News of West Salem

WEST SALEM—The city council met Monday. Councilman Douglas of the police committee reported that an attempt had been made to apprehend the purported gasoline thieves. Discussion was given hiring of a special officer to apprehend gasoline thieves.

Mr. La Due reported that the Rosemont sewer project was completed to Elm street. The grading of Sixth, west of Rosemont avenue, was discussed. After considerable discussion of the cost of regrading the streets, a motion was passed to have the county scrapper tear up the streets and grade and oil them.

A letter from Mr. Pines was read and his proposal to do the engineering work on the improving of the drainage canal from the Wallace road to the river for \$25.00 was accepted. A petition was read seeking the improvement of Ruge street between Rosemont and Senate avenues.

A petition was presented objecting to the use of the city park for a tennis court. Several petitioners spoke upon the subject. It was voted to stop further progress on the tennis court project in the city park and to have the mayor appoint a committee to work with various city clubs on a tennis court project, with power to act. It was voted that the city stand the expense of the survey of the city park for tennis court purposes.

It was voted to change the name Seventh street, between Rosemont and Gerth avenue to Eighth street.

The city recorder gave his quarterly report.

Mr. H. D. Bradley brought up the subject of wood sawing and wanted to know how far the city was going to go in the prosecuting of people cutting up wood for resale. He was unofficially informed that unless complained about he probably would not be bothered.

It was decided to transfer the amount of \$119.12 from the street fund to the sewer fund because of materials in that amount which had been erroneously charged to the sewer fund instead of the street fund.

It was voted to authorize the city recorder to have a nurseryman make a planting of shrubs in front of the city hall.
