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a diagonal path across the peak. A wheel, tire and one motor were found 500 feet from what remained of the fuselage.

In the fore compartment were found the bodies of Willey and the co-pilot, Fred Whittemore, who was to have taken the controls at Las Vegas, Nev., and flown it to St. Paul, where it was to have been placed into service by the Northwest Air Lines.

Two of the victims were Richard, three, and Judith, two and a half months, children of Mr. and Mrs. Henry Webb Salisbury of St. Paul. The bodies of the baby and Mrs. Salisbury were found together; that of the boy and his father some distance away from the main mass of wreckage.

The other victims, all burned beyond recognition, were Miss Lola Totty, Glendale; Mrs. Carl B. Squier, North Hollywood; and Miss Evelyn Dingle, St. Paul.

SAN LUIS POTOSI, Mexico, May 18.—(AP)—Pres. Lazaro Cardenas tonight charged Gen. Saturnino Cedillo with plotting an armed uprising against the government.

Speaking in the home state of General Cedillo, the president said the "strong man" of San Luis Potosi had been engaged in "subversive activities" in his native state as well as in other parts of the republic with the "aid of agents, who toured the country and abroad, trying to find prolees for an inconceivable rebellion."

He charged Cedillo conferred with representatives of foreign oil companies both before and after the government expropriated their properties March 19, adding that "agents of the foreign oil companies, too, tried to find traitors" but their efforts were fruitless because "the people have united to defend the fatherland's interests."

The president said the government would let Cedillo remain at his estate, Las Palomas, but stated he would have to surrender his arms and ammunition to state military authorities and convert his "private army" in reserves of the regular army.

Highway Bonds to Match US Amount

The state highway commission, at a meeting in Portland June 16, will sell \$750,000 of short term bonds to match federal funds.

Officials said the sale of these short term bonds would make it possible for the highway commission to proceed with the construction of roads involving a cost of \$1,500,000 without waiting until next January.

Bids for construction of a number of highways also will be received at the next meeting of the commission.

PENDLETON, May 18.—(AP)—The 33rd annual state convention of the International Order of Odd Fellows elected P. J. Schneider, Hubbard, grand patriarch and prepared to end its meeting with the election of grand lodge and Rebekah officers tomorrow.

Ancient Walls Already Removed

Though military bulletins referred to attacking the city's walls, those ancient structures actually were leveled off several years ago, leaving some gates, dykes and fortifications so that Suchow could not be considered a walled city in the same sense as Nanking and Peiping, which the Japanese already control.

The leveled remainder, however, still presented a formidable military objective.

Nippon's advancing lines were said by the Japanese to form a gigantic net extending from the Yellow river across the vital Lungshai railway to Suhsien, 45 miles south of Suchow.

The capture of Suhsien, by forces moving north, left only 60 miles of the Tientsin-Pukow railway unconquered and a column was reported moving north to join the attack on Suchow.

Search for River Victim Fruitless

Troopers Say Condition of Santiam Unfavorable to Finding Body

Though Bert Walker, member of the game division of the state police, and Officer Williams of Eugene, oldtime boatmen and riverman, spent all of yesterday dragging the Santiam river near where Dr. A. Bertschinger, Portland naturopath, was believed to have fallen in sometime Monday, no trace of the body was found.

"We made a thorough search of the river for three miles down from the spot where Dr. Bertschinger's fishing pole was found lodged in bushes, but the elements were all against us," Officer Walker said last night.

Walker said the water was deep, cold and exceptionally swift in that part of the river, flowing at an estimated speed of from 10 to 12 miles per hour.

Dr. Bertschinger's fishing pole was found lodged in bushes near a ledge sloping into the river, according to Officer Walker, and it is believed that he slipped into the river.

"Whether he might have been knocked unconscious by his head hitting on rocks before entering the water or he fell straight into the river, is a question," Walker said.
