

Trust Fund of UCC Is Large

State Bureau's Status Said Good Despite Receding Business Conditions

Despite Oregon's jurisdictional labor dispute and subnormal employment conditions in other industries, the state unemployment compensation trust fund totalled \$5,168,908 on May 1.

Collections from all sources to May 1 aggregated \$7,729,508 while disbursements from the fund covering jobless workers amounted to \$2,560,596. An excess of \$5,168,908 is available for benefit payments during the current month.

"The fund shows a healthy status," Comptroller J. D. Berwick declared.

The comptroller pointed out that the sawmill dispute and lack of employment generally exerted cumulative effect on the benefit fund because reduced purchasing power was reflected in other industrial pursuits.

Fund's Status Good

On January 2, 1938, start of the claim filing period, total cash in the trust fund was \$5,323,652. Collections for April payable May 20, plus accrued interest, were estimated at \$490,000. This sum added to the total cash on hand places the cash reserve at \$5,813,652. Against this is accruing liability for benefit payments during the current month.
