The officers rushed Kunze to the Multnomah county jail at Bozeman. County Attorney H. B. Lande said he would file first degree murder charges.

County Coroner Howard Nelson said an inquest would be held at 7:30 p. m. tomorrow at the mayor's home.

Two rifles and a double-barreled shotgun, all loaded, were found in the John Kunz home, Sheriff Westlake said. A .30-30 caliber rifle had been used in the shooting, he said.

"Large issues are said to be involved in the case," the Star said, "one of the more important being whether the practice of medicine is commerce or trade within the meaning of the anti-trust laws."

The local association was formed by employees of the Home Owners Loan corporation. Members pay a monthly fee and are entitled to clinical service, operations and hospital care without further charge. The association employs a staff of seven surgeons and physicians.

The American Medical association has expressed disapproval of such plans. The district society adopted a by-law prohibiting its members from engaging in such practice. This by-law led to expulsion of Doctor Scandell.

Some hospitals here allow only members of the district medical society to practice in them. As a result of the society's stand, the association physicians are unable to send their patients to these hospitals.

Salmon Run Just Late, Conclusion

ASTORIA, Ore., June 1 (AP)—Merle Chessman, state fish commissioner, and a lower Columbia river fishermen agreed today that an abnormally small run of chinook salmon was caused by unusually heavy spring freshets. Chessman declared the Yakima river, Wash., was out of bounds in places, Cecilio falls, where Indians have fished since prehistoric times, were almost drowned out and the lower Columbia had never been so muddy and full of debris.

"Such conditions," he said, "invite neither chinooks or steelheads."

Fishermen said salmon were habitually reluctant to enter high, mud-laden streams. Some said fish refused to take troll hooks off the river mouth because it was not the right season.

Few were alarmed over future runs.

Westport Lumber Plant Stays Shut

ASTORIA, Ore., June 1 (AP)—Clatsop county's hard-hit lumber industry received another blow today when the Westport Lumber company, employing 350 men, announced it would delay reopening until June 6.

The company, which shut down May 21 because of the scarcity of orders, had planned to reopen today.

Nearly all cutting crews have been laid off and operators are occupying themselves hauling down logs to market.

Big Wheat Crop Seen in Palouse

Washington Area Viewed by A. A. Geer During Long Air Jaunt

The Palouse country in Washington holds promise of a bumper wheat crop this year, reports A. A. Geer, who enjoyed over the weekend a 2000-mile airplane trip to Kalispel, Mont., with his son-in-law and daughter, Mr. and Mrs. E. T. Eldridge. They left early Friday and returned Monday.

The trip was made in Eldridge's 4-passenger Stinson, and Geer says you can't beat air travel for comfort and a real enjoyment of nature's beauties. En route to Kalispel, the group stopped at Walla Walla and Spokane and made the trip into Kalispel in five hours and 13 minutes, actual flying time. On the return, they were 6 1/2 hours in the air. The Stinson performed beautifully the entire trip. Over the Bitter Root mountains, on the return, the flying elevation was between 10,000 and 11,000 feet all the way.

Eldridge planned the trip to visit his step-father and mother, Mr. and Mrs. John Richard at Kalispel, and while there took them both on their first airplane ride.

Roughest weather on the trip was encountered in thunder storms north of Walla Walla. Geer also reported severe storms Sunday at Kalispel.

Most of Mishaps In Good Weather

Of the 2404 traffic accidents reported in Oregon for April, 1938 occurred under favorable road conditions, Secretary of State Snell reported Wednesday. A total of 1632 of the accidents were during daylight hours, and 1573 of the accidents on clear days.

The largest number of accidents, 256, were between the hours of 4 and 5 p. m. A total of 1068 drivers involved in the accidents were between 40 and 54 years. Approximately 1100 of the operators were classified as laborers.

Clerks, with 250 accidents, had fewer traffic mishaps than any other class of drivers. Farmers were second with 260 accidents.

Thirty-four pedestrians were involved in traffic accidents. A total of 1207 accidents were at intersections and 886 on straight roads.

The largest number of accidents, 552, occurred on Saturdays.

Maintenance for Santiam Is \$6693

Marion county spent \$6693.13 last year and \$4,017.74 in preceding years on the maintenance of the North Santiam highway east and west of Detroit, according to a report being prepared for the federal bureau of public roads. Last year's expenditures included \$1366.21 for snow removal on the Detroit-Niagara section and \$190.46 on the 16.8-mile section of the highway east of Detroit.

The bureau will take back maintenance of the section east of Detroit this summer when it carries out a \$100,000 oil mat surfacing project there.

Oldest Pioneer of Umatilla Dies, 99

WESTON, Ore., June 1 (AP)—Mrs. Matilda Morton Saline, 99, believed the oldest pioneer of Umatilla county, died today at her home—missing by a scant nine months her desire to live a century.

Mrs. Saline came west in 1852 in one of 20 wagon trains which left Belleville, Ill., arriving at The Dalles in September.

She married L. E. Saline in McMinnville October 19, 1865.

Rehearing Sought On Reinstatement

SAN FRANCISCO, June 1 (AP)—A review of a national labor relations board order directing the reinstatement of a group of dismissed workers was asked of the ninth federal circuit court of appeals today by the M & M Woodworking company of Portland, Ore.

The company claimed its workers were under contract; that a condition of their employment was membership in the United Carpenters' and Joiners' union; that many of them were from this union to join an affiliate of the International Woodworkers of America, and, therefore, that the company was justified in dismissing some of them.

The NLRB, after hearings on complaint of the international woodworkers' local 102, ordered the workers reinstated with pay to begin from date of the reinstatement order for all those who applied for their old jobs.
