opted last night deposit will be made at the time of application for service installation, the amount of the deposit to be credited against water bills for a period of one year. The commission will recognize written transfers of the credit in cases where the original applicant, as in the case of a contractor, does not intend to occupy the dwelling where service is installed.

The deposit was explained as necessary to protect the commission's investment in meter and line should it possibly be unused for a considerable period after installation.

A charge of actual cost of labor and materials plus 10 per cent for overhead will be made for all new service installations other than to serve one residence or household, regardless of size or classification of service.

Rejection of the commission's offer to supply water to the Oregon Pulp & Paper Co. at a figure of \$12 per million gallons was made in a letter from N. G. Teren, vice-president of the company.

Teren's letter said that \$12 per million gallons was considerably higher than the cost the company would have in filtering and treating its own raw water, available from the mill race flowing through the plant.

Motion to offer a rate of \$10 per million gallons was made by the commission after consideration of a paragraph of Teren's letter in which he stated: "In case you should wish to reconsider your offer, we would like to point out that we would not be interested in the purchase of any water from the city at a rate in excess of \$10 per million."

The commission's offer is predicated upon a minimum use of 25,000,000 gallons monthly by the paper mill.
Agreement with the state highway commission to patch 1200 square yards of black top pavement torn up in installation of new mains was made by resolution. The highway department will have a mixing plant located near here.

Upon motion of Commissioner Grabenhorst sale of water to a group of Morningstar residents who are planning installation of their own system and pumping station was authorized to be made at regular city rates, their meter to be within the city limits at the point their own line begins.

France to Seek Pact With Italy

PARIS, April 15—(AP)—Premier Edouard Daladier and his cabinet advisers laid plans today for a "double duty" Franco-Italian agreement.

Sources close to the foreign office said conversations would be started next week to reach an accord along the lines of the Anglo-Italian pact to be signed tomorrow in Rome.

The proposed agreement would be designed to do double duty in case of trouble in Europe or North Africa.
Daladier's associates said that first, however, he must get 160,000 strikers back to work.

A step toward ironing out the labor problem was taken by the executive committee of the metal workers' union, representing the strikers, which accepted a six-point government proposal as the basis for possible immediate solution of the strike wave.

Utility District Election Planned

ALBANY, April 15—(AP)—The Linn county court designated this week the precincts and portions of precincts within the scope of the proposed Linn county people's utility district which will be voted upon May 20 in the primary election.

Within the boundaries of the proposed district are 32 complete precincts, 15 other portions lie along its borders and seven are entirely excluded.

\$2500 Fire Hits Dallas Sawmill

Expend \$112,000 To Improve PGE Country Service

MT. ANGEL, Ore., April 15—(P)—W. M. Hamilton, division manager for the Portland General Electric company, said here that the company is making service improvements in Canby, Woodburn and Mt. Angel estimated to cost \$112,800.

A 24,000-volt transmission line is being built from Beaver Creek through Canby, Barlow, Aurora, Hubbard and Woodburn to Mt. Angel. Another source of power capable of carrying the Woodburn load, exclusive of the canary, will be supplied by the 11,000-volt line which runs from Mt. Angel through Gervais to Woodburn.

Trawler's Crew Members Rescued

BOSTON, April 15—(AP)—The crew of the diesel trawler Exeter of Boston, whose frantic call for help broke off with mysterious suddenness during the morning, was picked up late today by coast guards, who reported the Exeter was burning south of the Nova Scotia coast.

The coast guard cutter Algonquin reported she picked up Captain James V. Nickerson and the eight men in his crew all were well and uninjured.
While Captain Nickerson said he would make no statement about the cause of the fire, coast guards reported after part of the Exeter was burned to the water's edge, and that her mainmast was gone.

Joy Discourages Suit Against UCC

Trate claimants of benefits under the state unemployment compensation law who contemplate legal action to collect claims are advised to proceed under "slow bell" by J. C. Joy, labor's representative on the state unemployment compensation commission.

"Administration of the law is progressing smoothly in the vast majority of cases but in handling more than 60,000 claims scattered instances of delay in payment have been noted," said Mr. Joy.

The commissioner explained that claim determination procedure provides for hearing in case of dispute, review by referee and further review by special referee if dispute persists. Within 30 days after the decision of the commission has been final, any party aggrieved may secure judicial review by commencing action in the circuit court of the district in which the claim was filed.

All testimony at any hearing on a disputed claim is recorded and witnesses are paid by the commission. Such fees and all expenses of proceedings within the commission except charge for services rendered by counsel or other agent representing the claimant are deemed a part of the expense of administering the unemployment compensation act.

Picketed Vessel Sails, Portland

PORTLAND, Ore., April 15—(P)—Manned by an unidentified crew, the Shepard line freighter Sea Thrush tied up here three days by a Sailors' Union of the Pacific picket line, sailed tonight for Los Angeles, its dispute with the union still unsettled.

A last-minute order to Capt. Ludwig Oetting, secretary of the local AFL masters, mates and pilots union, for first, second and third mates to leave the ship was ignored.

Harold C. Jones, US shipping commissioner, said five of six sailors who walked off were paid their wages "by mutual consent." He said other sailors might have been shipped under coast-wise articles, which would provide for discharge at the last port of call.

Valley Project's Passage Is Seen

Willamette valley's \$56,000,000 irrigation, flood control and navigation project virtually was assured by President Roosevelt in his radio address Thursday night, Governor Charles H. Martin said yesterday.

The governor said he accepted the president's address to mean that this project would be included in the public works program.

The project previously was approved by the federal army engineers.

Utility District Backed For Parts Yamhill, Polk

McMINNVILLE, April 15—(P)—A resolution passed by McMinnville grade No. 71 advocated formation of a people's power district in those parts of Yamhill and Polk counties that voted favorably in the recent special election on a proposed seven-county district.
