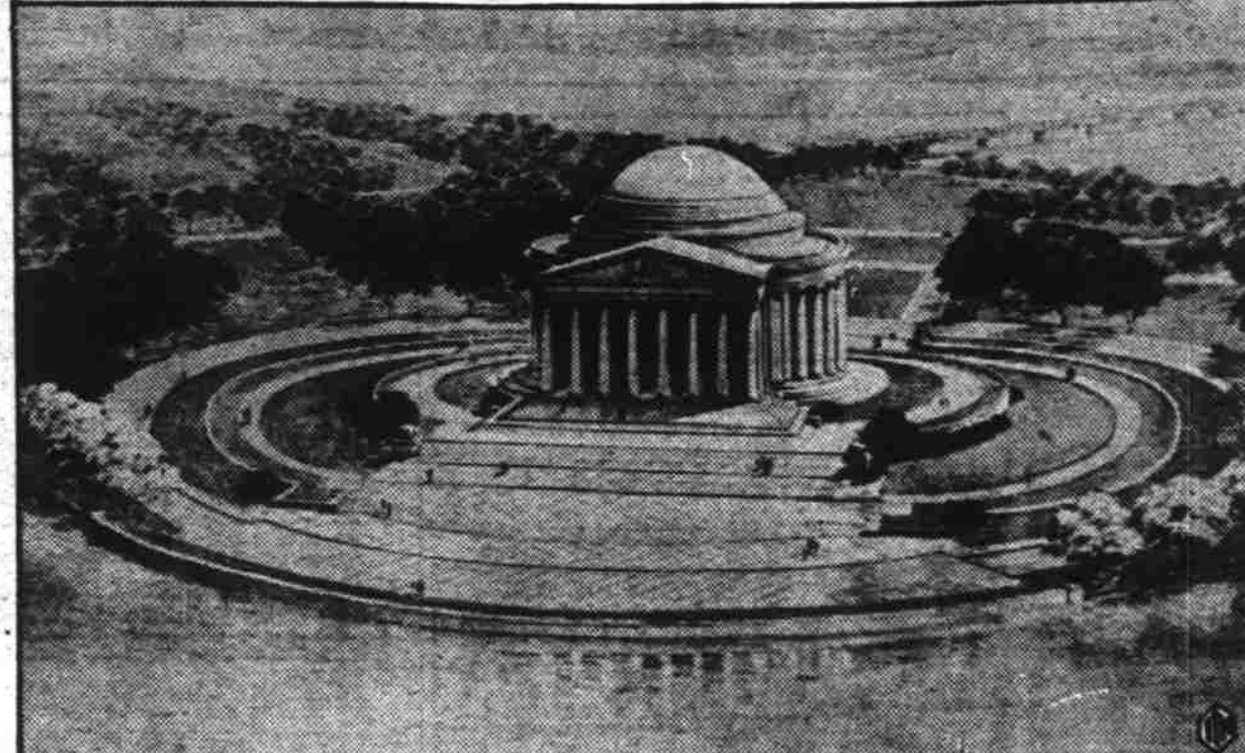

ROBERTS—When both Ronald Jones and G. W. Potts, sr., talk on the same evening, Farmers' Union members have something to think about for several days. Both spoke at the last meeting of the Roberts local.

Emphasizing three main tenets of the Farmers' Union, Mr. Jones, state vice-president and educational director and republican candidate for state senator, discussed current legislative events. He said because the reciprocal trade treaty program of the national government has led to tariff reductions on farm produce, American farmers are suffering from competition with foreign imports, which is undesirable when farmers in this country raise produce enough for the country's needs.

Legislation, such as is proposed in the Frazier-Lemke bill, Mr. Jones said, is needed to lighten the farmers' debt burden. Jones maintained that the crop control bill recently passed by the federal government, is bad, because of its subsidy nature. Self-reliance and initiative on the part of the farmers, he feared, tends to be destroyed while the farmers come under government dictation.

With many humorous remarks, State FU President Potts, democratic candidate for state representative, told about the general activities of the union.

It was decided that future meetings of the Roberts local will be on the second Tuesday of each month rather than on the first Wednesday.
