Death Toll 11 in Single Day of Maneuvers in Waters of Hawaii

In maneuvers designed to test Hawaii's defenses, had conclusively proved their value in scouting operations.

A four-day rest in the maneuvers for all but searching craft was scheduled following the first two weeks of the six-week war games, the next phase to begin Monday.

The missing bomber dropped out of a six-plane formation during scouting operations against the islands in a mock invasion. Aboard were Lieut. Charles Signer, Aviation Cadet R. J. Larabino; Aviation Machinist's Mates P. D. Pancoast and J. A. Ringham, and Radiomen G. T. Williamson and C. R. Oulundsen. Regardless of their fate the navy counted at least 24 aviation deaths and numerous fleet injuries as the result of the 1938 Pacific operations, which perhaps more nearly approached war conditions than any previous American peacetime naval maneuvers.

Near the northwest shore of Oahu, most important of the Hawaiian Islands, naval salvage workers recovered three bodies from the wreckage of a long-range bombing plane which crashed unaccountably in a heavy rain squall yesterday. Two other bodies presumably remained in the submerged and broken fuselage.

Authorities also disclosed five men were injured, three seriously, and five others received cuts and bruises in the successful landing of 1,400 bluejackets at Lahaina Roads, 75 miles southeast of here, in a spectacular phase of the operations. Heavy rain swamped nine boats and four were wrecked in the landing feat.

down to some extent by errors in applications, improper termination reports, failure of some employers to make their contributions in compliance with the law, and other complications. Many termination reports had to be returned for correction.

Numerous complicated legal questions also have entered into the operations of the department, officials declared. These included rulings on seasonal employment and the status of many occupations under the act.

A small percentage of persons who filed applications for benefits under the law later withdrew and accepted jobs.

Each application received by the commission has to be investigated before it is approved. In many cases considerable time is required for these investigations.

The maximum monthly allowance under the act is \$15.

Seventh Tetanus Death Is Counted

ORLANDO, Fla., March 31-(AP)—Deaths of seven women and the illness of four other persons—all patients at a clinic where a serum was injected for the treatment of tetanus—were investigated by county, state and federal health authorities today.

The seventh victim of a strange poisoning, much like tetanus (lockjaw) yet differing in its reaction to treatments died this morning. She was Mrs. P. E. Moore, 63, of Winter Park, Fla.

Mrs. Lydia Morrison, 49, E. S. Bolte, 70, C. S. Pore, 65, and Mrs. Ola Hall, all residents of Orlando, were in hospitals with the same symptoms which preceded the death of the seven women. Physicians said Mrs. Morrison, Bolte and Pore appeared to be near death. Mrs. Hall's case had not progressed so far.

Dr. J. N. Patterson of the state board of health said an autopsy of the body of the seventh victim disclosed "a swelling of the brain, toxic poisoning of the vital organs and other symptoms 'not characteristic of any particular type' of poisoning."
