

### Soil Depleting Goals Released

Marion County Listed for 2209 Acres Potatoes; 106,156 General

CORVALLIS, Feb. 10.—(P)—The state AAA committee announced today general soil depleting goals under the agricultural conservation program, and special potato goals in 18 counties containing commercial producing areas.

N. C. Donaldson, state secretary, said no compulsory features were attached to the program, but that farmers could earn their full soil conservation payments only by conforming to their proportion of the county quota.

The potato goals, he said, indicated a maximum commercial acreage under normal conditions. Klamath county led with a goal of 16,884 acres, followed by Clackamas with 5448 acres and Washington, Deschutes, Malheur, Marion

and Multnomah with more than 2,000 each.

General soil depleting goals were largest in the Columbia basin wheat area and smallest in the grass pasture counties on the coast.

Upon returning here he was married to a long-time friend, Mrs. Harriett Kaye Wells, July, 1930, who survives as do two brothers, George of Portland, Monroe of Silverton; two sisters, Mrs. Emma Anderson of Independence, and Mrs. Etta Kings, Plainview, New Jersey.
