35 Dead, 13 Missing in Atlanta, Ga., Hotel Fire



Sweeping through the Terminal hotel with alarming rapidity, fire recently took a toll of 35 lives as more than a dozen were registered as missing. Some 10 or 15 persons were rescued or leaped to safety shortly after the fire broke out. A high wind fanned the flames, rendering firemen and fire fighting apparatus helpless to bring the blaze under control. After the fire had consumed the interior of the building, leaving only the walls standing, firemen and rescue workers searched the charred ruins for bodies.
