Old Favorites at
Dessert Time
Menu Helps

For desserts let's go a bit old fashioned, consider the merits of Indian pudding, an old favorite that has long been a popular meal ending.

INDIAN PUDDING
2 cups scalded milk
1/3 cup cornmeal
2 cups cold milk
1/2 cup molasses
1 teaspoon salt
1/4 cup sugar
1/4 cup butter

1 teaspoon ginger or cinnamon
Pour scalded milk slowly over cornmeal, cook for 20 minutes in the double boiler, add molasses, salt and ginger. Pour into buttered pudding dish, pour cold milk over the top, set in a pan of hot water and bake three hours in a slow oven, 250 degrees. Serve with cream and add raisins if wanted.

Bread pudding is another old time favorite that does a great deal toward making up for money spent on the new coat of paint for the kitchen. Let's try a more modern version:

LEMON BREAD PUDDING
8 small slices stale bread
Lemon mixture
1 cup milk
3 tablespoons sugar
2 eggs lightly beaten
Grated rind 1 lemon

Spread bread with lemon mixture, arrange in buttered pudding dish. Add sugar, salt, milk to eggs. Strain and add to lemon rind, pour over bread, cover and set in a pan of hot water. Bake one hour in a moderate oven.

LEMON MIXTURE
Cook 3 tablespoons lemon juice, 1/2 cup sugar and 1/4 cup butter for two minutes. Add 1 cup sugar and 3 eggs slightly beaten. Cook until thickened, then cool.

A dressier dessert is this omelet, but using walnuts instead of the almonds, you'll have a sweet more suitable to a same family

Oranges and sliced apples will be the salad that begins this meal.

Oranges and apple salad
Lamb chops
Spiced beets
Baked potatoes

Slice red skinned apples and put alternately with orange segments on lettuce. Top with fruit mayonnaise of French dressing.

NEWTON TAPIOCA
1/4 cup quick cooking tapioca.
1 quarts scalded milk
4 tablespoons cornmeal
1 cup cold milk
1/2 cup molasses
3 tablespoons butter

1 1/2 teaspoons salt
Pour scalded milk over cornmeal, add tapioca, salt, molasses and butter, cook in double boiler for 20 minutes. Turn into buttered pudding dish and pour over remaining milk but do not stir, bake 1 1/2 hours beginning with a hot oven (450 degrees) and reduce heat to moderate (350 degrees) when wheyed. Serves 6 to 8.

Almonds. Eggs are certainly reasonable.

ALMOND OMELET
WITH CAMEL SAUCE
3 eggs
1/4 tablespoon butter
1 cup caramel sauce
Spread bread with lemon mixture, arrange in buttered pudding dish. Add sugar, salt, milk to eggs. Strain and add to lemon rind, pour over bread, cover and set in a pan of hot water. Bake one hour in a moderate oven.

Beat egg yolks until thick and lemon colored, add 3 tablespoons caramel sauce (below) salt and vanilla. Cut and fold in the egg whites beaten until stiff. Put butter in hot omelet pan, sprinkle with almonds, turn in mixture and cook slowly on the top of the stove until puffy and delicately browned underneath, then set on the center grate in the oven to complete the cooking. It is done when firm when touched with the finger. Pour remaining sauce over omelet as served.

CAMEL SAUCE
1 cup sugar
1/2 cup boiling water
Brown the sugar well, add the boiling water and stir until dissolved.

1 1/2 cups hot water
2 tablespoons sugar
1/2 cup orange juice
1 tablespoon grated orange rind

1/4 to 1 cup heavy cream
Dissolve gelatin in hot water. Add sugar, orange juice, and rind. Chill until cold and syrupy. Fold in cream, whipped only until thick and shiny, but not stiff. Chill until slightly thickened. Turn into mold. Chill until firm. Unmold. Serves 6 to 8.
