

Calls Halt to Quarrels, Sea

Agreement - Signed for Italy, England at Palace in Rome

if evacuation is not completed earlier.

2. Britain in return agreed to work through the League of Nations toward recognition of Italy's conquest of Ethiopia.

3. Italy reassured Britain she not only held no territorial or political aims in Spain but also sought "no privileged economic position" in Spain or Spanish possessions.

4. Italy adhered to the 1936 London naval treaty among Great Britain, the United States and France.

5. Italy agreed to withdraw troops from Libya at the rate of at least 1,000 a week until the peace-time strength of possibly 30,000 men should be reached.

6. Both countries reaffirmed their Suez canal convention of 1888 which guarantees free use of the Suez canal at all times for all powers.

7. Italy reaffirmed guarantees regarding Lake Tana, Ethiopian source of the Blue Nile, in a clause of the accord in which Egypt participated.

8. Both countries agreed not to use propaganda against each other.

Reaffirm Status Quo Of Sea Area

9. Both reaffirmed the gentlemen's agreement of January, 1937 and the Mediterranean status quo which that agreement involved.

10. Italy abandoned all claims to influence in Arabian territories bordering the Red Sea and across from Eritrea and Italian Somaliland. Both agreed to respect the integrity of Saudi Arabia and Yemen.

11. Both agreed to exchange information on major prospective movements of armed forces in the Mediterranean, Red Sea, Gulf of Aden, the Sudan and other regions. They agreed to notify each other in advance of any new naval or air bases in the eastern Mediterranean, the Red Sea and the approaches to the latter.

12. Boundary issues and related matters in the East African region are to be negotiated.

13. Italy was granted certain rights in the British Aden protectorate.

14. Italy reaffirmed her June, 1936, assurance to the League of Nations that natives of East Africa would not be used for military service except for local policing and defense. In other words, Italy will not raise a black army in Ethiopia.

15. Italy promised British nationals full religious freedom in East Africa and agreed to allow British missionaries to continue their work there.

16. Extension of full British trading facilities to Ethiopia and a promise by Britain to prevent raids into Ethiopia from neighboring territory.

All turned their faces to the skies and felt—rain.

"It rained in seven years where we come from—now when we did get a drop the grasshoppers and rabbits ate it up," La Duke related. "We just got beat out, that's all."

"I plan to buy myself a farm here in Oregon and I want money enough to make a down payment, too."

The youngest member of the La Duke clan was born in a terrible blizzard at Cheyenne, Wyo., the parents related.

Five of their 7 children are married. All were named in alphabetical order. The last is known as "Q."

"When we got to the last one—That's Q. We couldn't decide for a name," the father explained. "My wife wants to call him Quentin."

Clifford Niles Reports Flight to Hawaii From Oahu in Army Plane; Is Stationed at Largest Air Field

Excerpts from a letter received by Mrs. Glenn C. Niles from her son, Private Clifford D. Niles, 18th Wing headquarters, Hickam field, Territory of Hawaii, where he is serving at present as a member of the first military guard to be established at the United States army's newest and largest flying field:

"Have had two nice trips recently. Managed to get a night off from guard duty and got to fly over to Hawaii, the biggest island of the group to stay all night and come back the next day. Left here (Oahu) about 9 a.m. and was over there at 11:15 a.m. Saw all the main islands of the group, although we did not pass directly over them. Our whole flight was over water between Oahu and Hawaii. Saw several schools of fish and many of the navy's ships.

"The 'Big Rock' as we call Hawaii seems to be nearly all lava flows. Morse field is between two arms of the flow of 1868. We went down about 200 feet in one of the lava caves near the field and found it quite interesting with much hanging rock, somewhat resembling giant drops of wax.

"We wanted to go swimming but none of us had thought to bring our suits, not even Lieutenant P—who had flown the ship, so all of us including P shed our things and had a swim. You must gather from this that the field is quite isolated, which it is. Takes two hours to cover 18 miles into the nearest town which is a small plantation settlement.

"Went fishing in the evening and caught several good ones—amongst us enough for a swell breakfast.

"There is much more to see over on Hawaii than here for it is a lot less affected by white people and there are fewer Japanese and Chinese there. You come much nearer having the true Hawaiian people who are really very friendly when they get to know you. There are a few who live within a few miles of the field and they teach the men who come as caretakers all the native arts of fishing, cooking, etc.

"We returned the following day, arriving in time for dinner. It was one swell trip.

Visits Radio Station

"Then last Sunday I had another day off and made a trip part way around the island (Oahu) with a man here at the field who has his own private car. Saw the RCA radio station that picks up the short wave broadcasts from the States and is also used for sending messages to and from the States. Over here there is no Postal Telegraph or Western Union—it's all RCA communications.

"Also saw one of the world's most powerful radiohouses—7,500,000 candlepower, and it is a very high cliff. Due to an almost total absence of fog it is possible to place the light houses much higher than on our Oregon coast."

Photo Class Lab Equipment Given

The recent purchase and loaning of equipment for class use include an enlarging camera, copying camera, adjustable camera stand and a paper cutter and make it possible to accommodate a larger number of students than formerly.

Recently a background for portraiture was constructed and a battery of lights arranged. Besides practice in making studio portraits opportunity is given for laboratory experience in all phases of the photographic art which would interest the average amateur. Special attention is being given to the taking, printing and enlarging of pictures which are not only technically correct but which at the same time are valuable for their artistic qualities. Retouching, tinting, reducing and intensifying and other operations practiced by the professional retoucher are given attention. The instructor has had years of successful experience as a commercial photographer.

The classes in photography are available at the old high school on Tuesday, Wednesday and Friday evenings.

Governor Boosts For Trade Treaty

Says Northwest Interested in Completion, Pact With Britain

"The citizens of Oregon, as well as the northwest, are vitally concerned in the early completion of the Anglo-American trade pact now being negotiated," Governor Charles H. Martin yesterday telegraphed Secretary Cordell Hull at Washington.

"Lumber manufacturing in the northwest is the greatest employer of labor in this section," Governor Martin continued. "Mills in British Columbia are busy while in the northwest they are idle, with consequent unemployment."

"The advantage the Canadian operators have in the United Kingdom, with the existing tariff against American lumber. Operators, is enough to prevent shipments from the northwest to the United Kingdom."

"Labor costs are so much greater in the northwest than in Canadian operations that anything less than an absolute parity would be of no practical benefit here. The northwest country was very much disturbed at the concessions made to the Canadian lumber operators in the recent American-Canadian trade pact."

"Employers and employees alike feel that anything else than absolute parity in the Anglo pact would be rank discrimination and would carry with it continued unnecessary business stagnation and unemployment."

Gill Replies, Perry Charges

Grangemaster Aspirants Disagree on Reports of Voting Trend

KLAMATH FALLS, April 16—(AP)—Ray W. Gill, candidate for re-election as state grange master, replied today to a charge by his opponent, Ralph W. Perry, that he was claiming leadership in the election in order to influence the vote by reiterating that returns to date indicated he held an approximate 2-1 lead.

The estimate, he said, was based on 85 unofficial reports from granges all over the state. He said the voting was about 85 per cent complete and that official results would be announced May 6.

Denies Klamath Claim

It is interesting to note that Mr. Perry claims Klamath county, but a check-up reveals I will lead him here by a ratio of 3 to 2 according to 10 granges which have already voted," Gill said.

Perry's statement, issued in Portland today, said unofficial returns from 77 out of some 350 granges gave Gill 1367 votes to 971 for himself.

Perry claimed to lead in Hood River, Marion, Gilliam, Morrow, Umatilla and Klamath counties, and conceded to Gill Douglas, Linn, Josephine, Jackson, Sherman, Deschutes, Melheur and Harney counties. He listed remaining counties either as approximately even or with returns too meager to indicate who led.

Perry charged that Verne Livey, "a strong Gill partisan," had claimed eastern Oregon granges had given Gill a 2-1 majority, and had picked out granges in which Gill led in the voting as a basis for the estimate.

"He failed to include those carried by me when he made his tabulation," Perry contended.

Perry Charges Hindrance

He charged further that "the present master and his little clique have done everything possible to prevent me from reaching the grangers with my program. And in the final stages of the campaign they go even so far as to give out misleading results to indicate I have no chance of winning."

Gill, in his reply, said that "despite the abusive tactics of Mr. Perry and some of his supporters the fact is that Mr. Perry has had the same treatment from all candidates. He demanded some unreasonable things of me, which had he read the law, he must have known I could not grant."

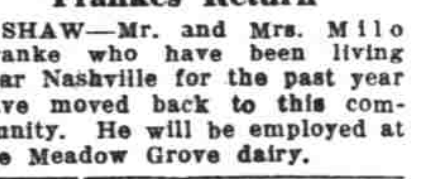
