Martin's Statement for Personal Expenses Shows \$762.05

Carl C. Donaugh, democratic candidate for United States senator at the recent primary election, expended a total of \$2,325.47 in conducting his campaign, according to an expense statement filed in the state department Monday.

Willis Mahoney, who defeated Donaugh for the nomination, spent \$1370.50.

The personal expense account of Governor Charles H. Martin aggregated \$762.05.

Dogs Kill Fewer Sheep, Is Report

Dogs killed fewer sheep and goats in Marion county last month than in any month in recent years, Paul Marnach, county dog license inspector, reported Saturday. He received reports of but one goat, three sheep and two lambs falling prey to marauding dogs.

"I guess we've got them all under control," said the inspector, who answers all reports of sheep-killing by dogs and rounds up the guilty animals whenever possible.

In one of the worst months on record for sheep killing, January, 1936, dogs were blamed for the slaughter of 85 sheep and the injury of 32 others, of which 20 later died, Marnach said.

nese rearguard was engaging the enemy on the city's outskirts. They said railroad traffic between Chengchow and Hankow, approximately 300 miles to the south, was normal.

Japanese, however, spoke freely of a "Chinese debacle" in the Chengchow area.

They said aerial observations disclosed dozens of troop trains carrying Chinese soldiers to mountainous regions in the southern section of the Peiping-Hankow railway while highways were choked with all types of vehicles.

Chinese reported the Yellow river was breaking through dikes between Chengchow and Kaifeng and had flooded part of the countryside, handicapping military operations.

Southern of the Lunglai corridor and more than 100 miles west of the Peiping-Hankow railway, a Japanese column was reported to have occupied Chengyangkwan, in west central Anhwei province.

First Water Runs In Project Ditch

Irrigation Ditches Will Serve 6000 Acres of Farm Land

First water has been turned into the ditches of the new 6000 acre irrigation project of the Willamette Valley Water company southeast of Salem, it was announced yesterday. The project ultimately will extend in a northwesterly direction to serve the area from Pudding river to Chemawa corners.

Two ditches have been started from Mill creek near the penitentiary annex, running along the west side of the stream. Another, taking off from the east side of the ditch and requiring construction of several siphons, will be opened as soon as enough acreage to justify the cost has been signed.

The company hopes eventually to sell water for use on state lands where overhead irrigation is now being tried.

Serves Bean Acreages

The new project for the present is expected to serve chiefly bean and ladino clover acreages. The California Packing corporation already has contracted for one 15-acre tract of beans. Dairy men desirous to pasture large herds on relatively small pasture areas are expected to take water for ladino clover developments.

With North Santiam river water rights sufficient to serve 59,000 acres of land, the irrigation company now has one project of 20,000 and another of 9000 acres under water in the West Santiam area in addition to the new one just being opened.

House Grants \$25,000 For Battleship Oregon

WASHINGTON, June 6—(AP)—The house passed Representative Nan Wood Honeyman's measure authorizing \$25,000 to berth the historic battleship Oregon at a new location in the Portland harbor. The funds will be combined with a public subscription.

Terms Commuted For Labor Pair

Gov. Charles H. Martin Monday commuted six months sentences imposed on Fred Upson, Wasco county, and Harold Belt, Multnomah county, to terms expiring today, it was announced at the executive department.

Officials said both Upson and Belt furnished valuable information in connection with recent labor "goon" prosecutions.

Upson was sentenced by Judge Fred Wilson, Wasco county, on April 16 to serve six months in jail for destruction of personal property.

Belt was sentenced by Judge Robert Tucker of Multnomah county to serve six months in jail there for assault and battery. The latter sentence was imposed February 14.

Executive department attaches said both commutations of sentence were recommended by the prosecuting officials.

Jobless Payment Tempo Is Faster

2,689 Claimers Are Paid Last Week or Third Over Previous

Production of benefit checks issued under the state unemployment compensation law stepped up 37 per cent for the week ending June 1 over the previous week. Insured jobless workers received 2,689 checks.

Stabilized processing and steady relationship between claims exhausted to zero balance and new claims filed caused Administrator D. A. Bulmore to predict check production would proceed along an even keel, averaging between 2,500 and 3,000 per week for the summer months.

1847 New Claims

New claims filed during the week totalled 1,847 for a 28 per cent increase over the preceding period.

First compensable checks exceeded new eligible determinations by 171. The checks totalled 2,057 and the determinations 1,886. Average number of checks received thus far by the 55,611 claimants whose claims have been determined valid in 6.54.

Nearly 300 out-of-state claims have been filed for workers whose jobless benefits rights were earned in other states but who now reside in Oregon. Most of them are from California, which has a working agreement with the Oregon commission under the interstate benefit payment plan.

Weizel Services To Be Thursday

Funeral services for Jacob Weizel, 57, well known Salem cabinet maker who died Monday at a Salem hospital, will be held Thursday afternoon at 3:30 o'clock at the Christ Lutheran church. Rev. Amos E. Minnemann officiating.

Burial will be at Belcrest.

Mr. Weizel was born in Russia January 19, 1881. He had suffered from cancer for many months, and had been able to devote but little time to his craftsmanship the past ten months.

He had resided in Salem 16 years and in the United States 31 years. He lived two years in Odessa, Ore., and 12 years in Spokane before coming here.

Surviving are four children: Ben of Corvallis, Mrs. Amelia Ellofson of Salem, Mrs. Pauline Peterson of San Mateo and Jacob, Jr., of Sebastopol, Calif.

Mr. Weizel was a faithful worker in the Lutheran church.

Matlock Is Freed Of Traffic Count

WOODBURN—R. D. Matlock of Gervais, route 1, was found not guilty by a jury of 6 men when he was tried in Judge Overton's court Friday morning after being arrested on a charge of operating a motor vehicle while under the influence of intoxicating liquor.

The charge grew out of a collision near the North Salem underpass May 3 when the defendant's car collided with another machine driven by Charles Widick. Widick, who signed the complaint, stated that the crash tore off part of the fender of his vehicle.

Nobles Converge on LA For Shriner Convention

LOS ANGELES, June 6—(AP)—The last of a mighty army of nearly 100,000 be-fezzed nobles of the Mystic Shrine arrived here today for the opening of their 64th annual convention tomorrow.

The largest single delegation, 500 Shriners, arrived in three special trains from Moslem temple, Detroit. Officials said it represented the largest single, completely air-conditioned mass movement of passengers in railroad history.

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
