast longshoremen's president and west coast CIO chieftain, told Secy. of Labor Frances Perkins in a telegram today.

The immediate reason for the threatened tie-up, Bridges said, is the receivership established last week in Los Angeles on the order of Superior Judge Ruben S. Schmidt over the funds and possessions of San Pedro longshoremen.

Judge Schmidt named Will Hays, an AFL longshoreman, receiver for the San Pedro local on an action brought in the name of the AFL International Longshoremen's association, local 38-82.

Mob Violence at Reedsport Feared

ROSEBURG, Jan. 24.—(P)—Deputy Sheriff H. M. McCabe said William Dewitt Chandler, 53, a WPA worker, was rushed to the county jail here Sunday to avoid possible mob action by angered Reedsport residents after his arrest on a charge of attempted criminal assault of a five-year-old girl.

He said Chandler was alleged to have lured the child to an abandoned cabin, and that a man living nearby saw the pair enter and arrived in time to save the child from serious harm.

The deputy said the girl was badly frightened and bruised on the face and arms.

Mystery Develops In Wright's Trial

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 24.—(P)—Elements of mystery entered the "triangle" murder trial of Paul A. Wright, 38-year-old former airport president, today.

Prosecution and defense went into the most minute details on certain angles of the case. On the face of them, the exact purport of many questions was not evident. Both sides, however, apparently were laying foundations for something to be cleared up later.

Chief Pros. Ernest Roll closely examined two ambulance drivers, two surgeons and a mortuary aide, variously, as to positions of the bodies of Wright's victims—his wife, Evelyn, 29, and his friend, John Kimmel, 32, and as to their clothing.

For a reason not made plain today, both Roll and Defense Counsel Jerry Giesler meticulously examined Harry T. Meredith, ambulance driver, on his testimony that Kimmel caught hold of a door-knob as he was being carried out of the Wright home. Meredith said he rapped Kimmel's wrist to make him let go.

Bonneville Funds Sought by Pierce

WASHINGTON, Jan. 24.—(P)—A \$11,450,000 appropriation for Bonneville dam will be asked of the house appropriations committee tomorrow by Representative Pierce (D-Ore).

Budget estimates proposed only \$1,450,000 but Pierce will recommend another \$10,000,000 to be supplied in two deficiency bills.

"We have the project and the power and now we should get it out to the people," he said today.

He said he would ask \$6,000,000 for transmission lines which, he said, should be built from Bonneville to Grand Coulee by way of Unadilla. This line would cost an estimated \$7,000,000 Pierce explained.

Testimony all in On Rate Request

WASHINGTON, Jan. 24.—(P)—A brief truce between railroad operators and shippers began today when the interstate commerce commission concluded hearings on the proposed 15 per cent increase in railroad freight rates.

During the remainder of the week commissioners will study a mass of testimony—all of which has been duly entered in the records—preparatory to opening oral arguments on the railroad's plea January 31.

Partridge Tells Of "Higher ups" In Bombing Plot

SEATTLE, Jan. 24.—(P)—Immigration Solicitor J. P. Boyd, Jr., said George Partridge, confessed participant in an anti-Japanese ship bombing plot, said late today three men "put him on the spot" when he attempted to withdraw from the plot in Vancouver, B. C.

His account gave impetus to the search for "higher ups." They have been sought since Partridge was arrested at Smith Cove and Rolphe M. Forsyth was drowned Thursday while pushing a dynamite bomb toward the motorship Hiye Maru.

Boyd said he questioned Partridge, a carpenter's apprentice, at the request of Immigration Comm. Marie A. Proctor.

"When I left my room in Vancouver and started to sneak out the alley and avoid meeting Forsyth at the dock, three men approached me," Boyd quoted Partridge. "One of them said to me, 'You're going with Forsyth. Go up and get your suitcase or it will be too bad for you.'"

Rock Hurtles and Kills 2 Students

WELCH, W. Va., Jan. 24.—(P)—Part of a 10-ton rock which hurtled down a mountain to tear a 12-foot hole through the Elk-horn negro high school today killed two students.

A teacher and three other students were hurt.

The section of rock which crashed through the roof to the basement of the two-story brick building weighed more than a ton.

Utility Districts Election Forecast

PORTLAND, Jan. 24.—(P)—The Journal said today Oregon voters might pass on three proposed public utility districts in the May primary election.

One would include parts of Clackamas, Washington, Columbia, Clatsop, Yamhill, Lincoln and Polk counties, the others being in Linn and Marion counties.

Similar propositions in Lane and Wasco counties, where incorrect petitions have been withdrawn and new ones substituted, were expected to reach the voters in the fall.

Petitions have also been circulated in Multnomah county and in the Mount Hood district.

Powdered Soap in Prison Hash Puts Many in Hospital

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 24.—(P)—A disgruntled Lincoln Heights jail prisoner placed powdered soap in the breakfast hash of 63 fellow prisoners today and all of them became so violently ill they had to be taken to General hospital.

Jail officials said one of the prisoners was angered because of his failure to be made a trusty, and that he placed the soap in several of the 18 pans of hash served this morning. Five of the prisoners were said to be seriously ill.

Thirty-five of the prisoners became ill at the police pistol range where they were working, and 23 were stricken in the jail.

Transport Plane Fights bad Storm And Lands Safely

NEW YORK, Jan. 25.—(Tuesday)—(P)—Eastern Airlines reported at 8:05 today (EST) that its passenger plane, held aloft for

five hours by bad weather, had landed safely at Hartford, Conn. The plane left Newark airport at 8:30 o'clock last night for Washington, but the pilot turned back after bucking headwinds.

Unable to land at Newark, it cruised in that section for some time, then was reported to be circling near Philadelphia. It had also been reported in the vicinity of Bridgeport, Conn.

The East Hartford (Conn.) airport quickly confirmed that the airliner, carrying five persons, landed perfectly at Rentschler field a few minutes before 3 a. m. (EST).

Over Half of Mill Men Back at Work

PORTLAND, Jan. 24.—(P)—Approximately 1500 of Portland's 2500 sawmill employees were back at work today with reopening of the Jones Lumber company.

The mill, closed since the start of an AFL-CIO jurisdictional dispute last August, said a full crew of 175 would be employed by the end of the week.

The Clark & Wilson plant resumed operations today with 500 men after the weekend shutdown. It opened for three days last week, the first time in five months.

Labor affiliation was not questioned and mill managers said no contracts had been signed with either union.

Other operating mills are the Inman-Poulsen, West Oregon and B. F. Johnson.

Tame Bull Sought For Use in Films

PENDLETON, Ore., Jan. 24.—(P)—Theodore Reed, Hollywood motion picture director, called on the Pendleton Round-up board today to aid in a search for a trustworthy bull to be used in a bull fight sequence in the forthcoming picture "Tropic Holiday," with Martha Raye.

A telegram from Reed asked for a "contented, bull," explaining that "we cannot risk Miss Raye with an unruly animal."
