Two Republicans Seek Senate Long Term

For United States senator the republican candidates are Rufus C. Helman and Robert N. Stanfield; for the short term from November to January 3 A. C. Barry, Reade M. Ireland and T. McNary Wood. For first district representative the candidates are James W. Mott, incumbent and Walter Norblad.

Earl Snell is unopposed for secretary of state, and Charles A. Rice for superintendent of public instruction in the republican primary. C. H. Gram, incumbent, and David F. Graham of Multnomah county are running for commissioner of labor.

Democrats face a choice for the governorship nomination between Henry L. Hess of Union county, Charles H. Latta, incumbent, and David F. Graham of Columbia county. Carl J. Donagh of Multnomah and Willis Mahoney of Clatsop seek nomination for US senator, and Robert A. Miller is unopposed for the short term. Andrew C. Burk of Marion, W. T. Miller of Josephine and Earl A. Nott of Yamhill are running for first district congressman. Emily F. Edson is unopposed for secretary of state nomination. John W. Leonard of Union county and Re. Punnam of Lane, incumbent, are running for superintendent of public instruction. Clarence F. Hyde of Lane and Paul J. Roth of Multnomah are running for labor commissioner.

Two Senators, Four Representatives to Be Chosen

In Marion county the republicans will choose two nominees for state senator from among three candidates: Ronald E. Jones, Edwin Keesh and Douglas McKay, incumbent. Nine are running for four places in the lower house; Walter Fuhrer and Hannah Martin, incumbents; George R. Duncan, Romey Goulet, H. R. Jones, Ed A. Jory, Harold G. Pruitt, Frank W. Settemer and John F. Storcham.

Democratic candidates for the state senate, T. A. Livestry and H. O. White, are assured of nomination. There are five candidates for the four seats in the house; Cora H. Cooter, O. H. Lipps, G.

W. Potts, Bessie M. Richards and Walter L. Schrock. Three Each in Commissioner Race

For county commissioner, republicans will choose between Leroy Hewlett, incumbent; Harley Libby and Jim Smith. Democrats seeking the same office are E. G. Kingwell, H. M. Potter and C. T. Sweeney.

Three supreme court justices are to be elected, or two candidates nominated for each position if there is no majority. For position No. 2 the candidates are Henry J. Bean, incumbent; George T. Cochran of Union, Roy R. Hewitt of Marion, John W. McCulloch of Multnomah, Howard K. Zimmerman of Clatsop. For position No. 3, J. O. Bailey, incumbent, and B. S. Martin of Marion are running. For position No. 5, Hall S. Lusk, incumbent, James T. Chinnock of Josephine and I. H. Van Winkle of Marion are the candidates.

President Asks Grain Loan Fund

CHICAGO, May 19 (AP)—The United States, some grain traders observed tonight, has prospects of maintaining a good position in the world wheat market, at least until the harvest of new crops in Argentina and Canada, because wheat prices are the lowest in four years and have been declining with prices in other exporting countries.

Simon Mayer, a leading exporter, has estimated 50,000,000 bushels of wheat valued at about \$90,000,000 will have been exported by July 1 since the harvest a year ago.

"If the railroad management insist on going through with their attempt to cut employees wages 15 percent, the only ultimate result will be a nationwide strike."

Workers Underpaid Now Avers Union Statement

"The railroad workers of America, already grossly underpaid, simply will not accept a wage reduction of any kind. They have already been heavy sufferers from the railroads' policy of putting the payment of interest to wealthy bondholders above decent living standards for their employees."

The labor executives said they would observe the railway labor act, which provides machinery for adjusting disputes, before they resorted to a strike, but added:

"The railroads cannot be convinced that a wage reduction is not only unjustified, but is absolutely dangerous to the economic structure of this nation, it will be necessary for the railroad employees to use their economic strength to save the railroad industry from committing social suicide and dragging other industries along with it."

Callahan said the rubber company's midnight shift did not enter the plant and brought operations virtually to a standstill. The firm currently employs approximately 6,000 persons. Callahan said at least 85 percent of these are union members.

PORTLAND, May 19 (AP)—Eleven private airplanes brought mail from more than twice that many cities to connect with regular airlines as Oregon observed National Airmail Week today.

Private Utility To Sell to TVA

NEW YORK, May 19 (AP)—The long deadlock between TVA and utility systems in the Tennessee valley, over disposition of private properties in the face of government competition, was broken on a major scale for the first time today when directors of National Power & Light Co. voted to sell out their interests in the Knoxville area.

They recommended to stockholders the acceptance of an offer of \$7,900,000, made by Knoxville and the TVA, for properties of a subsidiary, Tennessee Public Service Co.

The directors' decision came after the TVA and Knoxville authorities, backed by \$400,000 of their offer of \$7,500,000 made a week ago—and which, at the time, they characterized as "final."

Estabrook Trial

HILLSBORO, Ore., May 19 (AP)—Trial of Jack Estabrook, former business agent for the AFL warehousemen's union, was recessed until Monday after he denied he was at the William Fugy store at Rockton when a bomb was thrown Memorial day, 1935.

Plea of guilty to a charge of property destruction in connection with the incident have been entered by Melvin A. Boxarth and Leon V. Wallingford, who testified Estabrook had been an accomplice.

Estabrook also denied participation in window breaking at Portland and Astoria.

Both the state and defense will complete summations Monday.

Woodburn Woman Struck by Auto

Mrs. Lillian Callison, route one Woodburn, received a fractured left collarbone and head injuries when she was struck and knocked down by an automobile late last night on the Pacific highway directly in front of the state training school at Woodburn. WASHINGTON, May 19 (AP)—communications commission authorized the Bend, Ore., Bulletin today to establish a new radio station at Bend to be operated on 1,310 kilocycles, with power of 100 watts night and 250 watts day.

The commission denied an application by Elwood Warwick Lippincott, Inc., which also sought authority to establish a new station at Bend.

ment competition such as the one over-hanging utilities.

"Send the Corcorans, the Cohens and their kind back where they came from. Cease attacks on business. Provide a leadership under which all the people can unite."

"Make this program clear and then stick to it. . . . If these things are done I predict that within a period of from four to six months the country will move definitely from this depression, not to temporary recovery but to permanent improvement. 'Men Wanted' signs eventually would again hang on factory gates."

"If they are not done we must expect conditions to grow gradually worse. For talk of a recession is ridiculous. This is a depression—serious, deep-rooted, and progressive."

Weir said "hopes of an administration change of heart" already had been aroused by presidential conferences with business men but quickly dashed by "subsequent statements and actions of President Roosevelt."

French solidarity came in a surprise statement in which he declared France alone could defend her frontiers against "all attempts at violence."

"The London conversations (of April 28-29)," he said, "reinforced the Franco-British entente—an entente which threatens nobody, which on the contrary is a means toward European peace."

Two-Months Use Of Power Gains

Domestic power consumption in Oregon during February totaled 26,002,975 kilowatt hours, an 11.73 per cent increase over February, 1937. Public Utilities Commissioner N. C. Wallace said Thursday, January's total was 10.66 per cent more than in January, 1937.

Revenues for domestic service increased 5.42 per cent over February, 1937.

Commercial and industrial consumption dropped 15.65 per cent, revenues for this service decreasing 2.94 per cent.

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Jersey Enjoined, Ban on Newspaper

Federal Court Order Hits at Interference With Critical Sheet

TRENTON, N.J., May 19 (AP)—Federal Judge William Clark today signed an injunction restraining police officials of Jersey City and Hoboken, both in Hudson county, from interfering with sales of the New York Post, a daily newspaper.

During recent weeks the Post has carried a series of articles attacking Mayor Frank Hague of Jersey City and charges of mismanagement in the municipal affairs in the two cities. Hague is national democratic vice-chairman and leader of the party in New Jersey.

Arthur Garfield Hays, American Civil Liberties union leader, challenged police officers to arrest him tonight in a brief open air speech, but he was unharmed.

Hays climbed to the roof of the automobile, less than 30 feet away from a policeman in a traffic booth, and made a brief address to several hundred persons outside.</
