Europe Awaits Czech Reply to Nazis



While one hundred Sudeten Germans in three huge cross-country buses started from Praha, Czechoslovakia, to witness Chancellor Adolph Hitler's triumphant entry into Rome May 3, Europe waited anxiously for President Eduard Benes to make his reply to Nazi demands. British Laborite Arthur Henderson arrived in Praha for conferences with officials and is reported to have pointed out to Konrad Henlein, Nazi leader, that British public opinion "regarded with disfavor" his eight-point program. Among the points were autonomy for the German districts and a change in Czechoslovakia's foreign policy, which now regards the state as a buffer to German expansion eastward.

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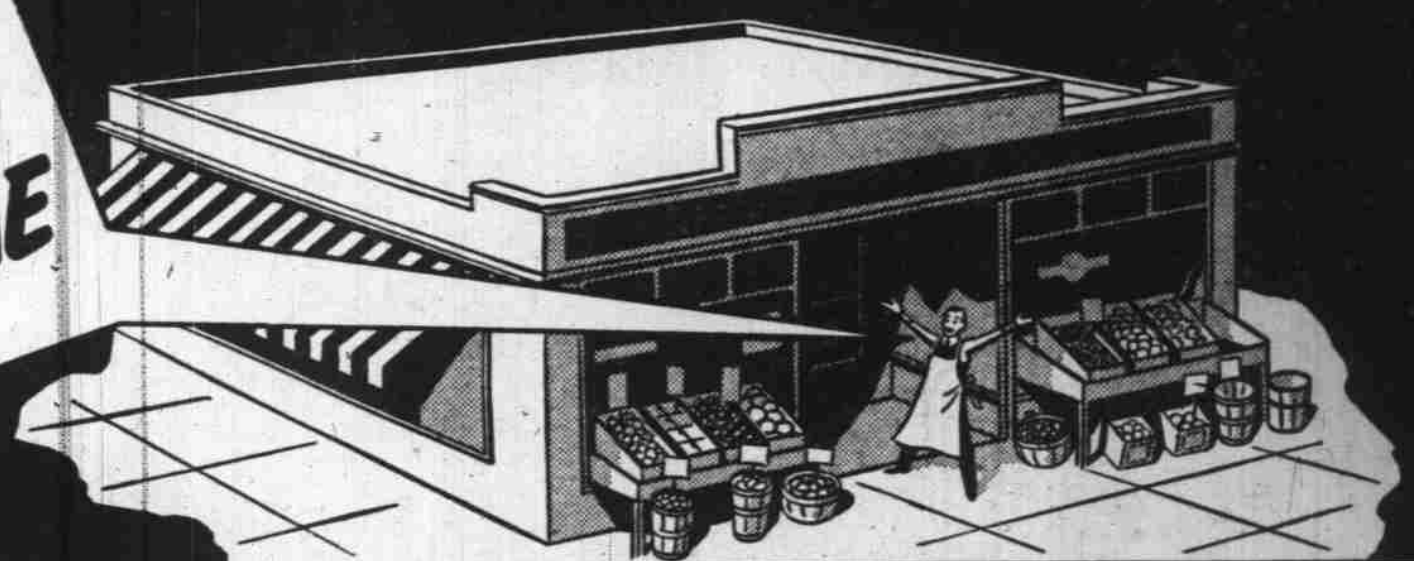
