Malheur county also stayed in the republican column with both parties reporting small increases. There were 2742 democrats and 2945 Republicans.

Four Counties
Swing to GOP

Of the 33 counties which have reported only 10 are democratic. Two years ago four of these counties were democratic.

Both republicans and democrats made gains in Washington county with a total registration of 19,266. Republicans led there 10,859 to 8018.

Wallowa county switched to the democratic column with the Bourbons leading 1942 to 1678. A new high mark of 3641 was set in that county.

Josephine county remained republican, 4590 to 3208.

The United States civil service commission will hold open competitive examinations for four positions, drafter, fireman for oil burner marine, oiler for diesel engines and quartermaster, with applications to be on file not later than May 13, Elbert Powell, secretary of the local board, has been advised. Salaries for drafter and quartermaster will be \$1440 to \$1800 a year and for fireman and oiler, \$1320 to \$1680 a year, all less \$420 a year for subsistence and quarters.

These examinations are to fill existing and future vacancies in the Portland engineer district. Competitors will not be required to report for examination at any place, but will be rated on their fitness and experience.
