However, there was concerted speculation on the part of District Attorney Jackson, Sheriff Albert Anderson of Van Horn and Texas Ranger Pete Crawford, that the prominent Berkeley matron and her daughter were victims of acquaintances who won their friendship during a five-day stay in El Paso, March 25-30.

There is now the possibility the robbery may have been plotted when they were here last week," Jackson said.

It was with this theory in mind that authorities late today began questioning of employees of the hotel at which Mrs. Frome and her daughter stopped while a few days before their semi-nude bodies, beaten and burned, with bullets in the heads, were found in the mesquite and cactus country near Van Horn, Tex.

Mountain Quarrel Fatal, Eugene Man

EUGENE, Ore., April 5.—(P)—Jarvis Winchell, 24, died today from a bullet wound in the neck, suffered, Sheriff C. A. Swartz was told, when he and another man, Walter Eddy, 60, quarreled Saturday in a mountain shack about participation in a lumber strike at Westfir a year ago.

The sheriff said Eddy, who called officers after the shooting, told him Winchell apparently bore a grudge against him for not walking out with other workers. Eddy was held on an open charge.

Eye witnesses told the sheriff that there was drinking and that Winchell struck Eddy several times. Eddy, who has a black eye and face and body bruises, was quoted by the sheriff as saying he warned Winchell he was "too old to fight this way," and finally reached for his rifle, only intending to frighten Winchell.

Vocational Education and Industrial Art Work of Salem Schools Will Be Shown at Exposition Here April 22

Vocational education and industrial arts shop work will be on display at a special "exposition" program at the new senior high school practical arts shops building April 22.

Plans are going ahead rapidly toward preparation of the exhibits and demonstrations. The objective will be to show the purpose of each unit of industrial arts work from the 7th grade general mechanics classes to the most advanced vocational units in the senior high school.

A large space on the second floor of the senior high school shops building is being prepared for the exhibition of the junior high school work. Senior high school classes will display and demonstrate in their usual classrooms.

A special committee including

Roy Foster, industrial arts instructor of Parrish junior high school, chairman, William Porter, auto mechanics and Jens Smith, agriculture instructor of the senior high school, is directing the arrangements.

Included in the list of exhibits and demonstrations will be work of the vocational auto shop, machine shop, a sculpture, wood working, apprenticeship and drafting courses of the senior high school, and industrial arts work of the general mechanics wood working and mechanical drawing classes of Leslie and Parrish junior high schools.

The exhibit will be open to the public Friday afternoon and evening, April 22. Posters, signs and displays will illustrate and explain the objectives of each unit and many unique demonstrations are being prepared.

German Refugees Reach New York

NEW YORK, April 5.—(P)—A group of German and Austrian refugees arrived today on the British liner Antonio to accept this country's historic and recently renewed offer of political asylum.

They came as millions who now are Americans had come in years past—through the narrows and on up the shining bay past the statue of liberty, gleaming in the April sun.

As the coast guard cutter Calumet pulled alongside the Antonio and the ladder was put out for the officers to clamber aboard for the customary inspections, some of the silent few who lined the Antonio's upper deck smiled and held up their hands in tentative greeting.

But for the most part the arrivals were a stolidly quiet and bewildered lot. Most, of course, could speak no English and the exact number who could be classified as actual fugitives from their homelands was impossible of determination.

Rabenau Injured, Other Driver Held

Holland of Portland was arrested by city police on a charge of failure to give the right-of-way as a result of an automobile collision at the intersection of Trade and Liberty streets shortly before 5 o'clock last night.

According to witnesses, Rabenau was traveling south on Liberty and Holland west on Trade when the accident occurred. Holland's car, witnesses asserted, was traveling at an excessive rate of speed and when it collided with the Rabenau machine the latter was tipped over on its side.

The Salem taxi ambulance took Rabenau to the hospital, and Holland was treated by city first aid car officers for abrasions and a possible fractured hand.

Test Expected On Bill Today

GOP-Demo Coalition Sets up Lively Attack as Noses Are Counted

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of strength on the bill, or possibly two of them.

Administration leaders intend to move that debate be closed when tomorrow's session begins, a procedure sure to result in a roll call vote. Last week, such an effort was easily defeated.

If the opposition should fail to keep the debate open tomorrow, it intends to move to "strike out the enacting clause" the language which says "he enacted, etc." and gives every bill its effectiveness. If that attempt prevailed, the bill would be dead.

Today's efforts to end debate were all of the type that required the unanimous concurrence of the house. Before the day's consideration of the bill began, four such attempts were made by the managers of the bill. While Speaker Bankhead unsuccessfully pounded his gavel for order, each such effort was blocked by objections from both the republican and democratic seats.

Opposition leaders said they would be joined tomorrow by Representative Sumner, influential Texas democrat, whose speech as chairman of the judiciary committee last summer helped kill the administration's court reorganization bill.

Pooling or Rail Facilities Hinted

WASHINGTON, April 5.—(P)—President Roosevelt hinted today that pooling of railroad facilities and equipment may be included in the administration's program for rehabilitation of the railroads.

Disclosing that he expects to send congress next Tuesday his recommendations for emergency aid to the carriers, the president said great economies in railroad operation were effected during the world war by such steps as consolidating ticket offices and pooling freight cars. He added that many railroad executives believe similar economies should be made now.

He declined, however, to give any preview of his message to congress, except to indicate that subsidies would not be included.

He said the subsidy question arose at yesterday's conference with railroad executives and labor representatives but he told them such payments could not be considered in advance of the formulation of a permanent railroad program.

Salems, 26 of 'em Will Be Honored

At the suggestion of Timothy W. Fitzgerald, postmaster of Salem, Mass., the Salems of the United States there are 26 of them to have special recognition during National Air Mail week, May 15 to 21.

It is mainly for the benefit of stamp collectors. It is suggested that the collector send under cover a self-addressed letter with 6-cent airmail stamp to any or all of the Salem postmasters, so they may be dispatched back on May 19.

Besides Oregon and Massachusetts the following states have Salems: Alabama, Arkansas, Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, Kentucky, Maine, Maryland, Michigan, Missouri, Montana, Nebraska, New Hampshire, New Jersey, New Mexico, New York, North Carolina, Ohio, South Carolina, South Dakota, Utah, Virginia West Virginia and Wisconsin.

It is recalled here that a local chamber of commerce secretary once sought for—and got plentifully—publicity for this city by writing authorities of all the other Salems and suggesting they change their names.

County Gaol Hits Low Census Mark

City Plants Exempt

Power district advocates have declared the statutes must be changed to permit the sale of revenue bonds payable out of the operating income. The law now only authorizes general obligation bonds. Regardless of the outcome of Friday's balloting, the matter will either be presented at the general election or at the legislature.

Some cities, such as Forest Grove and McMinnville, will not participate in the vote because they have municipal power plants.

The voters will also elect five of the six candidates for the board of directors. The candidates are:

Soviet Denies It Is Helping China

MOSCOW, April 5.—(P)—Soviet Russia Monday rejected a Japanese protest that accused the society of lending military aid to China in her war with Japan.

Foreign Commissar Maxim Litvinoff denied the soviet government had sent any army detachments or officers to bolster China's forces.

"Any declaration contradicting this fact and incapable of verification," Litvinoff declared, "could have been laid only by circles which already are well known for their systematic fabrication of all kinds of false reports with the object of sharpening relations between Japan and the Soviet union."

The Japanese protest, delivered early today by Ambassador Mamoru Shigemitsu, warned that Russia would have to "assume responsibility for the consequences" if such aid continued.

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Rosebraugh Warns Ditch Job Needed

Tells County Court Danger Lurks in Next Flood of Shelton Stream

With an appeal that something must be done about southeast Salem's flood problem before another wet winter, W. A. Rosebraugh, Salem foundry operator and manufacturer, yesterday warned the county court that great damage may be done in another flood period.

The court, which has realized the seriousness of the inadequate flood control measures in southeast Salem, informed Rosebraugh that it wished to cooperate but expressed the belief that the city and possibly the state should join in any plan worked out.

As a beginning, County Judge Siegmund instructed the county engineer to confer with Hugh Rogers, city engineer, and R. D. Cooper, WPA engineer who had considerable part in the construction of Shelton ditch, for the purpose of working out a plan whereby the city and county engineering forces could cooperate in some flood control project.

Rosebraugh told the court that "the men who know should get together and work out a plan and something should be done about it this summer."

Air Mail Patrons Overstamp Letters

It's surprising how many people spend half as much again as necessary for an air mail letter.

Postmaster H. R. Crawford declared yesterday in pointing out that air mail rates take a straight 6 cent an ounce, whether for letter or package.

Many air mail letters come through with a 3-cent air stamp, in addition a 6-cent air mail stamp. Only the 6 cents for each ounce is necessary, Mr. Crawford says.

A schedule of air mail service here, prepared by the postmaster, shows that letters mailed in Salem at 5 p.m. reach Chicago the next afternoon and New York the next evening after being mailed here. The 5 o'clock mail is the fastest service from Salem.

Bulk of the air mail letters going out from Salem are designed for Chicago, Cleveland, Ohio, and New York city.

Air letters or parcels mailed from Salem at 5 p.m. will arrive in San Francisco at 2:45 a.m. the next morning and in Los Angeles at 5:53 a.m.

Marketing School Installing Upheld

The state board of higher education has authority to establish a department of agricultural and industrial marketing at Oregon State college, Attorney General VanWinkle held Tuesday.

tors who now live in Fort Worth, Tex., for \$13,125.

They allege the Danciger brothers, including M. O. Danciger, since deceased, contracted to but one hundred and fifty 200-pound bales of hops for delivery in the last three months of 1920, but that in September the brothers quit the brewery business and refused to accept the hops.

The money sought, they say, is the difference between the contract price of 85 cents a pound and the market price at which the hops eventually were sold.

In previous trials the suit the Danciger brothers have alleged their legal advisors told them that under national prohibition the use of hops was illegal.

One previous trial resulted in a \$9,000 verdict for the Oregonians, another in a verdict for the defendants. Both were reversed by the Missouri supreme court.
