Lead is 11,000

For 28 Counties
Latest registration figures from 28 of the 36 Oregon counties gave the republicans a lead of more than 11,000 over the democrats.

Of the counties that reported Thursday Klamath remained in the democratic column while Lane, Polk, Marion and Sherman maintained republican majorities.

The democrats made small gains in all five counties while the republicans showed gains in Lane and Polk.

The total registration today stood at 439,628 with Baker, Clatsop, Jackson, Josephine, Malheur, Umatilla, Wallowa and Washington counties yet to report.

The registration for the primary election two years ago was 416,186, which established a new record up to that time.

Officials predicted that this year's primary election registration would exceed that of two years ago.

Return from all of the counties were expected to arrive here not later than Wednesday of next week.

Otto Geissler, 17, appeared in court later, wearing the brown-shirted uniform of a Nazi storm trooper. He was charged with carrying a knife during the riot. The youth was defended by a Jewish lawyer, Joseph Ellison, who said that although discrimination was made against his race in Germany, he was happy to go to the youth's defense on instructions from the court. Ellison said he wanted Geissler to take the thought back to his organization that a Jew had defended him.

Though those remarks seemed tinged with pessimism, Ford predicted economic improvement when industry and business begin revitalizing themselves.

Referring to his alleged statewide campaign against alleged labor terrorists, the governor declared, "If you would compromise with lawlessness, don't reelect me governor."

"Some of my critics say I've bludgeoned labor," he added. "Get that, will you? Why, I'll ram that down their throats. We're been giving the honest working man a chance. Any American that fights unions is a fool. They're here to stay."

"All sensible people believe in labor's right to organize, its right to peaceful picketing and strike. But I don't want to see principles of government, founded by our forefathers, lost."

laid. Definitely and irrevocably we are in the lists to stay until the American people recapture their heritage.

"Make no mistake, this is not a third party. As certain as the sun rises, we are launching the party of our time."

In a final break with the national administration Governor LaFollette paid tribute to the "brilliant leadership" of President Roosevelt but declared that leadership alone, no matter how great, "cannot mix political oil and water."

He said that if the task of rehabilitation had been supported by popular confidence and affection for the leadership of Roosevelt, the job would have been done long ago under his administration, but that party dissension had undermined and hamstrung the administration.

LaFollette did not disclose the identity of "important leaders" his secretaries previously had announced had joined the new party movement.

One, it is believed here, is his brother, Sen. Robert M. LaFollette, Jr.

Mayor Fiorello H. La Guardia of New York has spoken sympathetically of the governor's plans.

Most of State's Apples Are Sold

PORTLAND, April 28.—(AP)—With Oregon shipments to date totaling 227 boxes compared with 2905 for the previous season, less than 80 carloads of apples remain for marketing in the Hood River and southern Oregon districts, C. J. Hansen of the bureau of agricultural economics said today.

Averages on the eastern weighted auction increased from \$1.21 in January to \$1.58 a box in April.

England - Italy Pact Has

among British and French premiers and foreign ministers, declared:

"We arrived without difficulty at complete agreement. Without exaggeration, all conversations were most cordial, everyone being fully aware of and fully understanding the necessities we have to face."

"On all important points an accord has been reached—and on certain problems of vital interest never before obtained."

Technical staff talks between the land, sea and air forces of the two countries, to map details of life-saving strategy if diplomacy fails to avert a European conflict, were expected to begin shortly.

The French endorsed Chamberlain's policy on easing European tension—founded on his counter weapon, the conditional British agreement with Italy.

The ministers put off until tomorrow the most dangerous immediate question—the problem of Czechoslovakia, where a Nazi German minority has increased its clamor.

Agreement on these points emerged from the meeting headed by Daladier and British Prime Minister Chamberlain:

1.—The British-Italian friendship pact—despite French fears of Italian and German domination in Spain through the support the fascist countries have given Spanish insurgents.

2.—Continuance of the "hands off Spain" policy as the best insurance against embroiling the rest of Europe in war.

3.—Mutual defense preparations—both military and economic—with technical staff talks probable soon.

4.—The procedure to talk at Geneva to gain recognition of Italy's conquest of Ethiopia—which Italy has demanded as a price of renewed friendship with the two countries.

February to an indictment charging arson in connection with the burning of a West Salem lumber (Copeland) yard and the box factory there last November. The fire damage was estimated at from \$100,000 to \$130,000.

Others indicted on a similar charge included Al Rosser, ex-chief of the Teamsters' union at Portland; Clarence Adams, for-hall at Portland; and Ernest Carson, Cecil Moore and John Newland, all former Teamster union members.

Carson, Newland and Moore pleaded guilty and await sentence. Rosser and Adams pleaded innocent.

Two Sentenced to Jail at Hillsboro

Ernest Leland Kell and Orville Hart, former Teamster union members who pleaded guilty to charges of breaking windows in a Beaverton restaurant, were sentenced to serve nine months each in the Washington county jail at Hillsboro today.

Kell changed his plea from innocent to guilty today just before the case was to go to trial.

Ellis Burr Russell, who pleaded guilty to a similar charge, will be sentenced May 7.

The drive against labor terrorists, which opened in Portland late in January, has resulted in 100 arrests to date. Sixty-eight indictments have been returned, 36 defendants have pleaded guilty to charges and 28 have pleaded innocent.

The 29 sentences included seven prison terms.
