**Joint Graduation Program Is Held**

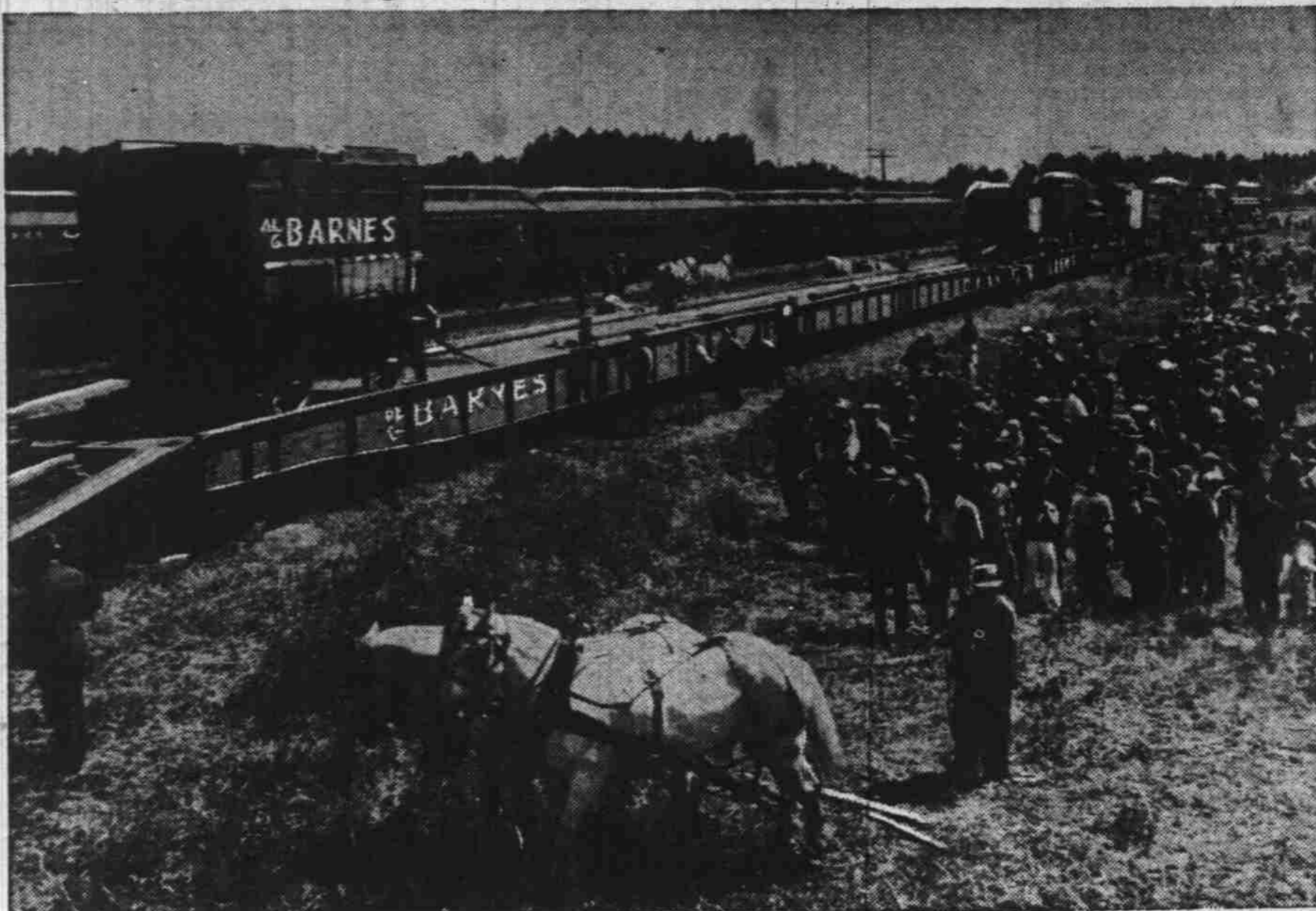

**Barnes Circus Coming Today**

Linked With Sells-Floto; Shows at Madison St. at 2 and 8 p.m.

"La-a-deez an' gen'l'mun, your atteghshun please!" This time-honored salutation will resound through the city today, for the Al G. Barnes and Sells-Floto combined circus arrived at dawn this morning, to the boundless delight of children of all ages.

Shortly after arriving the caravan of bright colored wagons, horses, elephants, zebras and camels were on their way to the 15th and Madison streets show grounds, where two performances will be given today at 2 and 8 p.m.

Crowds gathered at the show grounds early this morning to see the tented city erected like a magic carpet before their eyes. Without confusion or loud voices, tent after tent arose, until there were acres of them. Within two hours the work was practically completed, the mammoth big top, the menagerie, the side show, dressing rooms, cookhouse, that serves three healthy meals a day to over six hundred circus employees, the blacksmith shop, the hospital, in fact everything that goes to make a complete community.
