

Relief Sitters Leave Hostelry

Unemployed Men Accept \$500 Offer Made by BC Aldermen

VANCOUVER, May 21—(CP)—Three hundred single unemployed men tonight accepted a city offer of \$500 to quit their sit-down demonstration in the lobby of Vancouver's second largest hotel and filed quietly from the building where they had held out for 27 hours.

Approximately 700 other members of the Unemployed Project Workers' union, holding similar demonstrations in the Federal building post office and the Vancouver Art gallery, remained sprawled on the lobby floors of those two buildings determined to hold out until a public works project is arranged to give them employment.

The offer of \$500 to the demonstrators in the Georgia hotel was made after a meeting of city aldermen before the Vancouver of Mayor George C. Miller from near-by resort.

Mayor Miller disapproved of the arrangement. He said: "We didn't show weakness when this thing started. Now we have shown weakness."

The mayor described the arrangement as an effort to "kid" the men for a few days.

The agreement was reached between officers of the UPWU and five city aldermen. Under its terms \$500 would be paid over to the union to be distributed at the rate of 50 cents per man per day until Monday when a permanent solution to the problem will be sought by the social service committee of the city council.

Any money remaining after the hotel sit-downers have been paid would be used to obtain provisions for the demonstrators in the art gallery and post office.

Men Make no Promises
The men made no undertaking that they would not resume their demonstration Monday if no permanent solution was found by the city council committee.

At 5:55 p.m. PST, the men left the places where they had squatted under potted palms in the hotel lobby for a day and a night.

Mayor Miller, who hurried back to Vancouver from a weekend holiday, said of the aldermen's actions:

"I think, myself, that you're only playing with the situation."

O. Henry Olsen, only other democratic gubernatorial candidate, polled 7799 votes in 1604 precincts.

Rex Putnam held a lead of 51,614 to 39,378 votes for John W. Leonardhardt from 1537 precincts for the democratic nomination as state superintendent of schools, while Charles A. Rice was unopposed for the republican nomination.

C. H. Gram polled 68,973 votes for labor commissioner to 37,663 for his republican opponent, David F. Graham, in 1537 precincts. Clarence F. Hyde led Paul E. Roth, 48,340 to 41,089 in the democratic race.

Hall S. Lusk, opposed by labor, polled an overwhelming majority of 108,896 to 26,756 for James T. Chinnock from 1450 precincts for the state supreme court, position No. 5.

Henry J. Bean was well ahead of opponents for position No. 2 with 82,719 votes from 1470 precincts. Others were George T. Cochran 14,058; Roy R. Hewitt 35,617; John W. McCulloch 38,320, and Howard K. Zimmerman 42,760.

In position No. 3, J. O. Bailey took 147,976 votes from 1450 precincts, compared with 50,819 for B. S. Martin.

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Portland Typo Secretary Blames New Deal for Labor "Radicalism" In Speech Before NW Republicans

SPOKANE, Wash., May 21—(AP)—W. A. Bowes, secretary of the Portland, Ore., local of the International Typographical union, AFL, charged "radicalism in the labor movement" to the new deal before the Pacific northwest section of the republican national policy committee here today.

Speaking to "my fellow republicans," Bowes said he wanted to "correct the feeling that labor is responsible for the widespread turmoil and strife within its ranks."

"The labor situation of today has been largely brought about by the new deal administration," George Kinnear, of Seattle, followed Bowes with the statement that "the biggest chance the republican party has today is to offer the average laborer a chance for protection."

Stanley Easton, Idaho policy committee member urged the group to furnish "a constructive program with a definite promise of the future to win youth away from 'the fantastic legislation of the new deal.'"

David Eccles, of Portland, re-committed of representative farmers for Washington, Idaho, Oregon and Montana would be formed to gather ideas among the farmers as to solution to the agricultural depression. Later, Eccles said, similar committees would function in other branches of endeavor.

25,000-Year-old Camel Bones Dug
WALLA WALLA, May 21—(AP)—Bones identified by Dr. H. S. Brode, Whitman museum curator, as those of the kamelus maximus, largest of the North American prehistoric camels, and estimated at least 25,000 years old, today were being scrutinized carefully at the museum.

Road workers near here unearthed the bones in an alluvial deposit 12 feet beneath the surface. The collection, Dr. Brode says, represents the most complete deposit of camel bones yet found in the Pacific Northwest.
