"Fire Over England" Is Sponsored by AAUW

The Conquest of the Armada is only one of the stirring portions in the British film "Fire Over England," which is being shown at the State theatre next Wednesday and Thursday, under the sponsorship of the American Association of University Women.

Flora Robson, the distinguished English actress who was the Russian Empress, who plays Elizabeth the Great, gives a fine and human characterization as Elizabeth, England's "Virgin Queen," who put her country's welfare before her heart's desire.

Lawrence Oliver plays the part of Michael Inghby, an impetuous youth whose life is motivated by determination to serve his Queen and at the same time avenge the death of his father, burned by the Spanish Inquisition. Michael gets his chance to do both when Elizabeth entrusts him with the danger-taught mission of visiting King Philip of Spain and discovering the names of the English conspirators who are helping to plot her death.

Others included in the cast are Vivien Leigh, who plays Cynthia, Michael's sweetheart, and Elizabeth's lady-in-waiting; Raymond Massey as King Philip of Spain; Leslie Banks as the Earl of Leicester, who loved and was loved by the Queen; Tamara Desni, and Morton Selten.

The play, which has been produced with great attention to historical detail in costumes, sets, and background, is an adventurous, exciting adaptation of A. E. W. Mason's popular novel, "Fire Over England."
