Frank Company Suit Held Over; Lewelling to Hear Motions

The case of Frank company vs. R. C. Higgins and others, the on-call action scheduled for trial in circuit court early this week, has been postponed from Monday, when it was to have been heard by Judge L. G. Lewelling. Motion day will be held in Judge Lewelling's department Tuesday.

In department one, Circuit Judge L. H. McMahon is to hear two criminal cases Monday morning. One involves James Lloyd Cary, charged with larceny of money from a Woodburn pool hall, and the other, George C. Weber, who appealed from a justice court conviction on a charge of drunken driving.

Rate Held Key to Marine Recovery

Reduction to Competition Basis Is Necessary, Geary Declares

Arthur M. Geary, Portland commerce attorney who was in Salem Saturday conferring with shipbuilders, expressed keen interest in press reports about the sharp division in the senate commerce committee on government vs. private subsidized operation of fast intercoastal ships. Geary has specialized in transportation problems and represented farm groups in many hearings on freight rates.

"Failure to include in their discussion the need of reduction of intercoastal rates to a world basis," said Geary, "shows that the committee certainly is not shipper-minded. In shipping to the east coast why should our agricultural and lumber producers who are handicapped by high American costs in production be forced to use American ships at higher rates than foreign ships offer? Our foreign competitors and our domestic competitors of the Mississippi valley and Great Lakes area have a great rate advantage because of this policy. Lower rates of foreign ships explains in large part why Canadian lumber and Argentine pears and European hairy vetch seed are crowding us out of our southeastern domestic market. Low rates via highways or river barges explain in part the present curtailed markets for northwest products."

"We must insist unitedly upon a policy for the Pacific Northwest that is fair to us and fair to intercoastal trade."

Geary is also opposed to such measures as the 70-car bill which he says will cost the railroads \$100,000,000 a year. He left petitions for circulation calling for railway consolidation and repeal of wartime rail rate increases.

Marion Road Task Approved, County

The county court yesterday accepted a proposal to improve the Salem-Turner-Marion paved market roads under a WPA project. The federal government will contribute \$35,403 to the project, J. E. Smith, WPA representative said. The work will include widening, ditching, grubbing of right-of-way and straightening of roadway.

Smith reported that more than 1000 of the approximately 1800 people now employed on WPA projects in the county were working on roads.

Squires to Be Feted Here by Vets; all Nearby Posts to Attend

Marion post #61, Veterans of Foreign Wars, of Salem, will be host to Commander-in-Chief Scott C. Squires Tuesday night, April 3, and the local organization is planning the biggest rally and celebration in its history. Invitations will be extended to all VFW members in the valley to attend and participate in the evening's entertainment, which is being arranged on a large scale.

There will be a banquet at 7 p. m., followed by a business meeting during which Commander Squires will administer the oath of membership to a large class of applicants. Invitation will be extended to a group of state officers including Governor Martin, Secretary of State Shell and State Treasurer Rufus Holman, as honorary guests of the occasion. It is hoped that arrangements can be made for a radio broadcast of a message to be delivered by the national commander.

To Visit Medford
Commander-in-Chief Squires will be in Oregon three days, arriving in Southern Oregon Monday morning, April 4, and closing in Portland on Wednesday, April 6. As a large attendance is anticipated at the banquet reservations should be made with Commander Herman Lafky, of Marion post, in the Bligh building, well in advance.

Loop System for Bus Line Studied

A "loop system" for city busses, designed to aid in solving some of the difficulties now experienced by the bus company and to release additional parking areas in the 99 in Idaho and 35 in California. Four guardsmen were born in Washington, D. C., three in Alaska, three in the Philippines, one in the Panama Canal Zone and one in Hawaii.

Only 2.3 per cent of the membership were born in foreign countries. Canada leads these with two officers and 67 men. Others represented include England, Germany, Italy, Greece, Australia, Sweden, Ireland, Austria, Hungary, Russia, Norway, Roumania, India, Poland, Holland and China.

428 Vaccinations Given, Past Week

Vaccinations have been the principal activity of the Marion county department of health this past week with 428 given. This number is four times as many as are ordinarily given in a week. The increase in number was due to the new case of smallpox discovered in the high school in the middle of the week. Dr. Frederick Stricker, state health officer, says "It is every person's duty to himself and to his community to maintain a personal immunity against smallpox by means of vaccination."

Eighty-eight diphtheria immunizations were given by staff members, 197 were examined by physicians, the nurses inspected 346 children for communicable diseases, 51 school visits were made by the staff making a total of 1341 people seen by members of the department.

During the week 103 volunteer workers gave their services to the department. Sanitary inspector, John Geren, visited 55 homes in interest of home sanitation, took 24 water samples, 12 milk samples, visited 8 schools, 2 public water supplies, 6 milk plants and 4 dairies.

Sam Brown Files For Governorship

Gervais Farmer Hopes to Serve; Harmony for Oregon Is Aim

Sam H. Brown, the Gervais farmer, filed Saturday as candidate for governor on the republican ticket, and gave out the following announcement of his candidacy:

"In announcing my candidacy for the nomination on the republican ticket for the governorship of the state of Oregon, I do so fully realizing the opportunity and responsibility of that high office.

"I come from pioneer parentage; all my life I have resided in the state of Oregon. My record as a private citizen and as a public servant is an open book. I believe that my many years of experience as a member of the Oregon legislature especially qualify me for the position I am seeking. I have always advocated a square deal for the common man, and have consistently stood out against selfish or special interests.

"I aspire to the governorship for the reason that I believe in that position I can serve the people of Oregon. If elected to that office I shall perform its duties in a fearless, impartial and honest manner. I shall attempt to promote harmony and a friendly spirit between all classes, contributing thereby to the happiness of the people and the welfare of the state. To be the servant of all the people is the pledge of my campaign."

Second in 1936
Brown, a former state senator from Marion county, ran a close second to Joe E. Dunne for the republican nomination four years ago. He also ran for United States senator against Charles L. McNary in 1936.

Campaign work has already begun, said Brown. "I have arranged things at the farm so I can put in my time campaigning between now and the primaries. I intend to make personal visits to all parts of the state and make my campaign largely one of meeting the voters."

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Land Bank Loans System Outlined

W. S. Bartlett Is Speaker at Realty Luncheon; Explains Process

In Marion and Polk counties there are 1200 Federal Land Bank loans approximating \$3,500,000 outstanding, it was stated by W. S. Bartlett, who is in charge of that institution's Salem office. At an address at the Salem realty board luncheon Friday.

The Federal Land Bank loans through associations of ten or more farmers, of which there are four in this district, are made at 4 per cent interest and may mature in not more than 40 years although 20-year or 34-year amortization is more common, Bartlett explained. These are conservative loans, limited to 50 per cent of the appraised or sale value of the property, which ever is smaller. In order to obtain these loans the borrower must become a member of the association and purchase stock amounting to 5 per cent of the loan.

There is in addition a "commissioner's loan" obtainable on a second mortgage under certain conditions, on which there are no principal payments for three years, the speaker explained.

Should Check Up
Bartlett advised the realtors, in handling sales of property covered by Federal Land Bank loans, to check up on the exact status and repayment schedule so the purchaser would not be misled. He also declared it was better to include the association stock in the deal.

This stock does not bear interest, but will pay dividends if its security is unimpaired. Bartlett said. It may be redeemed when the loan is paid off, but only if the association's security is unimpaired or through liquidation of the association's assets. The stock pays for itself in the lower interest it makes possible, aside from the possibility of redemption, he said.

Trade of Grazing Lands Permitted

The state land board has authority to exchange state-owned lands chiefly suitable for grazing purposes with the United States for other lands, either of equal acreage or equal value lying within the same county, Attorney General VanWinkle held Saturday.

The opinion was requested in connection with the proposal of the state land board to block large tracts of grazing lands in central and eastern Oregon.

Lands which the state land board seeks to acquire by exchange are owned by the federal intermediate credit bank of Spokane.
