As a result, he said, dogs owned by citizens living along the city limits from Silvertown road to the state hospital have been poisoned.

New Subdivisions Forecast, Fisher

Real Estate Development in District to Follow Housing Enactment

Numerous new subdivisions will be started in Salem within a short time, according to the prediction of Hugh Fisher, county surveyor, made in the course of an address at the Salem Realty board luncheon on Friday noon. He based the forecast partly on the new housing legislation in congress.

In describing the procedure required for platting, Fisher pointed out that within six miles of Salem's city limits the city planning and zoning commission has authority to approve or disapprove the plat; that the county court also must approve, no matter where the property is situated, and that the county clerk and assessor must also be consulted. Property on which there are liens cannot be platted, although this does not include mortgages.

Streets must be 60 feet wide according to the zoning commission's regulations but on some isolated subdivisions 40-foot streets have been permitted, he said. The streets must coincide with those of adjoining subdivisions, to avoid the jobs which exist in older portions of Salem due to lack of such regulation in the past.

Mr. Fisher, in response to questions, explained why some old surveys in the county do not coincide, pointing out that when the first surveys were made, error of 49 1/2 feet per mile was condoned because of the cost involved in making them more accurate.

Trades and Labor Council to Direct Union, Is Announcement

All offices of the Salem local of the Cannery Workers and Farm Laborers union have been declared vacant by the Salem Trades and Labor council's organization committee, W. A. Chambers, chairman, announced last night. The declaration includes the office of president, which has been held by Alvin B. Plummer, who is now awaiting grand jury hearing on a charge of assault and battery upon a relief worker.

The committee acted "for the best interests of the cannery workers and to aid their organization work," Chambers declared. "Our action leaves the cannery workers directly in the hands of the organization committee of the trades and labor council."

Committee to Direct
Chambers said it was the committee's intention to direct the cannery local's activities during its present formative stage. Other officers of the local included Olive Pence, financial secretary; Opal Mize, recording secretary and Roy Gray, treasurer.

Plummer also has been president of the state council of cannery and agricultural workers. The Cannery Workers and Farm Laborers local here holds a charter directly from the AFL.

Vocational School Project Outlined

T. T. Mackenzie, director of vocational education in the Salem school system, presented a resume of the accomplishment of vocational and extension classes here at the Salem Retail Credit association luncheon meeting yesterday.

Mackenzie outlined a course for credit grants available through the vocational education set-up and explained classes any local sponsoring unit would have to match half the funds for an instructor for such a class.

Howard Grimm was named chairman of a committee to make a further study of starting a credit grantor's class. Seven new members attended the association luncheon yesterday.

Plan two Bridges For Niagara Falls

NIAGARA FALLS, N.Y., Jan. 28.—(AP)—Engineers planned tonight for two new archways linking Canada and the United States in full view of the falls, while the famous Falls View bridge lay, a heap of twisted steel, across the bottom of the ice choked Niagara gorge.

While International Railway company officials announced a decision to replace the ruined "Honey moon bridge" immediately, T. B. McJestien, minister of highways for Ontario, said another bridge was planned by Ontario province and New York state about 1,000 feet downstream from the Falls View site.

He said plans of the railway company to replace the fallen structure would not affect the plans for another span nearby.

Refusal of CIO Cargo Demanded

REDWOOD CITY, Calif., Jan. 28.—(AP)—Walter F. Murphy, port manager, said an AFL carpenters' union had asked him today to prevent the movement of a \$15,000 lumber cargo received recently from a CIO mill in Oregon.

Murphy said the request was accompanied by a threat of picketing. The port manager said union officials told him national officers had ruled CIO materials should not be handled. Murphy said he was puzzled by the request because similar cargoes were handled constantly in San Francisco.

Former Pendleton Mayor To Run for State Senate

PENDLETON, Jan. 28.—(AP)—George R. Lewis, city attorney and former mayor, said today he would seek the democratic nomination for state senator from Umatilla, Union and Morrow counties. The incumbent is Rex Ellis, Pendleton republican.

Aurora's Municipal Tax Millage Is Lowest and Aumsville's Highest in County; Towns' Assessments Listed

The town of Aumsville stands out on the 1938 Marion county tax rolls as the municipality of not only second from the lowest assessed valuation, \$34,454, but also the highest city tax rate, 32 mills, according to Assessor R. "Ted" Shelton's annual summary.

Donald with the lowest valuation, \$25,950, has a 29.2 mill city levy this year while Aurora has levied at the lowest rate, 5.2 mills, on a valuation of \$74,774.

Kidnaper of Ross Annuity Measure Believed Indicted Filed by Eastman

CHICAGO, Jan. 28.—(AP)—Swagging John Henry Seadlund was reported to have been indicted by a federal grand jury today for the \$50,000 kidnaping of Charles S. Ross.

Prosecutors planning to seek the death penalty in the forthcoming trial ushered eight witnesses to the jurors' room. They also presented the witness's 27-page confession and photographs pertaining to the crime.

The indictment was expected to be returned next Monday with Seadlund's arraignment to follow on Tuesday or Wednesday.

Old Petitions to Aid Circulators

Petitions filed in last summer's attempt to recall County Judge John C. Siegmund are being utilized as a source of signers in the new recall movement begun last Wednesday, it developed yesterday.

Two young woman typists who said they were working for Jay S. Baker, recall leader, spent the day at the county clerk's office listing from the old petitions the names of citizens who had been certified to by the clerk as those of legal, registered voters. The old petitions contained 3372 signatures so certified. A total of 4161 is required to force a recall vote.

Epworth Herald's Editor to Speak

Dr. W. E. J. Gratz of Chicago, editor of the Epworth Herald, religious publication, will address a meeting of the Salem district Epworth League at Leslie M.E. church here Wednesday night, February 9.

Dr. Gratz will spend two days in Oregon, and will be in Portland Tuesday, February 8, when he will address a night meeting of the Portland district Epworth League. He will also meet with the Oregon EL council the afternoon of February 9.

He is stopping here while enroute to California to speak at mid-year rallies in that state.

Gas Firm Shows Loss, Would Quit

The Coos Bay Gas company with headquarters at Marshfield, has filed application with the state utilities commissioner here for permission to discontinue operations.

A financial statement accompanying the request indicated that the company had a net loss of \$7500 in 1937.

Portland Port Okehs New Battleship Site

PORTLAND, Jan. 28.—(AP)—The port of Portland commission has approved an ordinance for the berthing of the battleship Oregon at the Jefferson street levee. Civic committees have started a campaign for funds to transfer the old war craft from the Broadway bridge to a marine park.

Columbia Defense Need Is Stressed

Martin Reminds Roosevelt of Agreement, Tongue Point Naval Base

Need for developing adequate naval defense facilities at the mouth of the Columbia river in connection with the federal naval expansion program, was stressed in a letter sent to President Roosevelt yesterday by Governor Charles H. Martin.

"You will recall that the Helm and Park boards recommended development of a naval operating base at the mouth of the Columbia river in 1919, at which time you were assistant secretary of the navy," Governor Martin's letter read.

"In response to a request from the navy department the people of Clatsop county bonded themselves for \$100,000 to purchase the site at Tongue Point. This site is in accordance with the request of the navy department was needed free and unencumbered to the navy with a definite understanding that it would be used as a naval operating base."

Agreement Not Kept

"Subsequent economies resulted in holding the program of further development in abeyance. The people of Oregon feel that the navy department has not lived up to its part of the contract. You know from your visits to Oregon of the strategic importance and value of the Columbia river and its drainage basin. You recognized the economic future and importance of the area to the nation at large by approving construction of Bonneville dam which is important in the history and development of Oregon as the original discovery and exploration by Captain Gray and the Lewis and Clark expedition.

"You sincerely feel that it would be extremely unwise to leave so great a treasure unprotected and that you will see the wisdom of granting further insurance for your great gift to the area."

Noland Case Goes To Portland Jury

PORTLAND, Jan. 28.—(AP)—A jury considered a charge of assault with a dangerous weapon tonight as the milk bottle assault trial of Keylor Noland, 23, former Portland symphony orchestra violinist and son of a Walla Walla attorney, drew to a close.

In instructions to the jury of seven men and two women, Circuit Judge Fred W. Wilson, The Dalles, said "I charge you that he who is the aggressor in an affray can not invoke the right of self defense."

Noland testified he masqueraded in woman's clothing as a prank and entered a Reed college dormitory to visit his sweetheart. He said Miss Wynifred Ayres, 24, instructor, grappled with him, and he struck her with a milk bottle in self defense.

Miss Ayres testified the assault was unprovoked.
