

Span Sites at Gates Viewed

Present Location Gets Engineers' Favor; Eye Suspension Type

Marion and Linn county courts, engineers of the two counties and about 20 Gates residents gathered at Gates yesterday to discuss location of a proposed new bridge across the Santiam near Gates.

Residents of Gates are interested in having the new bridge built directly across from the town in order to eliminate a circuitous route now necessary in crossing the river and to make the road come out near the Gates district school, across the river from the town.

Suggested Bridge Larger
Engineers who viewed the location of the present bridge and the location proposed by the Gates people expressed the opinion that a bridge at the proposed site would be more than twice as expensive as a new one at the present site. Width of the river at the present site is 170 feet and at the proposed site 350 feet.

Phillip M. Stephenson, bridge construction engineer of the state highway department, accompanied the Marion county court to Gates.

Inspect Waterloo Span
The Linn court expressed favor of a suspension type bridge instead of truss construction. Judge Stegmund will probably go to Waterloo today with Judge Barrett of Linn county to inspect a suspension bridge there which the Linn court has found very satisfactory.

It is necessary to build a bridge somewhat stronger than average in order to hold up under possible future use by logging trucks.

nearby road were endangered by flying debris and miners a mile or more away reported their homes were shaken.

A house near the mouth of the mine was blown to bits and three eight-ton electric motors used for hauling coal cars were blown from the mouth of the shaft down the mountainside. Hobart Hartman, mine foreman, said he saw timber "just raining," after the blast.

Dewey Runyan, Tipton foreman, estimated between 50 and 75 miners were in the shaft when the explosion occurred.

State Police Sergeant P. L. Sprenger of Roanoke, who was at a filling station on the highway near the mine, hurried to the scene. He said miners were calmly helping rescue crews to open the blocked shaft, early tonight.

(In Pittsburgh, J. J. Forbes, district chief of the U. S. bureau of mines, said he was informed the blast occurred at the time shifts were changing around 4:30 p. m. He said reports that smoke and flame came from the mine's mouth indicated a "widespread explosion."

Both youths had previous criminal records, although neither had been involved in a serious crime until they engaged in the night-long rampage for which they were sentenced today.

They began with three hold-ups in Seattle and later kidnapped five persons and carried them in a stolen automobile to Portland, where the captives were released and the machine abandoned. The boys made their way to Oakland, Calif., before being captured.

Prospect Distant For European War

With Germany busily engaged in consolidating her gains since "Anschluss" with Austria, there is no imminent danger of general war in Europe, in the opinion of Dr. Ivan Lovell, head of Williamette university's history department, who spoke before the Salem Ad club yesterday noon.

Dr. Lovell, English-trained, dwelled at length on relations of Great Britain with the rest of Europe. He said England's position in international affairs is the weakest since the World War. The fact that England now has fewer ships but a greater population, the fact that her dominions, notably Canada, are more independent, and England's vulnerability in case of attack—London is only a few hours by air from Berlin, Moscow, or Rome—were some of the factors that, he warned, weakened England's standing, he said.

Cooperatives will be required to certify that the quantity of dried fruit sold to the FSCC does not exceed the quantity of natural prunes held unsold and uncontracted by grower members at the time the dried prunes were accepted.

Coogan Case Put Off Until May 2

LOS ANGELES, April 22.—(AP)—The task of checking up on the money Jackie Coogan earned as a movie star today caused a court to postpone until May 2 further action in The Kid's suit for an accounting against his mother and his stepfather.

Counsel for Jackie and for the Arthur L. Bernsteins agreed that further time would be necessary to complete a check of the books of Jackie Coogan productions, the Jackie Coogan finance company and those of the Bernsteins.

Superior Judge Emmet Wilson also ordered Mrs. Bernstein's deposition completed by May 2 and granted her permission to amend certain answers. Jackie's attorney has charged her deposition, which was given last Monday, conflicted with statements given at the time of a guardianship proceeding.

Two Millions for Panay Case Paid

TOKYO, April 22.—(AP)—One of the gravest international incidents of the Chinese-Japanese war, the sinking of the United States gunboat Panay, was closed officially today when Japan gave the United States a check for \$2,000,000.

The check, handed to Eugene H. Dooman, counselor of the American embassy, by Seijiro Yoshizawa, director of the bureau of American affairs, paid in full the claims submitted by the United States a month ago today.

Other demands made by the United States after the Panay and three Standard Oil vessels were bombed in the Yangtze river December 12 already had been settled. Japan accepted full responsibility for the incident and assured the United States the men responsible for the attack had been punished.

Rev. Lyman Makes Stayton Farewell

STAYTON—Rev. W. H. Lyman will appear before the congregation of the Stayton Church of Christ for the last time Sunday. Rev. and Mrs. Lyman and children, will leave next week to take up his new work as pastor of the Court street Church of Christ in Salem.

A special service has been arranged with Luke Douglas, pastor of the Shore avenue Church of Christ in Los Angeles, being the guest speaker. He is making plans to take up missionary work on the Island of 'Amaiki.

No selection of a successor to Rev. Lyman has been made.

Portland's Trade Drops for Week

PORTLAND, April 22.—(AP)—Dun's Business Review said today retail trade in Portland tapered off normally, from 10 to 12 per cent, in the week following Easter.

Sales of new automobiles continued at less than 50 per cent of the volume of the corresponding period in 1937. Hotel business was at a low ebb. Plumbing supply houses reported a slight increase in business, with a less than normal gain in building activities.

Realtors to Value Capitol Property

The appraisal committee of the Salem Realty board has been asked by J. M. Devers, attorney representing the state in the condemnation suits to acquire property wanted for the enlarged capitol site, to make appraisals of the property involved.

The appraisal will be made early next week, it was indicated at the realty board luncheon Friday. Members of the committee are J. F. Ulrich, chairman; Melvin Johnson and W. G. Krueger.

Martin E. Stone Dies at Albany

ALBANY—Martin Eber Stone, 67, a brother of Clara Burch of Marion, died at the Albany hospital Thursday following a lingering illness. Arrangements are in charge of the Fisher Funeral home, and are to be completed later.

Martin Stone was born in Money Creek, Minn., February 2, 1871, and was a resident of that state until 1902, when he moved to Washington. In 1908 he moved to Halsey where he located on a farm, but had lived a retired life since 1905. On March 15, 1931, he married Hattie E. Lyons in Minnesota.

Mrs. Stone survives as do three sons, George of Portland, Lloyd of Albany, and Glen of Olympia, Wash. Beside the sister at Marion he is survived by four brothers, all living in Puyallup, Wash.
