The majority opinion, delivered by Justice Hughes, agreed with the government's contention that the constitutionality of only sections 4 (a) and 5 of the law was at stake. The companies argued validity of the entire act was in question, and that this point should be determined before they should be compelled to register.

Two Are Injured In Cycle Mishap

ALBANY—Two motorcycle victims are in the Albany general hospital as the result of an accident here late Sunday. Miss Vera Hockspeler, 25, is said to be in a critical condition, and Edward L. Myers, 18, is also being treated although his injuries are said not to be considered so serious as those of Miss Hockspeler. The accident happened at the north end of the Albany bridge and is believed to have been caused when the motorcycle on which the couple were riding, skidded as the driver attempted to turn back into the lane of travel after passing an automobile. Miss Hockspeler, who is a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Fred Hockspeler of Albany, suffered a fractured skull, a broken collar bone and other injuries. She was still unconscious late Monday afternoon. Myers, whose home is in Seio, and who was driving the motorcycle, is believed not to be so seriously injured. He suffered a slight concussion, and numerous bruises and cuts.

Lynd Plea Guilty, Is Given 7 Years

OREGON CITY, March 28.—(P)—Charles E. Lynd, indicted on a second degree murder charge, pleaded guilty to a reduced charge of manslaughter today and was sentenced to seven years in the state penitentiary by Circuit Judge E. C. Latourette. Lynd, 77, was accused of the fatal shooting of Ernest Robinson, Viola district farmer, after an argument over wages for cutting wood on Robinson's place. Lynd claimed he fired in self defense.

Liberty Sidewalk Issue Is Revived

Rogers Ready to Proceed When Ordered; Firms Notified, Stated

City Attorney Paul R. Hendricks last night said he had twice informed property owners who control warehouses along South Liberty between Ferry and Trade streets, and who are responsible for the loading platforms abutting those warehouses, that the city council had ordered the latter torn down so that the sidewalks for which the council had contracted could be constructed. "I was instructed to inform them last week, which I did," said Attorney Hendricks, "that they had until Wednesday of this week to tear out the platforms or the city would be forced to do it for them."

City Engineer Hugh Rogers said he had so far had no official order from either Alderman E. B. Perrine, chairman of the street committee, or the council to tear down the platforms, but that when he did get the authority, "he'd go over there and tear them down."

Contract to construct sidewalks on both sides of the street was let by the city council to David Korb last fall. Construction was deferred because of weather conditions. At the last council meeting, March 21, the warehouse operators submitted a proposal to build an undercrossing for the use of pedestrians. The council frowned upon the proposal and placed it on file, but approved loading spaces for trucks there when and if the sidewalks were built. A new proposal by warehouse operators is that five-foot sidewalks be built in line with walks in the next block south, and that driveways be left between the walks and warehouses, so the big trucks may load and unload between the walks and the warehouses.

Peso Reacting Due to Silver

Action Deemed Strategy to Bolster Dealings Over Oil Seizure

virtually dictates world silver prices, lowered its bid for foreign metal for the first time in more than two years. It reduced its price from 45 to 44 cents an ounce.

Well informed persons said this indication of lessening American support probably would weaken the world silver market so that Mexico could sell silver abroad only at sacrifice prices.

Treasury officials declined to say why they lowered the price, but a spokesman acknowledged it was "significant" that the change was the first since Jan. 20, 1936, and that this was the first time the United States had not stood firm when the London silver market showed signs of weakening. The London price declined 1.7 cents today.

Thus, the United States apparently reinforced its hand in dealing with Mexico regarding the expropriation of American oil properties and the raising of tariff barriers against American merchandise. Officials left "no doubt" that this was the purpose, although the only public statement was Secretary Morgenthau's explanation that the United States would discontinue purchases of Mexican silver pending a reexamination of "certain financial and commercial relationships with Mexico."

Reorganization Is Good Idea Claims Governor Martin

Governor Charles H. Martin would have supported the principle of the government reorganization bill had he been serving in congress during the current session, he told newspaper correspondents at a press conference Monday.

"I cannot understand why the people are criticizing Senator Reames of Oregon for supporting this bill," Governor Martin said.

"The principle of the measure is sound and has been advocated by a number of presidents, including Harding, Coolidge and Hoover."

"The fight over the bill is nothing but a tempest in a teapot, with the president's enemies using it for propaganda."

Governor Martin said there were more than a hundred commissions in Washington which were operating at the present time without any control.
