Billion More for Naval Building and Army's Expansion Sought

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efficiently and solely upon the piling up of additional land and sea armaments in other countries, in such manner as to involve a threat to world peace and security." He promised to continue his efforts at arms reduction by international agreement.

His proposals were:
(1) An authorization of \$8,000,000 for increased army anti-aircraft weapons; \$5,000,000 of the sum to be spent in the next fiscal year.

(2) An expenditure of \$450,000 for the better establishment of an enlisted reserve for the army.

(3) An expenditure of \$5,000,000 for gauges, dies and other "aids to manufacture" of army materials, \$5,000,000 to be spent in the next fiscal year.

(4) An appropriation of \$2,000,000 for ammunition for the army.

(5) A 20 per cent increase in the naval building program.

(6) The immediate laying down of two battleships and two cruisers in addition to the two battleships already planned for this year and two already started.

(7) An appropriation of \$15,000,000 for the construction of small naval vessels on an experimental basis.

(8) The enactment of legislation "aimed at the prevention of profiteering in time of war and the equalization of the burdens of possible war."

Immediate Independence For Philippines Favored

MANILA, Jan. 28-(P)—Opponents of Pres. Manuel Quezon today endorsed a movement in the United States congress to give the Philippines immediate independence without benefit of trade relations provided in the present plan to free the islands in 1946.

Idaho Has Forest Blaze in January

BOISE, Jan. 28-(P)—A January forest fire blazed Thursday, said Payette national forest officials, along Timber creek near Oia, 40 miles north of here.

The fire, lightning-set, covered but a small area. Rangers broke through deep snow to extinguish it.

Rare Tapestries Stolen, Regained

NEW YORK, Jan. 28-(P)—A thorough-going detective job in three widely separated cities was responsible for the recovery of six rare 17th century Gobelin tapestries stolen from a New York warehouse more than five years ago.

The tapestries, woven from designs by the famous Dutch artist, Peter Paul Rubens, and depicting scenes from Homer's Odyssey, have been found in Cleveland as the result of an attempt to sell them to the Boston Museum of Fine Arts, said James W. Ryan, attorney for the Morgan Brothers warehouse.

They were being held temporarily in the warehouse in June, 1932, when they were stolen. They belonged to the Fox Film corporation, but later the corporation went into receivership and as a result of ensuing litigation, ownership passed to the warehouse.

Policeman Killed, Pawnshop Holdup

NEW YORK, Jan. 28-(P)—Five young gunmen shot their way out of a police trap in a Bronx pawnshop holdup today, killing one policeman and wounding another, but only three of the five escaped.

One, identified by police as a killer who had served time in an insane asylum, was shot in the throat and taken to a hospital under guard. Another, listed as George DeRenzio, 25, paroled robber, was captured after a short chase.

Sgt. David Kilpatrick, 56, who arrived at the pawnshop in a police radio car just as the gunmen were about to leave, was shot four times, twice as he lay prostrate. He died on the way to a hospital.

His companion, Patrolman Royal W. Pollitt, felled one of the holdup men before a bullet creased his chest, tore through his uniform and shattered his right arm.

Explosion Traced; Is Just Charivari

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 28-(P)—Visions of a milk war drew thousands of persons into west Portland hills tonight when rolling explosions and the beat of a whistle sounded from the Pleasant View dairy.

Windows were shaken for miles around. Explosions became more rapid. Investigating police found a charivari for John Lehman and his bride—with a case of dynamite and a steam whistle for noise makers.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 28-(P)—Congressman Walter Pierce of Oregon appealed to the house appropriations committee today to increase money for Bonneville dam transmission lines from \$1,450,000 to \$6,000,000.

Office Hours Are Cut by US Steel

PITTSBURGH, Jan. 28-(P)—White collar workers of the United States Steel corporation, from the board's chairman, Myron C. Taylor, to the office boys, were been notified tonight of a "share work" plan which would amount to a pay reduction of approximately nine per cent.

A high authority, confirming the reduction, estimated that between 20,000 and 25,000 workers would be involved.

Under the plan, effective February 1, the office and executive forces will be placed on a five-day week, instead of the present five and one-half day schedule.

ATHENS, Jan. 28-(P)—Fifteen persons, including three army officers, were arrested tonight for participation in an alleged plot to assassinate Premier General John Metaxas, Greece's "strong man."

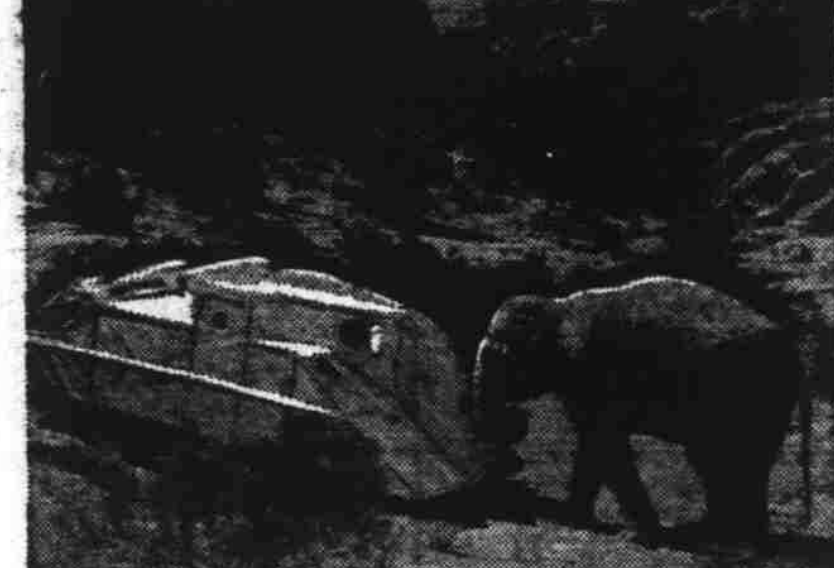

About Stamps

Hello, fellow collectors: I doubt if many people today know when the first United States postage stamps were issued. They were first issued on July 1, 1847.

Until that time postmasters marked letters with pen and ink or hand stamps. These were known as "postmaster's stamps" or "provisionals."

Contracts for manufacture of the stamps were at first awarded to private manufacturers. On July 1, 1894, the printing of stamps was transferred to the bureau of engraving and printing. All postage stamps issued since then have been produced there.

The series of 1847 was composed of two stamps. The first, a five-cent light brown, was of Benjamin Franklin. The second, a 10-cent black, was of George Washington. They were very plain looking stamps compared to those of today. Nevertheless, today those two stamps are very valuable because of the scarcity of them. Some of these early stamps are sold at several hundred, and in some cases, thousands of dollars apiece.
