"Nothing to say" was his reply to a query as to whether one of the subpoenas was out for US Sen. Joseph P. Guffey.

pany had been discriminated against in connection with the proposed purchase of 11 pianos for the Oregon State college.

Erwin asked a readjustment of the trade-in schedule recommended by the state board of higher education.

"If you will give me this entire contract I will save you \$50," Erwin said.

The state board of higher education recommended that the purchase of six pianos be awarded to Sherman, Clay & company and five pianos to the Collins & Erwin company.

The board of control agreed with Erwin that the trade-in schedule should be readjusted in fairness to both piano firms.

E. Harden Davis, Falls City, appeared before the board and protested against the treatment he had received from the state relief committee. He said his \$25 monthly allowance was insufficient.

Davis also charged that a clerk in the relief office had been discredited.

"I came to Salem on several occasions to talk with you," Davis declared in addressing Governor Martin, "but I was not allowed to enter your office."

"Who stopped you?" the governor asked.

"Mr. Gosselin, your private secretary," Davis replied.

Governor Martin told Davis that his office was open to all citizens of Oregon and that he should not have been stopped.

"I'll look after this," Governor Martin concluded.

Billion Voted For Farm Aid

50 Millions Increase by

ed \$25,000,000 for loans to tenants who want to become farm owners, while the house had approved but \$15,000,000 for this purpose. The senate also increased from \$2,500,000 to \$15,000,000 funds available for the purchase and retirement of poor farm lands.

The senate made \$26,000,000 available to start government crop insurance, to apply first to wheat. This amount was 1,000,000 above the house figure.

The bill also contains an item of \$187,500,000 for federal aid to highways.

WASHINGTON, May 9—(AP)—Representative James W. Mott said today that Oregon would receive \$4,276,000 for 1940 and 1941, its share of the road authorization bill. With 1939 funds, the money will enable the state highway commission to carry out a long range program. Mott said the state would receive \$566,000 annually for grade crossing elimination.

Bend Jail Escape Caught, California

BEND, May 9—(AP)—Sheriff Claude McCauley was advised today of the arrest at Merced, Calif., of Victor Val Haskins, alias Jack V. Maney, who saved the bars of the county jail here and escaped April 19.

Merced authorities said Haskins, facing a forgery charge here, would fight extradition to escape possible prosecution as an habitual criminal.

Nevada officers notified Sheriff McCauley the prisoner was wanted also in the southwest.

20 Canneries Are Picketed, Seattle

SEATTLE, May 9—(AP)—About 20 Puget Sound fruit and vegetable canning and processing plants were picketed today while representatives of the cannery workers' union state council declined to meet with negotiators appointed by E. Pat Kelly, director of the state department of labor and industries.

The negotiators, A. Lou Cohen of Seattle and C. Moran, Yakima, spent several hours with the negotiating committee of the Associated Producers and Packers, Ivan H. Moorhouse, Olympia, W. J. Vary, Puyallup, and J. C. Rich, Everett (CQ), of the union.

The negotiators listened to the packers' side and said they would consider this before deciding their next move.

Union spokesmen said they would not negotiate with the packers until a wage scale of 37 1/2 and 47 1/2 cents per hour, posted last week, is withdrawn.

Seasonal Building Spurs Lumbering

WASHINGTON, May 9—(AP)—The country's lumber industry reported the return of spring and seasonal building, reported today the first improvement in orders and shipments in many weeks.

The National Lumber Manufacturers' association said mill operations still were down but these undoubtedly would increase as orders accumulated and stocks decreased.

For the week ended April 30, the association's production of 491 reporting mills was 151,721,000 feet compared with 178,004,000 feet produced by 548 reporting mills the preceding week.

New orders booked by the 491 mills for the week ended April 30 totaled 176,521,000 feet, compared with 183,757,000 feet received by the 548 mills the preceding week. Shipments totaled 190,789,000 feet, and 180,980,000 feet, respectively.

River Steamer Launched
PORTLAND, May 9—(AP)—Launching of the \$225,000 stern-wheel river boat Jean, first large vessel constructed here in 15 years, was witnessed by 3000 persons Saturday.

Ford Glass Shop Blast Kills one

DETROIT, May 9—(AP)—An explosion of a chemical tank in the glass-making shops of the Ford Motor company's River Rouge plant today killed one man and injured 16 others.

The dead man was Edward Wasilewski, 56, a Ford employee for 15 years. He was killed, plant employees said, when the tank, about six feet in diameter and 15 feet high, was upset in the process of laminating safety glass.

The force of the blast that followed blew a large hole in the roof of the building.

Five of the injured were hurt seriously. They were Mark Heston, John Polinski, Arthur Lons, George Brodie and William Johnson, all burned by acid and struck by flying debris. All were taken to Henry Ford hospital.

The remaining 11 injured men received treatment at an emergency hospital inside the Ford grounds.

Flood Is Feared On Mississippi

MINNEAPOLIS, Minn., May 9—(AP)—Lowland residents near Aitkin, Minn., fled tonight before the rising Mississippi river as national guardsmen evacuated at least four farm families near that village and federal flood warnings were posted for points downstream from Aitkin.

Northern Minnesota streams, choked to the highest levels in 20 years in some cases, dumped their overloads into the main channel which was three feet above flood stage at Aitkin early tonight and creeping upward.

More than 800 WPA workers bolstered weakened bridges and piled sandbags along threatened dikes, as they took cheer from forecasts there would be no rain tomorrow. Damage to highways in northern Minnesota alone already was reported to Gov. Elmer Benson at more than \$1,500,000.
