WASHINGTON, April 21—(AP)—The Public Works administration said today 42 Oregon projects with a total estimated cost of \$3,690,164 would be eligible for appropriations if congress provided new funds recommended by the president and other conditions were met.

Secretary Ickes emphasized that no allocations had been made for the projects which had been "studied and reported favorably by various PWA preliminary groups."

"The projects will have priority over thousands of others for which applications have been made and which are now in various stages of examinations," Ickes explained.

(The projects listed were given preliminary approval on a 45 per cent grant and 55 per cent loan basis.)

The Oregon projects include: Statewide, highway surface, \$56,972 grant; Corvallis, university building, \$165,000 loan and \$135,000 grant; Oswego, dispensing plant, \$22,000 loan and \$18,000 grant; Oak Grove, waterworks, \$10,944 grant; Clackamas, auditorium, \$23,200 grant; Milwaukie, high school addition, \$11,475 grant; Roseburg, schools, \$4,181 grant; Reedsport, school addition, \$7,413 grant.

Junction City, school improvements, \$18,000 grant; Eugene, electric distribution, \$3,494 grant; Linn county, surfacing, \$23,690 grant; Brownsville, bridge, \$17,785 grant; Albany, courthouse, \$126,000 grant; Salem, courthouse, \$266,404 grant.

Independence, high school addition, \$18,000 grant; Yamhill county, highways, \$1,722 grant; Newberg, high school addition, \$64,829 grant.

LOS ANGELES, April 21—(AP)—Wallace Beery, burlesque star who appeared with Jackie Coogan in two of his pictures during the child film star's rise to fame, came to Coogan's aid today in his fight for an accounting of the \$4,000,000 he claims he earned in the films.

Beery declared in a newspaper interview that Jackie's late father, Jack Coogan, had told him on numerous occasions that the young actor would receive all his earnings when he became 21.

"Not once, but many times—more than a dozen, I think—Jack told me that he had never used or intended to use a cent of the money earned," Beery said.

Every penny the boy was making was being put away and saved for him, Jack said, on several occasions. He was careful at all times to impress everyone that Jackie's money would be all his—and rightfully—when the kid reached man's estate.

Hundreds Killed, Quakes in Turkey

ANKARA, Turkey, April 21—(AP)—The Anatolia earthquake toll of dead and missing soared to at least 800 today after a night of continued shocks which 50,000 homeless spent in mad terror.

Terrific underground rumblings were accompanied by intermittent earthquakes over a wide area of western Asia, bordering the Aegean sea, and especially about Kirshehr, Yoz-ad and Tchormuz.

Panic stricken refugees fled from crevices full of boiling water.

Eighteen villages were utterly destroyed, and 22 others were badly damaged.

Whole families were buried under mountainous debris. Most of the victims were women and children.

Strike Said Plot To Deny Benefits

ASTORIA, Ore., April 21—(AP)—Worth Lowry, business agent of the Seaside and Jewell locals of the Sawmill and Lumber Workers' union, charged today that the Converse & Hitchmen Logging company fomented a strike of 40 employees to escape payment of unemployment compensation during an expected shutdown.

Lowry said the union would ask Ralph Campbell, attorney of the compensation commission, if an offer to return to work constituted eligibility for unemployment pay. The act provided that individuals were not qualified if unemployment resulted from a labor dispute.

Industrial Arts Exposition Today

The new senior high school shops will be placed on public inspection from 1 to 4 and 7 to 9 p.m. today as the city's first school industrial arts and vocational education exposition is staged by pupils of the junior and senior highs. The exhibits and demonstrations of wood and metal working, agricultural shop work, automobile servicing and mechanical drawing will be open to the public without charge.

Special features of the exposition will be demonstrations with the 12½ inch reflector telescope designed by E. L. Bradley, amateur astronomer, and constructed in the high school shops; of a 1000-egg chick brooder and of new mechanical drawing reproducing equipment.

Further Study of Power Rate Made

PORTLAND, April 21—(AP)—Administrator J. D. Ross of the Bonneville project and members of the Oregon hydro-electric commission discussed plans today for insuring a proportionate advantage to the consumer from "very low" wholesale rates from Bonneville dam.

The group will meet again next Tuesday, with representatives of organizations interested in public power districts and heads of municipal power systems of Eugene and McMinnville in Oregon and Ellensburg, Washington. Conferees said today the only method open to the Bonneville administration to enforce low retail rates would be through contracts with municipalities, power districts or private utilities buying the power for distribution.

Ross said he and George W. Joseph, chairman of the hydro-electric commission, envisioned a setup for public power resale in which districts would pay the wholesale cost of power, operating and fixed costs set up a fund for amortization of bonds, an emergency fund and pay a normal tax or sum in lieu of taxes.
