LEBANON—The 101st birthday of J. H. Alley, Lebanon's "Grand Old Man," civil war veteran and resident of Lebanon the past 16 years, was celebrated Monday at his home on Hiatt street by a special luncheon, gifts of flowers and cakes from relatives, friends, lodge and church members.

Luncheon guests were his daughter-in-law and housekeeper, Mrs. Hester Alley, her daughter, Mrs. A. Rucker and children of Sweet Home, her son, Joe Alley and family of Lebanon; Mrs. Alice Innes and Mrs. W. C. Skelton of Lebanon, his daughter, Mrs. Emma Welles and Mrs. Harry Welles of Independence joined the group of afternoon visitors.

Mr. Alley was born in Virginia April 3, 1837. In 1862 he enlisted in the 39th Kentucky Infantry and served to the close of the war when, he says, he started with 10 cents to begin his life work. He accumulated two quarter sections and an 80 acre plot of land in Kansas and New Mexico besides a large group of town lots and rental property.

He has lived in 12 states, but Oregon is his favorite. He has been twice married; both his wives and all but one of his children have passed away. He is alert in mind and enjoys his radio. He met his lodge and church brothers and his large group of visitors with a cheery greeting.
