# Damage Cases Started Here

**N. A. Kimlinger and Lizzie A. Wesely Plaintiffs in two Actions**

Two damage actions growing out of automobile collisions were filed in circuit court yesterday with \$10,000 general damages and special damages being asked in each case.

N. A. Kimlinger, whose automobile was involved with one driven by George Vachter in a collision at Main and College streets, Mt. Angel, last November 26, has brought action against George Vachter and Adam Vachter, owner of vehicle. Kimlinger, who seeks in two causes of action \$250 special damages and \$400 damages to his machine in addition to the general damages, alleges that he was unable to work for six weeks as the results of injuries received.

Careless driving of Vachter and failure to give right of way is given by Kimlinger as a cause of action. He states that as a result of the collision he received several fractured ribs, arm lacerations and head bruises.

Lizzie A. Wesely, who states that on last December 3 she was a guest passenger in a car struck by one driven by John Meithof, brings action against Meithof on grounds of negligent driving.

The plaintiff, claiming general damages of \$10,000 and special damages of \$750.02, states that she received a fractured skull and numerous other injuries in the accident, which occurred at 17th and D streets in Salem.

# League of Cities To Convene Here

Salem Meeting Designated March 30 as one of Statewide Series

Problems facing cities of Oregon, many of which are becoming more and more serious, will be taken up at a series of regional meetings to be sponsored by the League of Oregon Cities, according to word received here from Herman Kehrl, executive secretary of the group and director of the University of Oregon bureau of municipal research.

Officials of Salem and other cities in this area will attend the meeting to be held here March 30.

**Pinball Loss Damages**  
Means of obtaining revenue to offset that lost as a result of the decision on illegality of pinball machines, plans for licensing games of skill which may appear as substitutes for the machines, role of the city in labor disputes, building codes and zoning with particular reference to federal housing construction, regulation of driveways and curb-cutting, relation of cities to the proposed utility districts and the Bonneville dam, and codification of ordinances are among the many problems to be up for discussion.

**Nine Sessions Set**  
The series of meetings will open in Marshfield March 14 and in Medford March 15. The schedule includes sessions in Eugene March 29, Salem March 30, McMinnville on March 31, Oregon City April 1, The Dalles April 12, La Grande

April 13, and Pendleton April 14. City officials, league representatives and others interested will attend the sessions. No formal programs will be arranged and all present will be invited to join in discussions.

Representatives of the league's committees on gasoline tax and on liquor revenues will be present to report on activities in their fields. Mayor V. E. Kuhn, Salem, president of the league and other members of the group's executive committee will also attend all of the regional sessions, it is announced.

# Mortgage Chattel Traders Warned

Persons selling, trading or receiving chattels mortgaged to the farm security administration as security for rehabilitation loans are liable to court action by the government if legal releases have not been secured, according to a notice received from the regional attorney, reports T. R. Hobart, county rehabilitation supervisor, Salem.

Restrictions are placed on sale or transfer of chattels mortgaged to FSA not only to provide partial security for rehabilitation loans but to insure maintenance of sufficient operating goods to keep the farm on a productive basis and carry out farm plans, says the notice.

Where sale or trade of mortgaged chattels is necessary because of changes in farm operation, authorization for transfer of such property should be secured through the county supervisor's office, Hobart pointed out.

# George R. Duncan Files for House

Rights, Responsibility of Labor Both Stressed in His Platform

Opposition to interference with the right of any person to transport and market products of his own land and labor as well as opposition to legislation denying labor the right of collective bargaining is contained in a statement issued by George R. Duncan of Stayton yesterday as he filed with the secretary of state for state representative from Marion county.

Duncan, Stayton attorney, whose campaign for election to the house of representatives two years ago fell just short of the mark, also pledged his support to officials in the suppression of acts of violence and intimidation, and the prevention of the exploitation of labor by unscrupulous persons.

**Opposes Lotteries**  
Other points in his statement included a stand against diversion of highway funds and any modification of existing statutes against lotteries and other gambling.

Duncan, a republican, ran high in the primaries of two years ago but was edged out in the general election.

Also filed at the secretary of state's office yesterday were the names of Ellis W. Barnes, Portland democrat, for state representative from the 5th district, Multnomah county, and R. J. Kitchen of LaGrande for circuit judge of Union and Willowa counties. Kitchen filed as a non-partisan.
