Schaeffer to Face Grand Jury; Story of Picket Line Affray Told

to report to A. N. "Al" Banks, Teamster business agent at the time. Each received \$5 for the trip, he said. He stated he did not know whether or not Schaeffer hit anyone.

Dist. Atty Lyle J. Page said Schaeffer's case would be investigated as well as the breaking of local barber shop and restaurant windows when the grand jury reconvenes Wednesday.

DALLAS, Feb. 21.—Al E. Rosser, teamster council secretary, and Leslie L. "Slim" Henry, Salem labor agent, were both arraigned in circuit court under newly-issued indictments this afternoon but neither entered a plea. No time for pleading was set by Circuit Judge Arlie G. Walker.

Rosser was released from the original indictment charging him with arson this afternoon but immediately re-indicted a long AFL hiring hall official, on the same type of charge, arising from the fire that destroyed the box factory at West Salem last November.

Before again adjourning subject to call, the grand jury also dismissed the arson indictment against Henry for lack of evidence and substituted an indictment charging him with attempting to coerce and compel another, Fred Rawlins, employee of the West Salem mill, to join a labor union October 20, 1937. The indictment also alleged he attempted to compel John S. Friesen, proprietor of the mill, and Earl Crabb, bookkeeper, to affiliate with the union, saying, "We are going to get you" and "more than one way to do this."

Witnesses examined by the grand jury included Henry, at his own request; Ernest Carson, John Newlands and Clarence Adams, who are facing arson charges; C. L. Roth, Water Man, Cuyler VanPelt and Municipal Judge A. Warren Jones of Salem; Friesen, Crabb and Lt. Clyde Warren of the state police. Judge Walker reduced Henry's bail requirement from \$50,000 to \$10,000 but set bail for Rosser and Adams at their original sums, \$100,000 and \$50,000, respectively. Neither Rosser nor Henry was represented in court by their attorneys today.

cause, Griffith said, but in refutation he quoted an address of the president in Portland as follows:

"I do not hold with those who advocate government ownership or government operation of all utilities. I state to you categorically that as a broad general rule the development of utilities should remain, with certain exceptions, a function for private initiative and private capital. It is by no means possible in every case for government to insure at all times from mere inspection, supervision and regulation that the public shall get a fair deal. In other words, to insure adequate service and reasonable rates, rates as low as you have in Portland where they are lower than in many other cities throughout the country."

The speaker went into some detail in discussing the low municipal power rate of Tacoma, Wash., explaining that being tax free, the utility there put money that would have gone into taxes, into a sinking fund and has paid off a large proportion of its capital debt.

Portland General Electric has a rate based upon "prudent investment": it is owned by the Portland Electric Power company but no "holding company fees" are paid and 70 per cent of the stock is owned by 10,000 Oregon residents, the speaker pointed out.

Earlier in his address he mentioned that Salem rates and rates in the rural districts, in many instances, are the same as those charged in Portland. He said Salem's rates were the lowest of any state capital city in the United States.

Wright Held Sane But Still in Jail

LOS ANGELES, Feb. 21.—(AP)—Paul A. Wright, who killed his wife and best friend, John Kimmel, was held sane today by Superior Judge Ben Lindsey who ruled, however, that he could not free the former airport manager for five days.

During this period, Judge Lindsey said, the district attorney's office or others might ask for a jury trial to determine if Wright is sane at present.

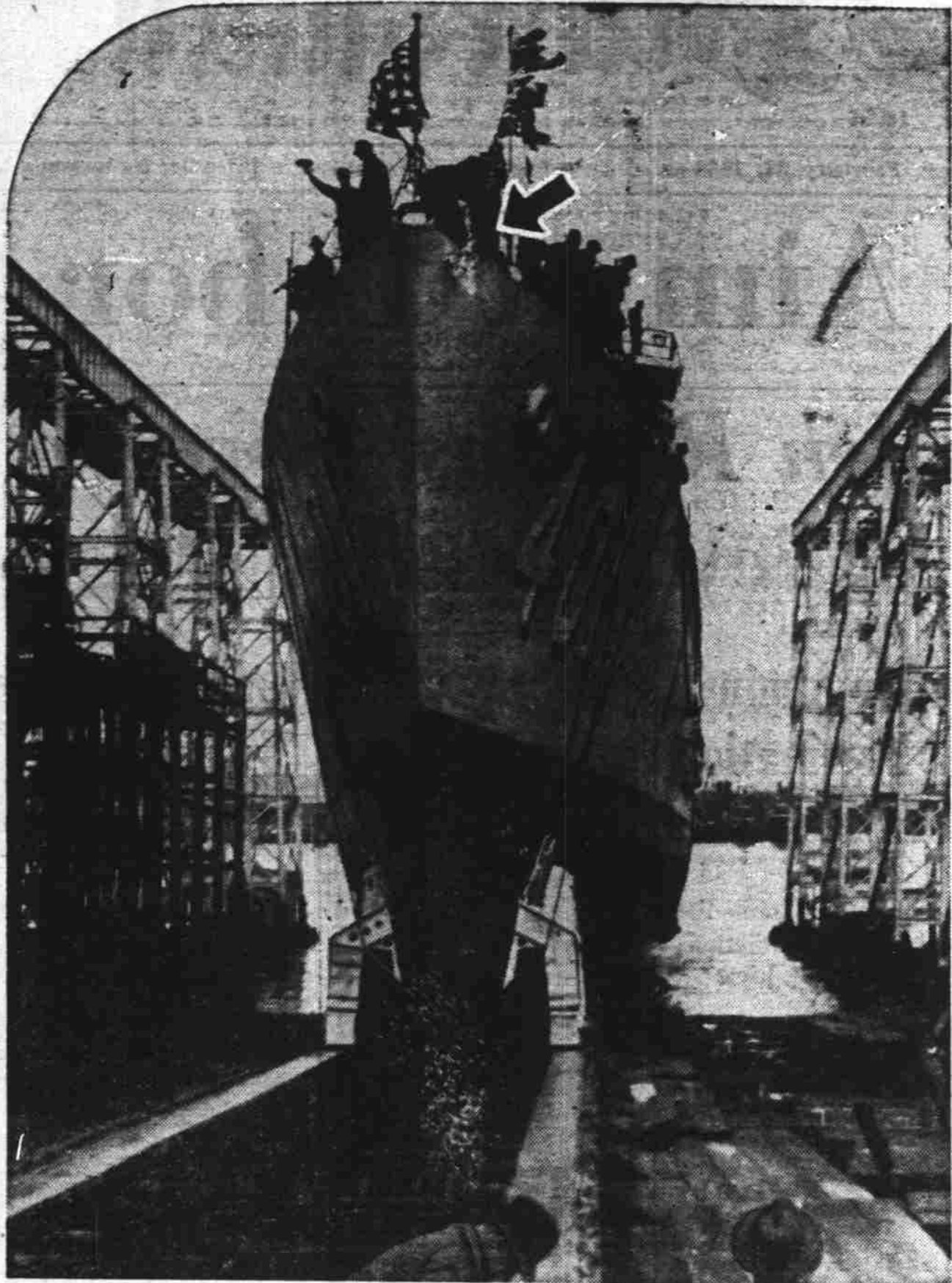
Wright was convicted of manslaughter in connection with the slaying of Mrs. Wright and Kimmel. The same jury then decided he was insane at the time of the tragedy.

Water Tax Issue Resolution Filed

"To get the matter before the council in understandable form," said Mayor V. E. Kuhn in regard to the resolution introduced at last night's council meeting by the Salem water commission, in which it stated that an excess of \$30,000 is owing Marion county in taxes by the city on property under control of the water commission for 1936, "it should be referred to the special water construction committee, utilities committee and city attorney for a clear report."

Alderman Fred A. Williams also said he believed it should command a report from the water construction committee, and said "we should determine our policy right away as to what we are going to do."

The council formally approved dispensing with the resolution by sending it to those committees outlined by Mayor Kuhn. In addition, and by motion of Alderman Dave O'Hara, the city attorney was also requested for a recommendation as to the proper procedure to get the matter into court. "The county insists payment, and the city claims it is exempt. It is purely a legal question," said O'Hara. "Absolutely," said Mayor Kuhn.

Hitler's self assurance considerably.

Hitler's boastful assertion Sunday that "whatever we have accomplished has been accomplished without the slightest aid from abroad" was considered a clear intimation that Germany, in the future, will take for herself whatever she thinks necessary without asking anybody's permission.

In this connection, Der Fuehrer's demand for return of Germany's war-lost colonies—aimed particularly at Great Britain—assumed added significance.

Hitler's recognition of Japanese dominated Manchukuo seemed to presage a day when Germany, having gained new territory, will expect other powers to show the same "realism" she now is showing Japan in East Asia and Italy in Ethiopia.

he said were needed "to curb the labor racketeer for the benefit of the laborer himself." He listed as needed legislation:

Amendment of the Norris-La-Guardia act "to preserve the inalienable American right to work"; a criminal act to stop picketing and picket practices where no labor dispute exists; tightness of exterior and battery statutes; and acts or a constitutional amendment to take the question of wages out of the realm of "trial by combat."

Labor and its unions must be made responsible and legally liable, Liljeqvist asserted, but the attempt to make labor unions incorporate is ill-advised, he asserted.

Other forum speakers included Franklin Kucera, who said all Salem service station and garage owners had organized to avert inroads by the teamsters' union a few months ago; Ray Kelly, Wasco county Associated Farmers trustee; State Senator C. W. Clark of Roseburg; T. V. Brown, F. W. Woolworth & Co. public relations manager; G. M. Hafenbrack, of the Oregon Creamery Manufacturers' association, and Jack Lynch, representing the Oregon state pharmaceutical association.

Mayor V. E. Kuhn welcomed the visiting merchants yesterday morning and Daniel Hay, acting state manager of the association, delivered the opening address. Carl W. Hogg of Salem was named convention chairman.

Reynolds Allen, chairman of the Salem Merchants association, responded to the mayor's welcome and B. A. Kliks, McMinnville, discussed cases he cited as injustices resulting from the acts of labor racketeers. Kliks chided merchants who had proven apathetic to encroachments by unscrupulous labor leaders upon private industry and business.

Washington Topic At Legion Session

A picture of George Washington not as the greatest general but as the inspirational leader of the movement that gave birth to the United States constitution was drawn on the sidewalk in front of the Legion today. The founder's birthday by George L. Koehn, Oregon national commit-tee man for the American Legion, declared last night before Capital Post No. 9 here.

The Legion, Koehn said, is backing this year's sesquicentennial celebration of the constitution's adoption because with its bill of rights it represents principles of liberty that are being swept steadily in other nations by "rulers of blood and iron." He discussed the history and meaning of the constitution and cited isms other than Americanism by way of contrast.

Koehn was honored after the meeting at a late luncheon in the Fraternal temple banquet room. The only major item of business transacted by the post was to go on record in support of mail subsidies for commercial aviation.

Unitarian Church Reopening Talked

Plans for the reopening of the Salem Unitarian church were discussed at a late luncheon in the fraternal temple banquet room of the congregation and Dr. Frederick M. Elliot of Boston, Mass., president of the American Unitarian association. Dr. Elliot was reported by Kenneth Randall, member of the local church board, as approving the plans. The board will meet next week to discuss the matter further.

The reopening of the church for regular services will not take place immediately but a series of three lectures probably will be sponsored by the organization soon with Rev. Richard M. Steiner, pastor of the Portland Unitarian church, as the speaker.

New Constitution Offered by Carol

BUCHAREST, Feb. 21.—(AP)—A drastically revised constitution centering greater power in the crown was offered Rumanians today by King Carol, who asked for quick national approval.

Adoption of the new constitution was regarded as a foregone conclusion in a plebiscite to be held Thursday, only three days after presentation to the country.

Russian Vessel Is Reported Boarded

TOKYO, Feb. 22.—(Tuesday)—(AP)—The newspaper Hochi Shimbun reported today the commanding officer of the Tsuruga fortified zone had forcibly boarded and examined a Russian ship found anchored in the Hakodate harbor after a snowstorm.

The newspaper said the commandant found the ship was a hydrographical vessel masquerading as a liner, and had a number of soviet navy officers and hydrographers aboard.

Southerners Win Anti-Lynch Fight

Filibuster Successful in Keeping From Vote; Bill Is Tabled

WASHINGTON, Feb. 21.—(AP)—Southern senators who have filibustered against the anti-lynching bill for 29 days won their fight today when the senate adjourned, 88 to 22, a motion by Democratic Leader Barkley of Kentucky to lay the measure aside.

Even Senators Wagner (D-NY) and Van Nuys (D-Ind.), authors of the bill, voted for Barkley's motion when it became apparent that the senate was in no mood to permit the struggle to continue. Sponsor Gives Up

Declaring that he had done all he could to obtain a vote on the measure, Barkley said in offering his motion that the country wanted the senate to proceed with other legislation which has been delayed. When his motion carried, the senate took up the \$250,000,000 deficiency appropriation for relief.

The southerners' victory was even more emphatic than the apparent success of the filibuster in the anti-lynching proposal back to languish on the calendar, the senate stripped it of its preferential status.

Confessions Marked "X" Same as Checks, Is Claim of Police

amount estimated at \$150 over a three-months period, and cashed them on several farmers in Marion and Polk counties. Nicholson and Farley said they had been working on the case off and on for two weeks, and Farley said he had arrested Myers in Yamhill in January for obtaining money under false pretenses, and that he was at present, at liberty by virtue of a parole from a 60-day jail sentence on that charge.

The Nolan boys, in their confession, say they first met up with Myers and Baxter in Gaston, Ore., where all four were employed on the onion farm of George Kamaya, Japanese. They admitted that, under the direction of Myers and Baxter, one of them would write a check on some farmer, or fictitious character, and the other would endorse it with the fictitious name to whom it was made payable.

Checks in possession of the police are all for amounts in the neighborhood of \$10 each, and are drawn on the following: Roy Gage, wood dealer in Dallas; Guy and Roy Smith, hog growers; George Kamaya and K. Higashi, Japanese farmers; and Howard James and Kenneth Vincent, whom police say are fictitious characters.

Goods bought by the Nolans with the alleged bad checks, police said, would be divided between the Nolans by Myers and Baxter, and the cash would go into the jeans of Messrs. Myers and Baxter.

Myers, who is married and has three children, was arrested at his home on route seven.

Baxter, who has a 22-year-old wife and four children, was arrested at his home on route one, Gervais.

Both Myers and Baxter claim to have come to this locality from Oklahoma, Baxter having been here around five years and Myers two.

The Nolans were taken into custody here in Salem. All four signed confessions, the Nolans in longhand, and Myers and Baxter with "x's."
