Huskies Edge out Webfoots by 40-37

Stalling Game Protects Lead

Close Entire Route With Oregon Point Ahead at Rest Period

SEATTLE, Jan. 28.—(P)—Out-running the long-legged Oregon Webfoots, the Washington Huskies grabbed the first game of their two-game series with the favored Ducks before 8,000 fans here tonight, 40 to 37.

It was a sizzling, see-saw battle all the way, with Washington taking the lead nine times and Oregon six, and with the score tied five times.

The turning point came when Substitute Bill McDonald calmly dropped two free throws to give Washington a 37 to 35 lead. Bob Reese followed with a field goal and Dick Voelker a free throw to put Washington ahead at 40-35.

In the last four minutes, Oregon gained possession of the ball only twice—on free throws, Pavlunas and Gale converting them. In the last two minutes the Huskies didn't relinquish the ball, and ran the Ducks ragged as they passed around the floor protecting their lead.

Both teams lost three men via the personal foul route, Silver, Anet and Johansen going out for Oregon and Lockhart, Williamson and Werner being retired for Washington.

Oregon took a 20 to 19 half-time lead.

Oregon retained first place in northern division standings, despite tonight's loss to the second place Huskies. They play here again tomorrow night.
