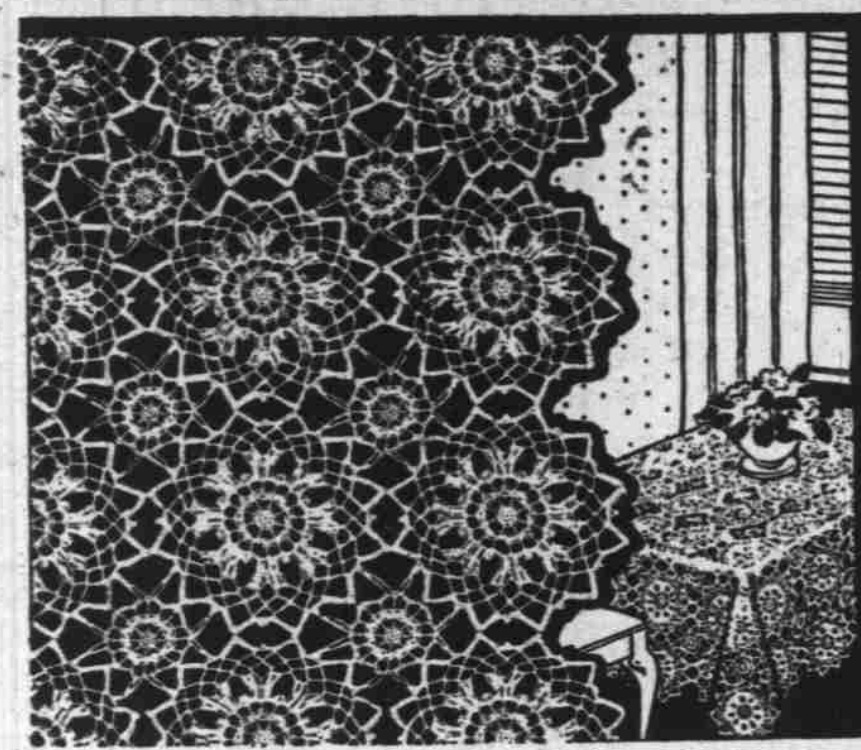

OSC Graduation Is Slated May 31

OREGON STATE COLLEGE—More degrees will be granted at the 69th annual commencement at Oregon State college scheduled for May 31, than have ever been conferred at one time at this institution, according to the tentative list of candidates for graduation compiled by E. B. Lemon, registrar.

The advance list shows 529 seniors who will receive bachelor degrees and 78 others who will receive graduate or professional degrees, making almost exactly 600 degrees to be granted, in case there are nonorary degrees to be conferred. The previous high graduating class was in 1923 when 522 degrees were conferred. This year five doctor of philosophy degrees are to be conferred, which is the largest number to attain this high scholastic achievement in any one year here.

Dr. Oswald W. S. McCull, pastor of the First Congregational church at Berkeley, Calif., will give the baccalaureate address Sunday, May 29. Dr. Joseph Mason Artman of Chicago, editor of the magazine Character in Every Day Life, will give the commencement address.
