Now without firing a shot he has captured Austria, if not through organic union, then through establishment of nazis in control in Vienna. Chancellor Schuschnigg, loyal to independence, had hoped through a plebiscite to get an endorsement. With German troops crossing the border and nazi armies and hoodlums raising disorders at Graz and Vienna he was forced to resign. "Anschluss" which the French prevented seven years ago is made a reality. ## Bonneville vs. Boulder


California is griping over the government's injection of more rubber in the Bonneville power yardstick. The San and editor of The Statesman, as Francisco Chronicle says that so long as government owned utilities keep their books on a different basis than is required of private utilities by government authorities, "talk of yardsticks is nonsense.

But California's new gripe is over what it regards as trick bookkeeping for Bonneville as compared with Boulder dam, another government project. The Chronicle says:

The basis of power cost accounting at Bonneville dam will he different from that at Boulder dam. The government has followed a different rule in allocating to power its proportion of total Bonneville costs."

The paper goes on to report that Boulder power users are in dire alarm over the prospect that their competitors in Bonneville territory will get cheaper electricity. "This is not because it is cheaper to make electricity at Bonneville," says The Chronicle, "but because the bookkeeping is not the same in the two projects."


