More Logging Operations Open up At Scio With Men Already Working On 2-Year Contract for Dallas Mill

SCIO—Employment of 20 to 25 men on a contract contemplating two years' logging operations near Scio is a project initiated here this week. White Logging company has the contract for the Willamette Valley Lumber company, of Dallas. The Whites have been handling logging operations for the Dallas concern for several years, recently coming from Grand Ronde.

The White company will fell the timber in the national forest a few miles east of Scio. The company's contract specifies that it will deliver the logs at West Scio for shipment to Dallas, where the timber will be converted into building lumber by one of the largest sawmills in the Willamette valley.

Old-growth yellow fir exclusively is to be handled, the Dallas company having arranged for the timber through the federal forest service, it is stated. Adequate housing facilities for the workmen were not available in Scio, hence the company is converting the former pool hall building on Main street into a "bunkhouse" for the crew. The company also will operate the lunch counter at the Scio Confectionery. A sizeable payroll is expected to be added to commercial channels in Scio and vicinity through the operations of the new company here.

Enlarge Polk Herd Testing

Dickinson, Independence, Is Named President of County Unit

DALLAS—Holding its annual meeting for the election of officers, the Polk County Dairy Herd association met here recently and discussed enlarging the association to make it a full time group. Up until now Yamhill and Polk county herd improvement associations have been on a half-time basis. Both were cooperating in employing one full time tester. The Yamhill group had already decided to enlarge its association, therefore it will be necessary to employ a new tester for one of these counties.

Plan Effective May 1
It was decided that a plan would be made for enlarging both county associations effective May 1. It was determined that sufficient herds to make about 12 days full testing could be added to the present group. Herds of over 20 cows or more are usually counted as a full day's testing work for one man and herds of less than "0" may join on a half-time basis making it possible for a tester to work with two herds of this size in one day.

W. C. Leith, Polk county agent, explains that testers are hired on a full time basis and it is necessary to have a full time group only and that extra herds cannot be taken care of by the association except in case of a shortage of members.
