SILVERTON—The entire county parade turned out Saturday morning to witness the 504 entrants parade in the annual pet show and parade. F. M. Powell was general chairman of the committee of Legionnaires arranging the parade. Line of march formed at the city park, marched through the business streets and ended at the school grounds where prizes and free tickets to the Palace theatre were distributed.

Mt. Angel's Blind Abbot Observes 40th Anniversary of Priesthood

MT. ANGEL—Rt. Rev. Bernard Murphy, Mt. Angel's blind abbot, quietly celebrated the 40th anniversary of his ordination to the priesthood Saturday in the abbey here.

Abbot Bernard was born December 10, 1874, in Portland and was the first Portland-born boy and the third in the state of Oregon to be ordained to the priesthood. He was sent to Rome to complete his theological studies and was ordained there in 1898 by Cardinal Casazza.

On October 21, 1921, he was elected abbot of the Benedictine community here. In 1933 he went to New York to undergo an operation on his eyes in the hope of saving his fast failing eyesight. The operation proved fruitless and in 1934 he asked for a coadjutor abbot to relieve him of his duties. Abbot Thomas Meier was elected August 1, 1934, and since then Abbot Bernard has withdrawn more and more from public life, though still actively interested in the affairs of the monastery.

Totally blind, he says holy mass from memory every morning and spends more of his time in prayer. His advice is constantly sought by the members of his community.

Final Rites Held For Mrs. Foster

PLEASANTDALE—Funeral services were held Saturday, June 4 at 2 p. m. at Mac's chapel in McMinnville for Mrs. George Foster, 67, a resident of the Pleasantdale neighborhood her entire life until beginning of her illness in March, 1937, who died at Salem June 2. Rev. Victor P. Morris of Eugene officiated, assisted by Rev. M. H. Campbell of McMinnville. Annie Laurie Addison was born November 9, 1871 at the Robert Addison farm in Pleasantdale. She was married to George Foster September 7, 1892. One son, Conrad, 25, died in 1923. She attended the Monmouth State Normal for three years. She has been a member of the Dayton Christian church since early childhood.

Surviving are her widower, two brothers, Charles Addison of Newburg and Niles Addison of Dayton. Burial was at Evergreen Memorial park cemetery, McMinnville.

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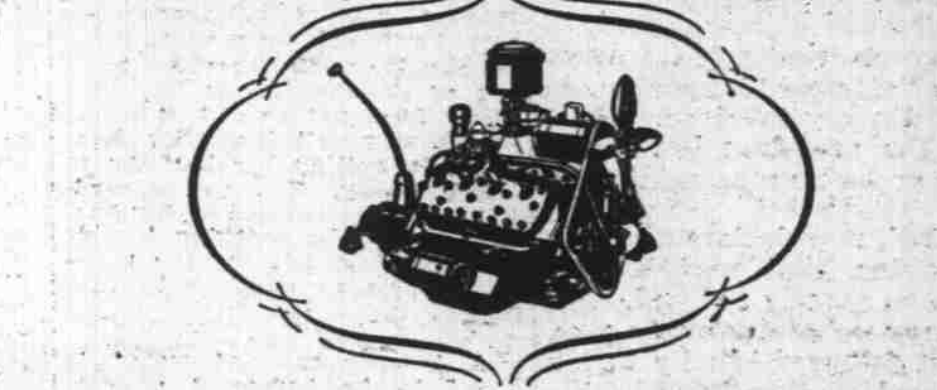
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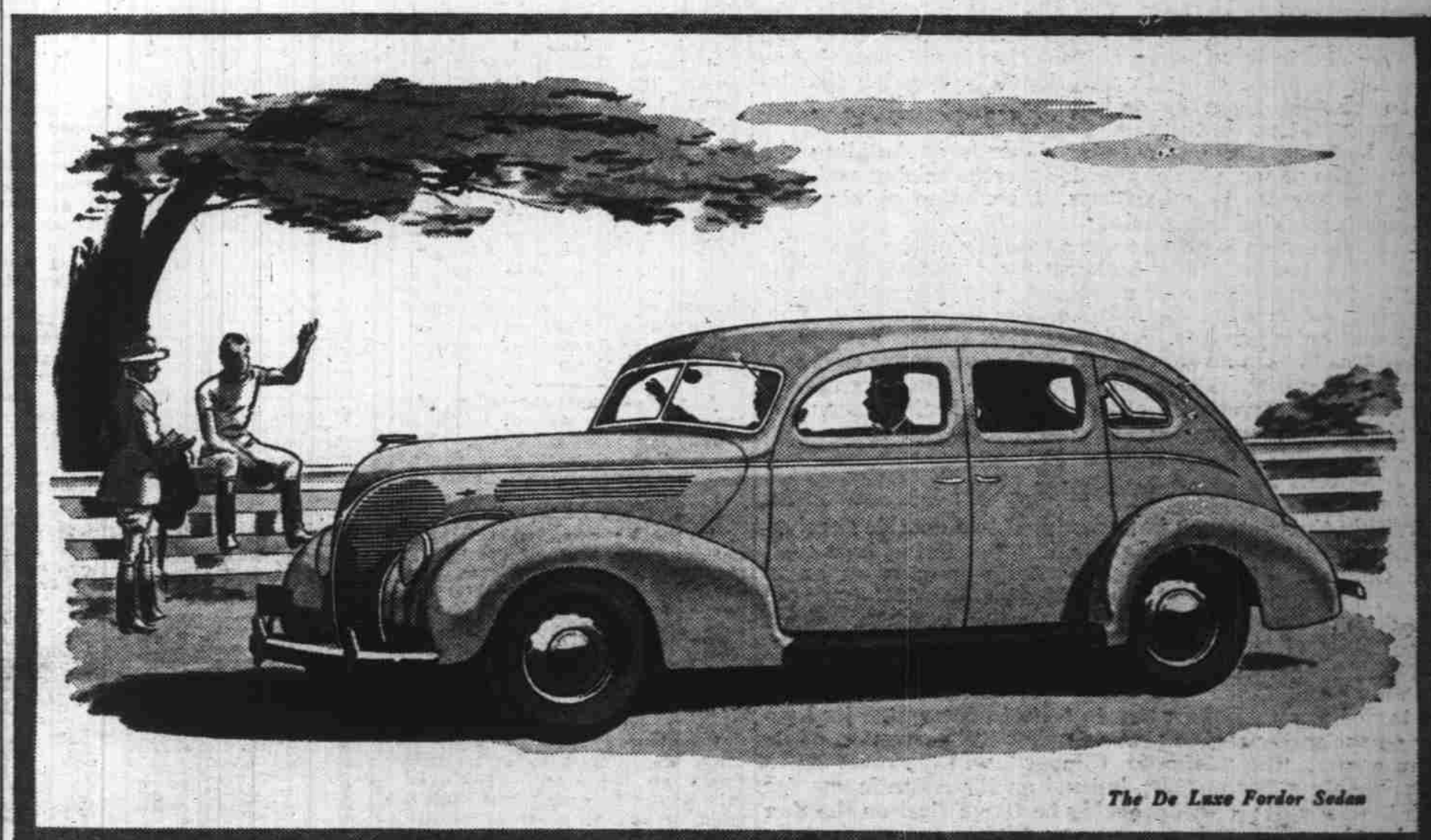
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
