Effort to Kill Bill Squelched

Margin Is But 22 Votes in House; Enemies Say Death Sure

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crats came on a motion by Representative O'Connor (D-NY) to kill the measure, without even throwing it open to amendment, by "striking out the enacting clause."

Without an enacting clause there can't be a bill.

After tellers had counted 169 members for the motion and 191 against, backers of the legislation broke into a wild cheer, hailing the decision as a definite indication that the house would pass the bill ultimately.

The opposition merely pointed to the closeness of the totals. "This is just one part of the fight," O'Connor asserted. "There will not be a reorganization bill."

Members crowded the floor and spectators crowded the galleries to be in on the most important skirmishes of the long house battle over the bill. Tempers were not. Debate was full of acid phrases.

In the end, the eventful fate of the bill remained a matter of mere speculation; there remained the possibility that action tomorrow on additional amendments would turn the tide either for or against it.

Urging the legislators not to "commit promise with principles," his motion, "I am taking the step O'Connor said that in offering

which I believe the people of this country desire."

"The country believes Fascism is with us, and that this bill is a further step in that direction," he said. "The people fear this bill will serve as an escalator to a dictatorship."

Police Committee Considers Report

The commission's chairman, A. A. Gueffroy, said yesterday the commission has no jurisdiction over organization of either the police or fire department. "It is our duty to qualify and certify that the personnel has met certain requirements, but we have nothing to say about running the department," Chairman Gueffroy said.

"If we did have that jurisdiction," continued Gueffroy, "we would be setting ourselves up as an investigating, judging and prosecuting body, which would not do." He pointed out that it is the right of any individual to bring charges against any person under civil service and that then it is the duty of the commission to hear the charges and act accordingly.

Gueffroy indicated that the civil service commission had asked Chief Minto to investigate and make a report to it of the circumstances surrounding the death of George Chaffee, shortly after his death, but that Minto so far had not completed the report. It is known, however, according to Gueffroy, that Chief Minto has done some work on preparation of such a report.

Would-Be Woman Legislator Crossed Plains by Prairie Schooner, 1894; Finds Public Affairs Interesting

Marion county's second woman candidate for a legislative position, Mrs. John E. Cooter of Salem, yesterday disclosed that she is a modern plain-crossing pioneer. She came to Oregon from her birth state, Kansas, in a prairie schooner in 1894, a babe in arms, with her mother driving much of the way.

Seeking the democratic nomination as state representative, Mrs. Cooter says that although her interests have always centered in her home, she has found time to participate in civic, religious affairs, side by side with her husband, who is a former speaker of the legislature, one-time farmer and present farm placement director for the state employment service.

Has Five Children
Mrs. Cooter was educated in the Corvallis schools and attended Oregon State college. She is the mother of five children, all attending the Salem schools or Willamette university.

She has been active in dramatics and church affairs and is a good speaker. She concedes that the bulk of business and political responsibilities belong to men, but considers the education of the nation and the education of the children can be advanced by women's participation in public affairs.

The development and utilization of Oregon's resources for the benefit of her people, particularly

those things which will enrich and make happier the home lives of the average city and farm dweller, are Mrs. Cooter's objectives, she says.

She has served as secretary in a county agent's office, and as clerk in a chamber of commerce, and assisted in editing a country newspaper, all of which positions she states were interesting and instructive.

Farm Experience Impresses
"But of all my experiences," says Mrs. Cooter, "that as wife of a farmer, trying to pay for his farm, make a living and educate a growing family has given me my best schooling in experience, and impressed upon me the need for solving existing farm problems."

Mrs. Cooter, through association with her husband's business, the state employment service, is familiar with the state's relief and unemployment problems. She hopes to see the state's resources made available to the "ever Oregon's people something better than relief and WPA."

She is a member of the Methodist church, American Legion auxiliary, Eagle's auxiliary and Townsend club No. 3, Salem. While on the farm Mrs. Cooter was a member of the Hebeekahs and grange.

Mrs. Cooter expresses her confidence in the ability of the honest labor groups to work out their problems with employers and predicts an early labor peace for Oregon.
