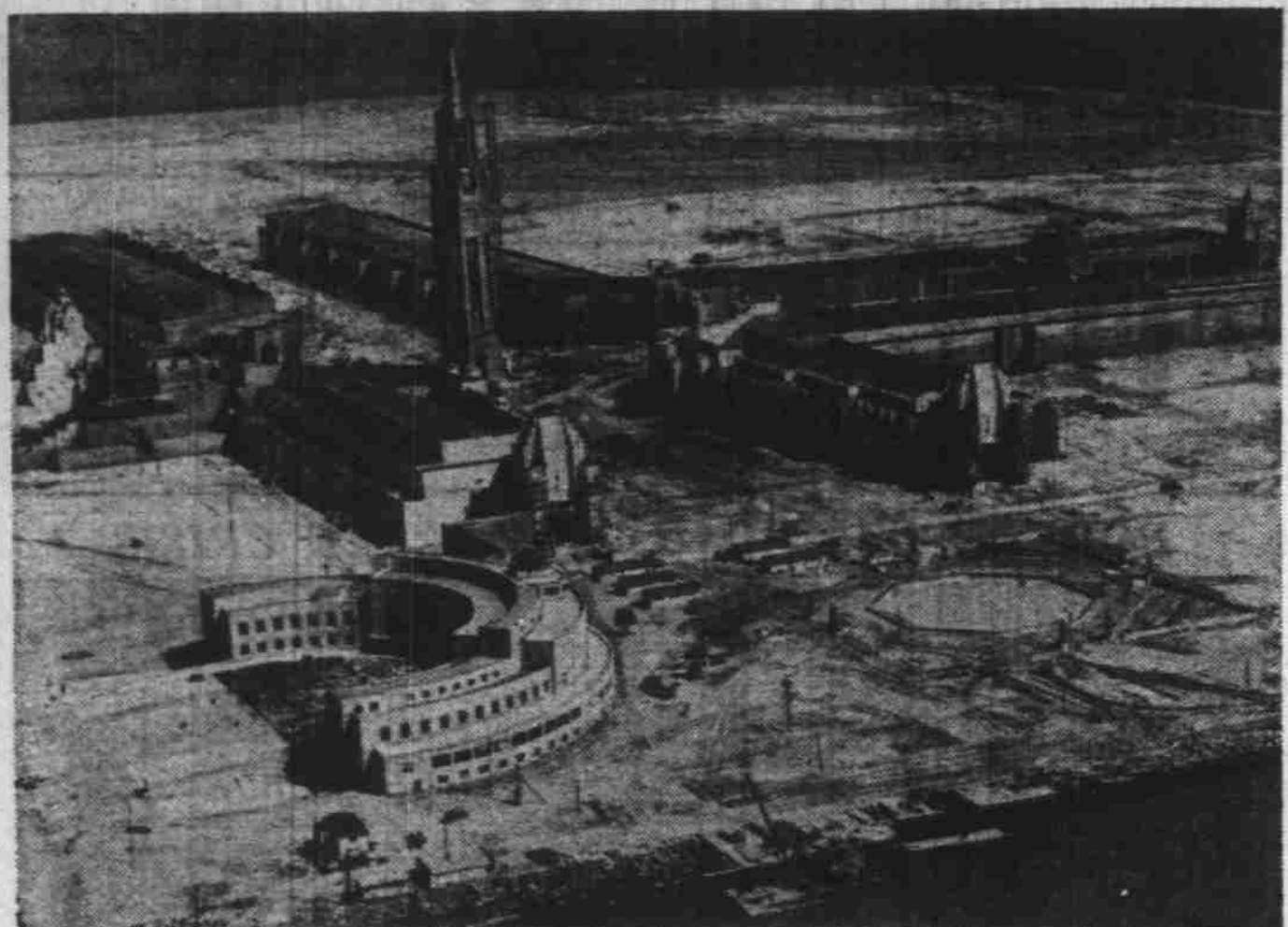

The three men, Patrick L. Whalen, W. P. Stevenson and Fred H. Paschal, were accused of beating Lawson fatally after his arrest for investigation as a hotel prowler.

President Wrong Harrison Asserts

Tax Bill Aimed to Assist Business, Bears Easier on Little Fellows

WASHINGTON, May 28.—(AP)—An old line southern democrat—Senator Harrison of Mississippi—told the senate today President Roosevelt was all wrong when he criticized the new tax law.

"Congress framed this tax legislation to help business. I only hope that what we had expected will not be dampened or thrown away by this speech the president made yesterday," Harrison said.

Raising his long arms to emphasize his words, he said: "Congress framed this tax legislation to help business. I only hope that what we had expected will not be dampened or thrown away by this speech the president made yesterday."

Harrison said Mr. Roosevelt had been "misinformed" in arguing that the new flat-rate capital gains taxes did not bear on the big and little taxpayer in proportion to their ability to pay.

Cooperation Denied
The Mississippiian said the treasury gave him "no sympathetic cooperation" when he sought recently to ease the tax load on debt-burdened corporations.

Harrison expressed regret that Mr. Roosevelt had let the new tax bill become law without signing it. "I would have much preferred that he had said he didn't like those (undistributed profits and capital gains) provisions and vetoed the bill," the senator added. "I have no fear of what would have happened in the American congress."

Kootenai Valley Flood Spreading

BONNERS FERRY, Idaho, May 28.—(AP)—The Kootenai valley's flood area spread over 7000 acres today, with crop damage alone estimated at \$180,000, as three dikes went out in the last 12 hours.

Reports which could not be immediately checked indicated possibly another thousand acres had been flooded downstream, near the Canadian border.

Every available man in the area was put to work on the levees

today and 200 others called in from the Pend Oreille lake district.

Latest of the valley's extensive dike system to give way was the Cow creek district dike, which flooded 1000 acres.

Earlier today dikes protecting districts No. 2 and No. 4 were broken. Sand holes and bad levees were reported in five more of the district's remaining eight levees.

Commencement at University Begins

Numerous Reunions Held; Degrees Will Be Given out Monday Night

EUGENE, May 28.—(AP)—Nearly 700 seniors whirled through the busiest parts of their collegiate lives today, participants in many events marking graduation week-end.

Monday night, the cap-and-gown clad army receives the rewards of college work—degrees. The first of the final honors which 66 University of Oregon graduates will receive as seniors went to Kessler Cannon, Toledo, who received the \$150 prize for first place in the Failing-Rebeckman oratorical contest, with Robert F. Bales, Wallawa, second. Bales received \$100.

Today's program was filled with such events as the annual meeting of the state Association of University Women, the semi-annual alumni business conference and a noon luncheon at which seniors made their first appearance in cap and gown. The luncheon also was the occasion for reunions of the classes of '33, '38, '39, 1908, 1918 and 1928.

In the afternoon, the alumni received President and Mrs. Donald Erb and tonight senior women and alumnae presented the traditional flower and fern procession followed by the twilight concert of the women's choral group.

Edward Maslin Hulme, professor of history at Stanford university, will deliver the baccalaureate sermon tomorrow night at 8 o'clock with the graduating exercises following Monday night at the same hour. Dr. Erb, who will address the seniors, also will be inducted into office at the exercises, which will be attended by Gov. Charles H. Martin and officials of the state system of higher education, including Chairman Willard Marks and Chancellor Frederick M. Hunter.

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when the alarm went out, was in the thick of the fight wearing street clothes, were of the belief that the fire started from a short in the electric wiring. A hole that was torn in the ceiling and wall by firemen, at the spot where the blaze evidently started, showed bare wiring. However, Dr. G. E. Prime, who along with his brother, Dr. Frank V. Prime, are owners of the building, said the wiring was but recently installed and supervised by a state wiring expert. Others at the scene voiced opinion that the fire had been started by fish smoking equipment in the rear of the market.

The fish market, operated by C. T. Ritchie and Paul Bassett, was the most damaged. While the fire itself caused but small loss, its awkward position made necessary the free use of axes and sledgehammers to cut through the slatted floor of water. The latter pouring into the fish market, combined with excessive smoke, did considerable damage. Bassett, who was at the scene, hesitated to say how much as he was uncertain as to whether the costly refrigerating machines are owned by him or the city. He said the fixtures were at least partly covered by insurance.

The building, which Dr. G. E. Prime said was fully covered by insurance, is constructed with a steel running between the lower and second floors, and it was along this that the blaze was spreading. Firemen attacked the fire from the second floor, the hotel, cutting holes in the floors and ceilings. Debris that littered space between the floors, and especially the shelf, added fuel to the blaze.

Water did a small amount of damage to the rear of I. H. Barron's shoe repair shop, while smoke permeated both it and, to a small extent, the Commercial cigar store next door.

Appropriations to Exceed 10 Billions

WASHINGTON, May 28.—(AP)—Present indications are that appropriations at this session of congress will total more than \$10,355,000,000—almost a billion dollars in excess of last year's sum.

Appropriation bills carrying \$10,355,137,879 already have become law or are pending in the senate or house. Total appropriations last year were \$9,255,000,000.

Administration leaders contend the business recession is responsible largely for the increased outlay. Republicans say democrats are trying to buy success at the polls in November.

The house has kept the budget bureau's estimates, but the senate has increased them frequently.

Youth Dies Near Mt. Hood Summit

TIMBERLINE LODGE, Ore., May 28.—(AP)—Mount Hood claimed its third victim of the year today when Milton R. Nelson, 16, collapsed and died within 200 feet of the 11,225-foot summit while attempting to scale the peak.

News of the youth's death was brought to the lodge by Palmer Torgerson, who returned ahead of other members of a rescue party which left for the peak earlier when Nelson's party sent back for help.

Word of the youth's collapse and the failure of his companions to revive him was brought to the lodge by Telore E. Abendroth, a member of the climbing party.

Abendroth said the Nelson boy dropped suddenly to the snow and was saved from a possible 1000-foot fall by the rope with which the climbers were tied together.

Intensive Search Made for Cedillo

MEXICO CITY, May 28.—(AP)—The federal government today threw infantry, cavalry and aviation units into a widespread search for fugitive Gen. Saturnino Cedillo.

Cedillo, 45-year-old Mexican Indian who rebelled eight days ago against President Lázaro Cardenas, was believed wandering in brush-covered hills in his native San Luis Potosi state.

One army officer expressed belief the revolutionary chieftain would seek to escape to the United States but officials in the war ministry asserted his capture was imminent.

Cedillo narrowly escaped capture twice yesterday.

Gen. Reynaldo Perez Galarza at the head of the 35th and 40th regiments of cavalry captured Cedillo's hideout on Zecotlie (Mocking-bird) ranch early yesterday.

The rebel with a few followers escaped by airplane. Their craft was found abandoned later in a cornfield.

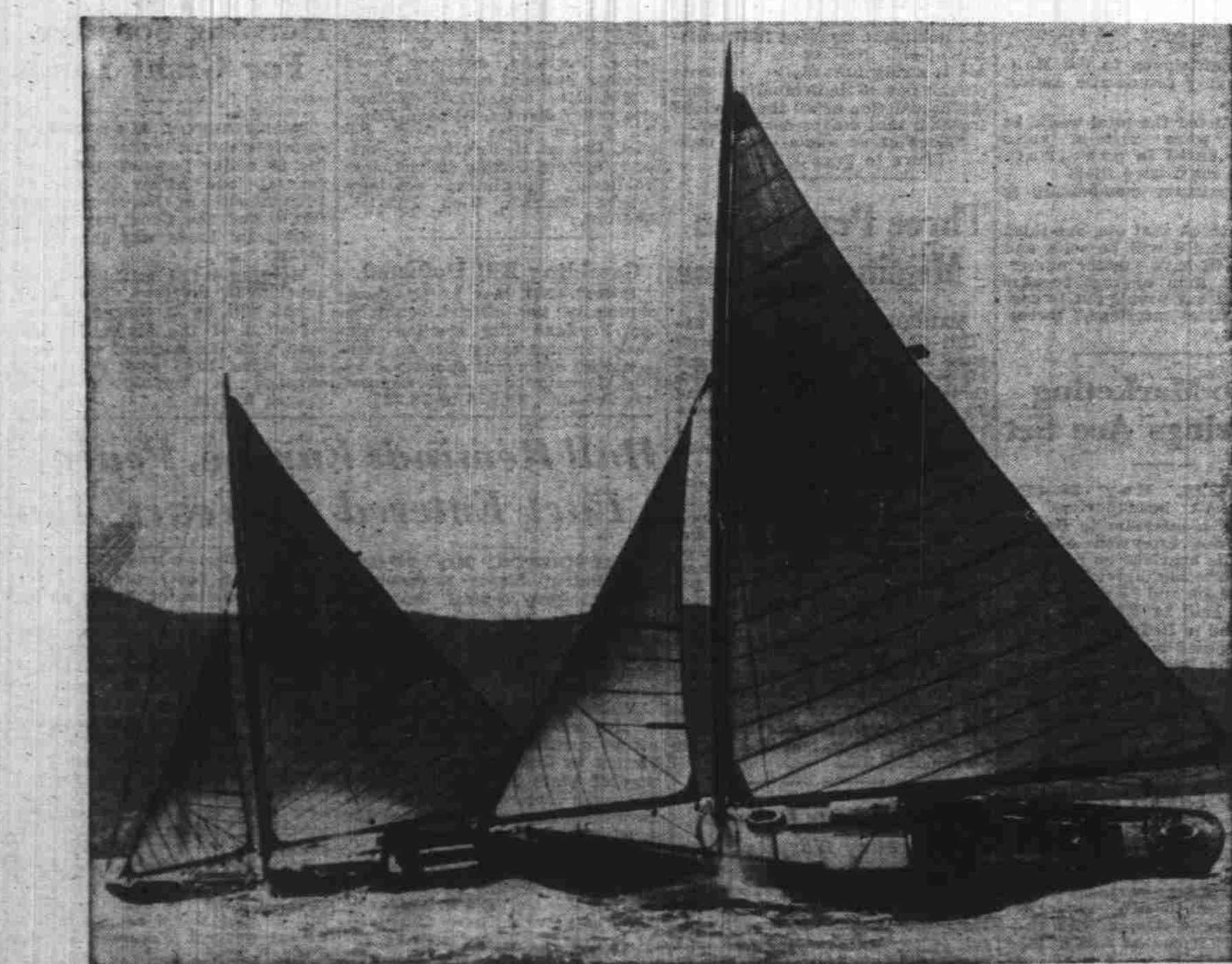
