put. Administration leaders are, nevertheless, highly confident of the outcome.

Other Portion of Fund Already Voted
The \$3,000,000,000 in the bill is an integral part of the program of \$4,500,000,000 in loans and expenditures which President Roosevelt proposed several weeks ago as a means of increasing general purchasing power. The remaining \$1,500,000,000 was provided in previous legislation for highway building, for CCC camps and for loans by the Reconstruction Finance Corp.

All six Washington democratic congressmen voted for the bill. Two of Oregon's democratic congressmen voted "aye," as well as Republican Representative Mott.

Convicts' Strike Is not Extended

SAN QUENTIN, Calif., May 12 (AP)—About 300 of San Quentin's 1,000 convicts went on a "sit-down" strike today to protest against the discontinuance of a 45-minute noon relaxation period but prison officials said the demonstration lasted only five hours. The prisoners stopped work in the shoe shop, the barber shop and the tailor shop.

German Is Denied Peek at FBI File

WASHINGTON, May 12 (AP)—An agent of Germany sought in vain today to look through files of the federal bureau of investigation, which J. Edgar Hoover heads.

Dr. Richard Paulig, the reich representative, asked permission of the German-American mixed claims commission to examine the files in search of documents relating to the munitions disasters at Black Tom and Kingsland, N. J., prior to this country's entry into the world war.

The commission is considering claims made against Germany on the grounds that the disasters were caused by German spies.

Dr. Paulig charged that some documents bearing on the Black Tom and Kingsland cases had been removed from the justice department's files, and that Hoover had denied him access to others.

Migratory Birds Act Is Sustained

PORTLAND, Ore., May 12 (AP)—The biological survey said today a lower court decision upholding the migratory bird treaty act prohibiting shooting over baited areas had been sustained by the United States circuit court of appeals at San Francisco.

Four southern California duck clubs failed in an attempt to enjoin federal officials from arresting members for hunting on baited grounds.

US Probes Desert Mystery Airport



Hidden in the desert fastness near Twenty Nine Palms, Cal., government agents recently discovered a secret airport. Complete with a mile-long runway and wind indicators, the airport is accessible by only one little used road. "Hangers" for planes were found in a rock fissure completely camouflaged by canvas. Living quarters, underground, have reportedly been found with enough food to last a few men many months. The flying field is distinguishable only by a huge white rock, shown in photo. The field is in a natural valley, the run of which commands a view for many miles around.—U.S.

"a wild panic," and announced that on the first day this country showed signs of economic recovery his group would "spring into action with an organization drive such as this country never saw before."

Lewis scowled at economists who contend the best depression remedy is lower wages and lower prices. He said that if wage reductions, "shrinking purchasing power and the consequent lowering of the living standards of consumers" make for economic appeasement, then the Chinese people, who have "an average income of \$30 a year" would be "the happiest and most prosperous people on earth—which they are not."

While business and political leaders "talk about the right to work and do nothing about it, 13,000,000 bread-winners are out of jobs," he said, "and their families represent a third of the population."

LaGuardia to Ask Oregon Take Part

PORTLAND, May 12 (AP)—A telegram sent by Mayor Joseph K. Carson, Jr., from New York today said Mayor Fiorello LaGuardia of New York City would visit Oregon this summer to ask that the state participate in the World's fair of 1939.

The telegram said Mayor LaGuardia "hopes negotiations will be resumed as Oregon is too important to be omitted."

night Sianchen would be captured within 48 hours." At Hangchow, seat of the Chinese government, however, officials declared defense forces were resisting the Japanese advance toward Kweiwei despite the most intensive Japanese artillery bombardment since Nanking.

(With strong, long prepared positions held by amply provided veteran troops, they expressed confidence they still could stop Japan's vast offensive.)

With the rising sun flag flying over Amoy, island seaport, 600 miles south of Shanghai, Japanese marines continued mopping up Chinese stragglers who were unable to escape to the mainland.

There was no indication the Japanese planned to extend their south China attack to the mainland where the Chinese hold innumerable natural defense positions.

Fishway Working Well, Bonneville

PORTLAND, May 12 (AP)—Dr. Willis H. Rich, ichthyologist and director of research for the state fish commission, said today the spring Chinook salmon were passing over fishways at Bonneville dam at the rate of 2000 a day.

"All I can say is that the ladders are working admirably," he said, "and that they are passing fish into the upper river. The prospects are that the run will increase in volume shortly. I can't tell whether the present fish represent the main run or whether they are merely the vanguard of the main run."

Timber Bids Will Be Eyed Thursday

WASHINGTON, May 12 (AP)—The interior department announced plans today for the emergency sale of 26,315,000 board feet of timber along the Oregon and California railroad and Coos Bay wagon road in western Oregon to keep lumber mills in the region operating during the next two or three months.

Power Co-op Organized In Coos-Roseburg Area

ROSEBURG, May 12 (AP)—The West Douglas Power cooperative completed tentative organization last night to construct, with federal assistance, a line extending along the Roseburg-Coos Bay highway for 40 miles, to serve about 500 consumers.

He declared there is vital need for "continued respect for the judicial tradition of independence and impartiality."

This was the chief justice's first public address since the fight last summer over President Roosevelt's proposal to reorganize the judiciary.

PORTLAND, May 12 (AP)—The federal bureau of agricultural economics said today Oregon potato shipments last week increased 50 percent over the previous week, totaling 116 cars.

Prices held firm on good quality Klamath and Deschutes stock. Movements were lighter from Idaho and Washington.

Prices for all varieties of apples were firm with a stronger tone for Delicious as the release of Yellow Newtons brought heavier shipments.

ROSEBURG, May 12 (AP)—Mrs. John Nachter, Jr., crossing the Umpqua river by boat to attend a party, noticed a swarm of bees following her boat. She obtained a hive and captured the swarm when it alighted in a lilac bush.

The bees swarmed again and she recaptured them after which Mrs. Nachter joined the party. Returning home, a third swarm overtook her boat, and Mrs. Nachter filled a second hive.

Francis C. Benson To Face Charges

DALLAS—Formal charges were filed here today by District Attorney Bruce Spaulding against Francis C. Benson, charging embezzlement. Benson was arrested by Deputy Sheriff Williams here Thursday morning, charged with taking bread from the Dallas Bakery, where he was employed, and then selling it on his own account.

Benson was arraigned before Justice of the Peace Charles Gregory here Thursday afternoon and was bound over to the grand jury. Bond was set at \$500.

Baker, Deschutes Jobs not Assured

WASHINGTON, May 12 (AP)—Senator E. A. Reames (D-Ore) office said today a misunderstanding had led to an erroneous belief the Baker and Deschutes reclamation projects were assured. The projects, listed for \$500,000 each, were included in a group "ready to go" but lacking final approval.

Prisoner Denuded by Attire Owners

MEDFORD, Ore., May 12 (AP)—Ronald Rollo, charged with seven burglaries here, appeared for his arraignment in circuit court in borrowed clothing after being the unwilling principal in a "strip tease" act.

A. E. Whitman of Klamath Falls appeared at the jail Wednesday and claimed the suit Rollo wore, Gene Thorndyke, local bank executive, previously claimed his shoes and a third man his shirt.

Reduced to socks and underwear, Rollo borrowed white trousers from the palter this morning, a shirt was provided from the jail wash line and a fellow prisoner loaned him shoes.

18 Convicted for Knox Law Breach

PORTLAND, May 12 (AP)—A state liquor control commission report today showed total fines of \$1167.99 and imprisonment of 1020 days imposed upon 18 defendants convicted of liquor law violations in April.

Commission inspectors arrested 25 defendants in 22 cases of alleged violation. One case was dismissed and six are still pending.

The commission revoked one license last month and suspended 31 others for a total of 1131 days.

Since the first of the year, 110 defendants were convicted in 88 cases. Penalties aggregated \$9448.70 in fines and 12,469 days imprisonment.

Says Martin Cut Electrical Costs

PORTLAND, May 12 (AP)—State Public Utilities Commissioner N. G. Wallace, in a radio address last night, said utility consumers had saved \$1,185,240 annually under the administration of Governor Charles Martin.

He listed rate reductions as \$940,000 in electricity charges, \$161,792 in telegraph and telephone, \$38,400 in gas and \$46,342 in steam heating.

Wallace said the administration cost of the utilities department declined \$83,000 in the last year, and that the motor transportation section's revenues exceeded the department's expenses by \$825,000.
