Cherry Hills Par Aimed at by Pros and Amateurs as Fairway Floggers Prepare For National Open on Mile-High Course

DENVER, June 6—(AP)—Cherry Hill's grudging par faced further threats today as another troupe of fairway floggers hauled their big bags out to the mile-high course where the national open's three-day bombardment starts Thursday.

If the 1938 champion hadn't already taken a peek by tonight at the layout that has wrung moans from many of the earlier arrivals, he undoubtedly will have by tomorrow night.

Train and automobile today brought virtually all of the big-name shooters who competed in the lightning-tossed Kansas City open, ending yesterday.

So far par rounds in practice are nearly as scarce at Cherry Hills as a pair of knickers. Only two players, both of them calling New Jersey home, have reported card-matching performances of 71—defending champion Ralph Guldahl of Madison and gigantic Vic Ghess of Deal.

Ghezzi preface his par with two slick 72's, shooting golf that marks him as dangerous for anybody if he can carry his streak into the three days that count.

John Montague, Hollywood's "mystery man" of golf, shot a couple of rounds today and said the course is "grand." He predicted the golfer who averages par for the 72 holes should win. Somebody commented to Paul Runyan, runner-up in the Kansas City tournament, that "this looks like your course."

"Any course is your course when you're shooting golf," the little veteran reported. After nine holes over the rolling layout, he said he "liked it very much."

Horton Smith played with Runyan and Dick Metz of Lake Forest, Ill., and said he found the course "highly enjoyable."

The groundskeepers did some "barber" work on the course today, clipping the high grass fringes surrounding a number of greens. Several of the players, notably Lawson Little and Olin Dutra, had been bitter in their criticism of these matted hazards.

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Becker Meets Dean in Tilt

And Hopes by Win to Get Crack at Wagner and Pacific Belt Also

The Atlantic vs. the Dean—with the Pacific roaring ominously in the background! Make sense? Not ordinarily, but in tonight's main event wrestling match at the armory it not only makes sense, but wrestling magic.

For the one-hour main go pits George Becker, middleweight champion of the Atlantic coast, against Beany Dean, the middle-western bushwhacker, and a victory for Becker will find him knocking at George Wagner's Pacific championship door.

Drama as Possible
Dean lost a close one to Wagner last week in a title go, and is anxious to gain a rematch. The appearance of Becker, however, has complicated his chances and at the same time added a touch of drama never before duplicated.

If Becker should win and eventually be matched with Wagner, it would be the first time in wrestling history that the champions of the opposite coastlines had met in a title go. Only Wagner's belt would be at stake, however.

"Iron Man" Returns
Becker will rule as a favorite when he enters the ring, but he will nonetheless be a "paper favorite," and Dean last night expressed considerable distaste with newspaper speculation on an Atlantic-Pacific bout. "All you know about this guy is what you read or hear," he growled. "Ever seen him? Now! Well, wait till he's beat me before you start matching him with Wagner!"

Bill Kenna, the Oregon State "iron man" of 1932, returned to the valley mat wars in the 45-minute semifinals, meeting Pete Sherman, the streamlined grappler. In the 30-minute opener Jimmy Hefner of Otis Clingman.

Al Szasz will serve as third man, and the card begins at 8:30.
