## School Children Population Rises

Oregon's school census for 1937-38, taken the last week in October, 1937, showed 270,530 pupils, an all-time high. Rex Putnam, state superintendent of schools announced yesterday.

This was an increase of 3985 pupils or 1.5 per cent over the school population for the previous year. The 1936-37 census showed 266,545 children of school age.

The result of the migration into Oregon was shown by comparing the 1933-34 census with that of 1937-38, Putnam said.

The school census during this four-year period increased from 258,880 children of school age to 270,530, or an increase of 11,650 children.

The largest increase was in Malheur county where the school population jumped 54.12 per cent.

Other counties showing substantial gains were Hood River 16.42 per cent, Harney 14.10 per cent, Marion 13 per cent, Linn 12.41 per cent, Lane 12.19 per cent, Polk 11.84 per cent, Deschutes 11.72 per cent, Benton 11.19 per cent, Coos 9.32 per cent, Washington 8.99 per cent, and Curry 8.94 per cent.

**Thawing Pole Ice Early Is Scheme**

A plan of melting snow in the far north so that the rivers there would thaw two or three months earlier than at the present time, has been submitted to state officials here by Mrs. Olga G. Bladen of Memphis, Tenn.

The plan is quite simple, Mrs. Bladen said, requires only three essentials, and originally was discovered by Benjamin Franklin. Charcoal and salt are the basis of operations.

Mrs. Bladen said airplanes loaded with salt and charcoal could fly over the polar area and drop their cargo at strategic points. This would cause the snow and ice to melt.
