guerrilla bands increased their assaults on the Peiping-Hankow railway which feeds Japanese munitions and supplies to the western Lushan front.

Foreign sources said gunfire was heard nightly at Shichichuan, Peiping-Hankow junction point in west central Hopeh province. Japanese were said to have retaliated against the guerrilla attacks by burning villages which could have harbored the irregulars.

Chinese peasants along the railroad line were forbidden to grow any crops higher than one foot because they might provide cover for guerrillas.

Miners Returning To Grass Valley

NEVADA CITY, Calif., April 13.—(P)—Thirty-five CIO miners and sympathizers returned here or to Grass Valley today from Sacramento where they had taken refuge.

They were escorted by state highway patrolmen. Their entrance into the district, which was the scene last week of asserted vigilante violence and turmoil, caused no demonstration.

Sheriff Carl Toblissen's office said there was no evidence of excitement or indications of renewed hostilities.

Youths on Trial Today, Kidnaping

TACOMA, April 13.—(P)—Denied the privilege of pleading guilty, Maynard James Lange, 17, and William Miller, 18, of Seattle prepared tonight to go on trial in district court here Thursday on federal charges of kidnaping.

The two youths, facing possible death sentences, were accused of abducting five persons in Seattle and Olympia March 2 and transporting them to Portland in a stolen automobile. Judge E. E. Cushman refused to accept their guilty pleas two weeks ago, directing that they be tried on both Lindbergh and Dyer act charges.

Assistant District Attorney Oliver Malm, when the youths were last before the court, declined to state whether the government would ask the death penalty, although he indicated privately such a request was unlikely.

Opinion on Lafky Filing Completed

Attorney General Van Winkle yesterday completed his written opinion holding that Herman Lafky, resident of Marion county, had authority to file for the office of circuit judge of Polk and Yamhill counties at the primary election.

Under Van Winkle's ruling Lafky must be a legal voter of the Yamhill-Polk county district at the time of the primary election in order to qualify for the office. The opinion was requested by Secretary of State Snell.

EDGEWATER PARK, Miss., April 13.—(P)—Governor "pump-priming" cannot succeed in restoring prosperity unless the government creates confidence by cooperating with business, the economic policy commission of the executive council of the American Bankers' association reported today.

The council ended its annual three-day spring meeting here tonight. Orval W. Adams of Salt Lake City, Utah, is president of the association and head of the council.

Governor Says He Is "Anti-Vandal"

Tells Club Employers Are Involved in Terrorism as Well as Laborers

PORTLAND, April 13.—(P)—Employers as well as labor union members and representatives are mixed up in labor terrorist activities in Oregon, Governor Charles H. Martin declared in a civic club speech today.

"And as the old plow goes along the furrow I think it is going to turn some of them up," the governor said.

Martin denied he was anti-labor, but "damned if I am not anti-vandal and anti-racketeer."

Governor Martin asserted a state-wide drive on labor racketeers had restored lost liberties to the people of the state. He urged all classes to work together for development of the state's resources in order to provide wealth and work for all.

The power question, the governor said, was not political, and he expressed confidence that Bonneville power would be distributed for the benefit of all the people of the state.

Sees Cheap Power "The Bonneville project provides one of the elements that has been lacking for the fullest development of our empire," he said, "cheap power that can be made available in a comparatively large area."

Mayor Joseph K. Carson asserted in a brief speech that he never entertained any fear of keeping the law supreme during the governor's incumbency.

"I always knew he was there to back me up," Carson declared.

Gethsemane Held To Be Experience

Gethsemane is not merely a spot on the world's surface, but a shared experience, Dr. B. Earle Parker, pastor of the Eugene First Methodist church and former Salem pastor, said in bringing the pre-Easter message for the Holy week services held each noon this week through Friday at the First Methodist church here. The Salem Ministerial association is sponsoring the series.

Dr. Parker added that no one who has not had his personal Gethsemane can understand the significance and meaning of the cross.

Employers Profit Rehiring Workers

PORTLAND, April 13.—(P)—T. Morris Dunn, chairman of the state unemployment compensation commission, said today in a speech at the Oregon Mental-Hygiene society institute that federal social security laws tended to make it profitable for employers to re-engage former personnel in order to reduce the number of benefit payments.

Dunn declared such results were needed because employment in Oregon was more seasonal than in most other states. He said 180,000 workers and 7,900 employers were participating under the social security law.

Forgery Suspect Identity Is Error

ROSEBURG, April 13.—(P)—Roy H. Stewart was freed today after District Attorney J. V. Long said he was the victim of mistaken identity in a case of forgery.

Stewart was arrested at Bend but when brought here the employees of a grocery store which was victimized said he was not the man who passed worthless checks.

The final unofficial tabulation in Cook county gave Igoe \$562,366 and Lucas \$74,320. In 9,658 of the 3,909 downstate precincts the vote was 234,894 for Lucas and 150,318 for Igoe.

"We were forced to make such an agreement, although we feel the boycott is wrong in principle, that it is harmful to the industry generally and to the northwest in particular," Scudder said.

Army to Supply Cavalry by Air

WASHINGTON, April 13.—(P)—The army developing a foreign military idea, will undertake to supply 30 cavalry troopers and their horses from the air in a four-day test beginning tomorrow.

Secretary Woodring announced today that bombers would drop, by parachute, approximately 1000 pounds of food and forage daily to an isolated cavalry platoon near Balmorhea, Reeves county, Tex.

The regular garrison ration of five and one-half pounds will be supplied for each man and 12 pounds of oats and 14 pounds of hay for each horse.
