

Vote Issue Is Held Republic

Revise Labor Measures, Balance Budget, Is Scott's Message

Revise labor legislation, restore confidence in the American dollar, balance the budget. The latter, he said, would be a long, hard pull. "Cataclysmic" methods of reform will not work, he asserted.

C. S. Emmons presided over the rally, which was sponsored by the Marion County Republican club and drew a crowd of approximately 500. Dr. P. O. Riley introduced the principal speaker, and Grant Murphy of Stayton, chairman of the county republican central committee, introduced the candidates for offices covering the congressional district, who spoke briefly, and the Marion county legislative candidates who merely "took a bow."

Hendricks stressed development of resources. R. J. Hendricks of Salem, candidate for governor, emphasized complete development of Oregon's resources, penal reform and respect for the state's pioneers, mentioning the two funds he has guaranteed to the state in exchange for modernizing the prison and parole system and marking historic spots.

"They say I'm a dreamer," Hendricks said, and then pointed out some of his "dreams" that have come true, particularly Salem's wool and canning industries which he helped to establish.

Charles L. Paine of Eugene, also a gubernatorial aspirant, said the problem before the nation was that of human adjustment, and urged that republican policy grow out of meetings of the "town hall" type arranged by precinct committeemen, so that the party's policies would reflect what the people are thinking.

M. S. Shattuck of Milwaukie, for the same office, emphasized labor problems but said the public was to blame for labor troubles because it had not developed a system for settling labor disputes as it has for all other varieties. He also mentioned tax problems and advocated continuation of the tax leagues throughout the state which were effective during the Meier administration.

Sam H. Brown of Gervais, for governor, was represented by Joe Prange who said Brown's record as a state senator spoke for him. Clarence Wagoner of Portland was represented by B. G. Skulason, who said the republican party should have a plan, and that Wagoner offered the one devised by Dr. Francis E. Townsend.

Mrs. Charles A. Sprague read a telegraphic greeting from her husband, Salem candidate for the governorship who is campaigning in southern Oregon.

Morley Represents Congressman Mott

Congressman James W. Mott was represented by Lawrence Morley, who mentioned that Mott had voted with the new deal on such matters as relief and the housing program but had opposed it on measures he thought were unsound, such as the unemployment bill and the recent reorganization bill.

Walter Norblad, opposing Mott for the congressional nomination, hit out at the theory of "lifting ourselves by our bootstraps" but insisted that the republican party must progress. He also assailed the administration's ideas of an "adequate" navy, declaring they were unnecessarily extravagant.

Rufus C. Holman, candidate for US senator, was represented by Rex Davis of Albany who cited Holman's record of efficiency and economy as state treasurer. Alex G. Barry and Roscoe M. Ireland, candidates for the short term in the senate, were the first speakers.

Earl Snell, secretary of state, and Charles A. Rice, candidate for superintendent of public instruction, both unopposed in the primary, spoke briefly. Rice said he was confident of election in the fall "because it's going to be a republican year."

C. H. Gram, state labor commissioner seeking renomination, was represented by Charles H. Elroy of his office.

11 Legislative Aspirants Presented

Legislative candidates introduced were Hannah M. George R. Duncan, Walter Fuhrer, Romeo Gouley, Harold G. Pruitt, Frank W. Settlemyer, Ed A. Jory and John F. Steelhammer, running for the lower house, and Douglas McKay, Edwin Keene and Ronald Jones, for the senate. Harley Libby, Leroy Hewlett and Jim Smith, candidates for county commissioner, were introduced.

Entertainment included numbers by a quartet from Williamette university, community singing led by William McGilchrist, sr., and music by Harry Wesley's orchestra which also played for the dancing following the speaking program.

Nevada Snows Yield Body of Girl



Slopes of the high Sierras recently gave up the body of Mrs. Marian Gilbert, 22, missing since last February, deepening a weird Nevada mystery. Half covered by melting snow, the body was found by a searching party headed by her husband, William Gilbert, just 150 yards from the little cabin at the Carson mine from which she vanished into a snowstorm February 9. Officials disclosed that examination showed no signs of external violence. However, Gilbert said the former Menlo Park, Cal., socialite, was well used to mountain country and was "the last person in the world to be lost in a snowstorm."—LIN photo.

Report Is Filed on State's Railroad Traffic, Tonnage and Revenues for Years Since 1930; Improvement Seen

Freight revenues within the state of Oregon decreased from \$30,716,403 in 1930 to a low of \$15,486,477 in 1932, and then steadily increased to \$27,828,790 in 1936, according to a statistical report of the state utilities commission filed with Governor Charles H. Martin yesterday.

Passenger traffic revenue reached a low of \$1,936,650 in 1932 but increased to \$2,999,450 in 1936. This was a decrease of 37.87 per cent when compared with 1930.

Total operating revenues for the year 1936 were 14.06 per cent less than in 1930, but this reduction was more than offset by a greater reduction in operating expenses of 19.88 per cent for the same period, resulting in an increase of net revenue of 15.11 per cent.

Tons of freight hauled in Oregon in 1936 were 1,484,144 less than in 1930, and only half as many tons of freight were hauled in 1932 as compared with 1930.

The number of revenue passengers carried decreased to a low of 746,449 in 1933, which was 56 per cent less than in 1930. By 1936 the number of passengers carried had increased to 1,251,711, which was 26 per cent less than in 1930.

During 1936 there were 3,815.95 miles of main track operated in Oregon, 62.47 miles of second main track, and 1,259.92 miles of industrial tracks, yard tracks and sidings or a total of 5,134.84 miles. This was 1.53 per cent less track than in 1930.

Freight, mail and express car mileage decreased 64.53 per cent and total car mileage 19 per cent over the 10 year period. The report showed that during 1936 there were 183 grade crossing accidents with 26 deaths and 62 injuries.

Guest speakers will be Rev. Joseph C. Robbins, foreign secretary of the American Baptist Foreign Mission society; Rev. Lewis J. Julian, pastor of the San Francisco First Baptist church; and Miss Louise B. Carter, director of the Mexican Baptist Christian center at Los Angeles.

Rev. Irving A. Fox, host pastor, will bring the welcome to the convention at the 2 o'clock Tuesday afternoon session and Rev. E. B. Luther, state president, will make the response following which Rev. Alfred Danielson will preach the annual sermon.

Mission Women Meet
Tuesday will also bring the annual meeting of the Women's Baptist Mission society, with welcome by Mrs. Arno Q. Weniger of Salem and response by Mrs. H. P. Seance. The morning will be given over to business sessions and at night the women's pioneer banquet will be held, carrying out the theme, "Oregon's Pioneer Bridges." Reports and election of officers will complete the session of this group.

The Baptist ministers' conference will be in session Tuesday morning, with Rev. Robbins and Rev. Albert G. Johnson the main speakers. Tuesday night the Oregon council of Baptist men will hold the annual banquet, with K. K. Adams of Salem toastmaster. Speakers will be H. J. Maubetsch and Rev. Julian and election of officers will be held also.

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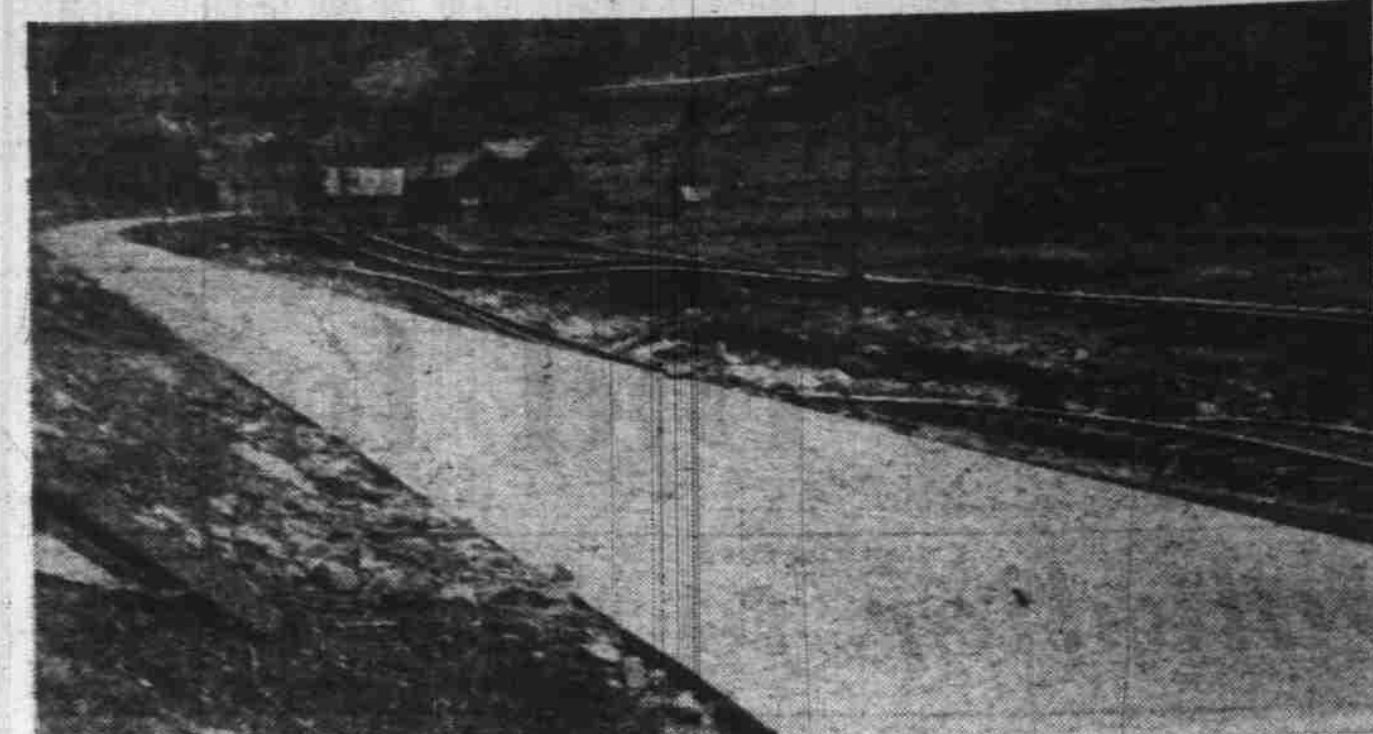
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Idaho Floods Recede, Leaving Railroads Out Commission

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Many Building Permits Taken

Steel Warehouse Accounts for Major Part of \$20,400 in Day

With the Salem Steel & Supply company yesterday procuring a \$12,500 warehouse permit, W. L. Hain a \$3000 warehouse permit, permission being granted for one \$2100 and one \$2460 home, the city building inspector's office did the largest volume of business since April 8.

Valuation on yesterday's permits totaled \$20,400, while the \$30,000 permit issued the Terminal Ice & Cold Storage company on April 8 boosted that day's permits to the highest of the current year.

Yesterday's permit granted the Salem Steel & Supply company was for a 186 by 85 foot concrete warehouse, to be constructed at Front and Court streets, to be used for a store building as well as a warehouse. It will also be a change of location for the company, its building at present being situated at 125 North Front.

The permit granted W. L. Hain was for the construction of a building at 100 west Chemeketa, where he is establishing a boat building plant in compliance with the terms of a lease on the property there, recently granted him by the city of Salem.

Balance of yesterday's permits were: A. J. Flint, to erect a one-story dwelling and garage at 585 Shipping, \$2400; Mrs. F. D. Martin, to erect a one-story dwelling and garage at 2255 Trade, \$2100; W. H. Clark, to erect a one-story garage at 305 North 24th, \$40; D. Young, to erect a one-story private garage at 2275 Fairgrounds road, \$300.
