Tuberculin Tests Given Total 110

One of the major activities of the Marion county department of health last week was tuberculin tests were given and more will be given Monday at Parrish and Tuesday at Silverton. Sixteen people were fluoroscoped and special examinations were held yesterday and will be conducted Monday at the tuberculosis sanitarium. Vaccinations given totaled 109. Cases of smallpox are still being discovered. The health department nurses made 51 visits to schools, 316 children were inspected, 119 school children examined by doctors. The sanitary inspector inspected one tourist camp, two schools, two dairies and five city water supplies. All municipal water supplies are inspected once a month by the health department.

Cold was general over much of the south and one of the heaviest snowstorms in several years swept into central Missouri. The indicated crest of the big Arkansas river flood was revised slightly downward today by the weather bureau with a stage of 30.5 expected at Little Rock on Monday compared with a previous predicted crest of 31 feet. Flood stage here is 23 feet. The river reached 24.2 today.

Sawmills Resume Operation Monday

PORTLAND, Feb. 19 (AP)—Eight of Portland's 10 sawmills were scheduled to operate next week, bringing mill employment to the highest point since major operation was paralyzed by an AFL-CIO jurisdictional dispute last August.

More than 1700 men, or two-thirds of the number employed last summer, will be back at work Monday. The AFL and CIO each claim the allegiance of employees of four mills.

Claim Confession In Bombing Case

PORTLAND, Feb. 19 (AP)—Detective Capt. John J. Keegan, directing police investigation of bombings attributed to labor disputes, today made public a statement he said was signed by James Scott, 30, business agent for an AFL war veterans' union, denouncing bombings here and at Stevenson, Wash.

Scott, Leroy Cooper, teamsters' union official, and Jake Minsky, a chauffeur, were taken to Stevenson today and arraigned on a charge of endangering life and property by placing a bomb in a truck in 1935. They were held in default of \$15,000 bond each.

Polar Scientists Finally Rescued

MOSCOW, Feb. 19 (AP)—Two sturdy icebreaking vessels smashed through a field of pack ice 10 feet deep today and rescued four Russian scientists with their valuable records and equipment from a drifting ice floe camp off the eastern coast of Greenland. The rescue, just two days short of nine months after the four men were established a dozen miles from the north pole, ended a unique odyssey in which they voyaged over more than 1,000 miles of arctic seas on a raft of ice.

A terse radio message from the rescue expedition at 5:30 p. m. (9:30 a. m. EST) announced: "Papanin, Fedoroff, Shirshoff and Krenkel, with all equipment, removed from ice floe by Taimyr and Murman which are proceeding to Murmansk."

Compton Is Sued Over Bridge Fall

McMINNVILLE, Feb. 19 (AP)—The state highway commission sought \$4750 damages from J. C. Compton of McMinnville in a suit on file here, involving the collapse of the Pacific highway bridge over the south Yamhill river last spring.

The complaint alleges Compton's truck and trailer, driven by Herbert Benham and carrying a power shovel which extended too high, was crossing the span when the accident occurred.

Wagoner Is Entry In Governor Race

Clarence R. Wagoner of Portland announced Saturday through a Salem "Wagoner for Governor League" that he would be a candidate for the republican nomination for governor. F. G. Delano heads the Salem organization supporting Wagoner.

Mr. Wagoner in a letter declares that he has been important to run because of the efforts to harmonize the republican party along liberal lines. Mr. Wagoner continued, and it is with the hope of assisting in this movement that he responded to appeals that he run, he concluded.

Month Still Has No Traffic Death

Friday was the 18th consecutive day without a traffic fatality in Oregon, Secretary of State Earl Snell reported.

"The significance of this record is apparent when we recall that during the past two years traffic deaths in Oregon have averaged almost one per day," Snell said.

"We have checked all our available records since January 1, 1934, and never until this January has a single week passed without at least one fatality."

Terms of new Pact With Schuschnigg Regime to Be Told, Forecast

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trial was thrown open to the Nazis.

Thus the Nazis, whose party is outlawed in Austria, would gain political rights without violation of the Austrian constitution which provides for but the one party.

Austrian sources reported Schuschnigg in return gained a pledge that Austria's independence would be respected and it also was believed he had gained a modification of Hitler's religious policies.

This latter is important if closer cooperation with Germany is to find favor with Austria's large Catholic population.

Through pro-Nazi Austrian ministers, German leaders in Berlin expected Austrian and German policies on economics, trade, diplomacy and military affairs henceforth would dovetail.

LONDON, Feb. 19 (AP)—Anthony Eden, standing almost single-handed in the British cabinet against a "deal" with Italy, was reported reliably tonight as ready to resign as foreign minister in a break with Prime Minister Neville Chamberlain.

Absence of Eden from the cabinet would strike a severe blow to the national government's support. "The White Knight of Geneva," who refuses to be swayed from the League of Nations way, commands strong conservative backing that might split the country's dominant party.

One reliable source reported two conservative cabinet members, Minister of Agriculture William Morrison and Walter Elliot, secretary of state for Scotland, had stated flatly they supported Eden, leading to a belief they would resign if the foreign secretary quit.

Eden's breach with the prime minister dwarfed even the treacherous issue that caused it—proposals for an agreement with Italy that might be construed as British submission to fascist strength following so quickly after Reichsfuehrer Adolf Hitler's deal with Austria.

Survivors include two brothers, Willard and George, one sister, Mrs. Carl Specht, and seven nieces and nephews.

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the assistant attorney general in regard to this and at that time we told him that we had taken the matter up with our county court.

County Commissioner Leroy Hewlett, first to be queried concerning what action the court had taken on the letter, declared "they could do a lot better closer at home, investigating some of the places here in Salem."

Hewlett said he would vote the money requested "if I am convinced there is a need for it."

County Judge John C. Siegmund said he did not believe at the time there was any need for the expenditure and if there had been, the county had no fund from which it could have drawn for such purposes, he added. He declared the emergency fund was for use only in case of such serious emergencies as the destruction of a bridge by high water, for example.

"That fund is for epidemics and other real emergencies," the judge commented. "If they wanted any money for an undercover man they should have asked for it in their budget. But they didn't."

Commissioner Roy S. Melson said he had seen no necessity for granting the sheriff's request at the time it was made.

All the money the sheriff's office has budgeted for a particular purpose and none is allowed for hiring an outside man for investigations," Deputy Randall said.
