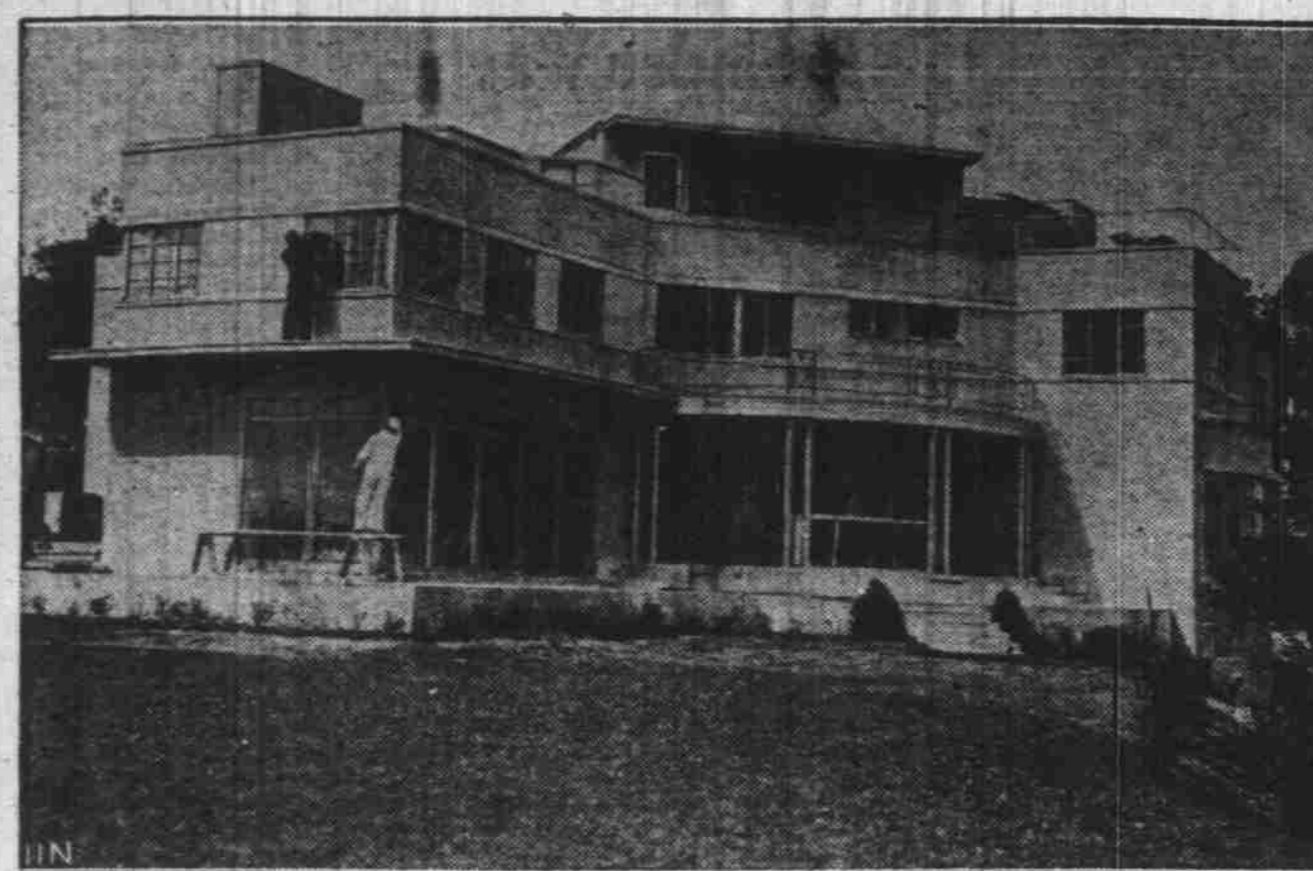
Ted Russell's Here
