The right of the lessee to move the building at the expiration of the lease providing he pay the city \$170.

The city attorney was authorized to file answer to the suit brought against the city by Bonah M. Woods for land between High and Church streets that was originally platted as Division street. The suit was presented by Attorney Allan Carson, representing Mrs. Woods, and the city's answer will be that of disclaiming any interest in the property. The property in question has been assessed for improvements, according to Attorney Carson, ever since Salem has been a city.

Alderman David O'Hara's motion to amend the motion to authorize the city attorney to answer the suit was overridden by an 8-6 vote. O'Hara said he felt that the matter should be given to the city attorney and streets committee for study before an answer was filed.

The council adopted the city attorney's report recommending purchase of that portion of North 17th street, between Center on the south and A street on the north, and that pavement and walks be installed. On a motion by Alderman Williams, the city attorney is to be a report to the council concerning the title of the property.

Oxford Described By WU Professor

The value of a broad education in history and the classics is demonstrated by the outstanding success of Oxford university, Prof. R. Franklin Thompson of Willamette university told a highly appreciative audience at the Salem chamber of commerce luncheon Monday noon. Technical schools in the United States are now recognizing these values and modifying their courses accordingly, he said.

A vivid description of the student and social life at Oxford and of the outstanding architectural setting of the 23 colleges which comprise the university was presented by Prof. Thompson who attended on a fellowship but came in contact with the many Rhodes scholars from America who are not, he said, "book bright and life dull."

His description of the student-imposed discipline and of rooting at a "rugger" game were highlights of his talk.

Bruce Spaulding tonight said he signed justice court complaints against the trio Saturday.

The Polk county grand jury reconvened today and investigated a number of cases but Spaulding declined to say what they were.

Of the other six men facing arson charges in connection with the West Salem fire, only Al Banks of Salem, who has pleaded guilty, remains in the Polk county jail.

Al Rosser, Portland teamster chieftain and Clarence Adams, Portland hiring hall head, who have pleaded innocent to arson indictments, and Cecil Moore, Ernest Carson and John Newlands, who have pleaded guilty, have been returned to Portland where they are being held for local authorities.

Dist. Atty. Spaulding said no trial dates had been set for Rosser and Adams and he did not know when the other four would be sentenced.

Vladivostok, he said "the Russian commissar there enjoyed the most extreme luxuries of home, food, drinks and beautiful girl servants who cost 150,000 people of that city suffered the most humiliating poverty." The masses in that city, he added, "never receive so much as a drink of pure water."

Reynolds stated that he had entered Russia by the back door and had thereafter witnessed much that the average traveler never sees. Referring to the people as a "horde of animal like creatures," he said that the soviet had no concern for humanity except as it might produce goods for the state.

"Funerals," he said, "are common. The country is filthy with disease and there being no doctors in many parts, that is all you could expect."

Speaking of the general atmosphere of the country he said: "I was watched, censored, and spied upon from every angle every minute of the day and night. Nothing I did or said passed the eyes of the secret police."

Reynolds stated that the American Legion and the Veterans of Foreign Wars stood as a bulwark against communism in America.

Lull Comes, Fight On Reorganization

WASHINGTON, April 4.—(AP)—House administration leaders, expressing confidence the reorganization bill would be passed this week, welcomed a break in debate on the measure today and hoped it might help the controversy to "cool off some."

By operation of the routine program of the house, rather than by the design of the leadership, the chamber spent the day discussing other matters. There was a possibility that, excepting a short period tomorrow, the bitterly-contested bill might not come up again until Thursday.

The leaders based their predictions of passage upon a weekend compromise, which President Roosevelt did not oppose.

Although they agreed to one more compromise today, they were inclined to say with some emphasis that no more concessions would be made. From the bill's opponents came statements there would have to be additional compromises before the opposition would be relaxed.

Attempt to Float Nisqually Planned

ASTORIA, Ore., April 4.—(AP)—An attempt to refloat the steel barge Nisqually, stranded on Clatsop spit, by anchoring a vessel in deep water and hauling the barge off with a donkey engine was announced today by the Knappton Towboat company.

The old schooner North Bend, which was aground on the spit for two years after attempting to enter the river under sail in 1929, will be used.

Bruises Found on Man After Death

EUGENE, April 4.—(AP)—The mysterious death here early this afternoon of Timothy E. Lucey, 71, was being investigated tonight by city police and the county coroner.

Lucey entered a cigar store about 1:30 o'clock, staggered and fell to the floor. He was carried out to a nearby alley, where he was found dead a few minutes later. Investigation revealed heavy bruises on the man's chest and shoulders, but cause of death had not yet been determined. Lucey had no known relatives besides a sister in Wisconsin.

Big Reclamation Program Favored

Deschutes and Owyhee in Oregon Are Included in Proposed Fund

WASHINGTON, April 4.—(AP)—A \$39,719,000 reclamation program for 1939 was recommended to the senate today by its appropriations committee.

Included in the annual interior department supply bill for the year beginning July 1, the total was \$2,700,000 above the house approved sum of \$37,019,000.

Left intact were house totals of \$9,000,000 for California's central valleys project; \$13,000,000 for Grand Coulee dam; \$2,030,000 for Marshall Ford dam on the Colorado river project; \$3,500,000 for Boulder dam, and the following amounts for these other projects:

All-American canal, \$500,000; Yakima, Wash., Reza division, \$1,000,000; Owyhee, Oregon, \$310,000; Deschutes, Oregon, \$300,000; Sun River, Montana, \$300,000; Upper Snake river storage, Idaho, \$250,000; Minidoka, Idaho, \$400,000; Boise project, Idaho, Payette division, \$500,000 (in addition to the \$1,000,000 for Twin Springs dam and Snake river pumping plant).
