Bakes "Soup" Cake

ALBANY—On display in the DeMoss bakery window is what is claimed to be the largest cake of its kind ever baked in the world. It is tomato soup cake, and was baked for John Lamberty, proprietor of the Groceries, as part of his 22nd anniversary celebration to be held Saturday.

The cake, which was baked as one complete loaf, contains 64 cans of tomato soup, is 30 inches across, 5 inches deep, and 4 1/2 feet long and weighs 165 pounds. It is expected to serve 1500 people. It was baked in a special pan furnished by a national company.
